

COAL STRIKE HELD BEYOND SOLUTION

Washington State Dispute
Far From Adjustment.

GUARDS PUT OVER MINES

Workers Flatly Refuse to Consider
Latest Proposal of Operators
Based on "Open Shop."

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 10.—The coal strike situation in Washington state has "gone beyond the chance of a settlement," Ernest Newsham, secretary of district 10, United Mine Workers of America, today in commenting on a report that 200 guards, bearing special deputy sheriff's badges, have been sent into mine fields at the request of operators.

"The miners' organization advises its members to keep away from the mines," Mr. Newsham said, "and to avoid getting into any trouble with the guards. Right now it appears that this will be a long drawn out contest."

Guards Are Not Controlled.

N. D. Moore, spokesman for the coal operators, in announcing the sending of guards to the fields, said:

"These guards are merely posted to protect life and property and are in no sense under company control. They will be answerable direct to the sheriff of each county."

Mr. Moore said he could not say when mines would reopen under the wage scale proposed yesterday when operators announced their intention of commencing operations in commercial mines, closed down since last March, "independently" of the United Mine Workers of America.

Ranks of Miners Solid.

"There have been no breaks in the ranks of the union miners in response to the operators' offer," Mr. Newsham declared today.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 10.—Striking coal miners in this county showed no disposition today to return to work under the offers announced by mine operators yesterday. Miners at Carbonado met this morning and voted unanimously against accepting any proposal that did not have the sanction of the United Mine Workers of America. Mass meetings of miners will be held tomorrow at Wilkeson and Burien.

Mines Expected to Reopen.

The Ford's Prairie Coal company, near Centralia, announced today that its mine will reopen soon on a co-operative basis. Coal companies have ordered their striking employees to vacate company houses by August 31 unless work is resumed before that time. Alexander Stubbs, president of the Carbonado union, said the union will take care of all miners and their families, but declined to give plans. The mines in this county expect to open next Monday under an open-shop plan. They have been closed since April.

STRIKE REPORTED SPREADING

San Francisco Building Crafts Say

Ranks Are Swelling.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—The ranks of strikers in the building crafts were augmented by some members of the Alameda County Building Trades Council, who responded today to the call of the Alameda and Berkeley to the call of the Alameda council for a general strike, according to union leaders, but the secretary of the San Francisco Building Exchange, the employers' organization, said in a statement that he showed "no appreciable change" in the situation.

The employers have announced they are operating under the "open shop" plan.

SHOPMEN WILL NOT STRIKE

Railway Workers Depend on Public

Opinion to Win Fight.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 10.—Shopmen on the Pennsylvania railroad will not strike to force the company to comply with the order of the United States railroad labor board to meet with their union employees and arrange details for a new election of committees to draw up a new schedule of working agreements.

The last threat of strike disappeared today when H. D. Jeffery, chairman of the advisory board of the shop-craft unions of the Philadelphia-Camden district, announced the unions would rely on American patriotism and public sentiment to force the road to obey the transportation act.

One Big Union Repudiated.

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 10.—The One Big Union and the international organization have been repudiated by the Winnipeg street railway workers who have organized a new union to be known as the Canadian Independent Federation of Street Car Men.

FRESH SALMON IN DEMAND

Portland Cannery to Enter Market

With Willapa Harbor Supply.

SOUTH BEND, Wash., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—F. C. Barnes, son of Frank, the Portland canneryman, are in the city and they announce that while they probably will not run their salmon cannery here, they will ship fresh fish from here to the Atlantic coast if they can get enough fishermen to fish in Willapa harbor this fall.

The fishing season on the Columbia closes August 25 and it is customary for many Columbia river fishermen to come to Willapa harbor for fall fishing.

North river will be closed to fishing after August 15, but the other streams on the harbor will be open from August 15 to November 20. There was little fishing in the bay last year and the north channel off Nahcotta has not been fished for two years.

DR. STONE SCALES ANON

Summit of Peak Reached Moment

Before Fall to Death.

CALGARY, Alberta, Aug. 10.—Proof that Dr. W. E. Stone, ex-president of Purdue university, reached the summit of Mount Anon, an achievement hitherto unaccomplished, a moment before he fell to his death, has been found by the party which recovered his body, declared a dispatch from Banff, received last night by the Calgary Herald.

The party, which included guides and amateur mountain climbers, raised a small cairn of stones to mark his achievement before they left for the Eau Claire camp with the body.

DYE MAKERS DO DUTY

CHEMICAL EXPERT DECLARES

WAR RECORD CLEAN.

Witness Thinks Industry Should

Be Fostered, but Not More

Than Other Enterprises.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 10.—Joseph H. Choate Jr., representing the American Dye Institute and the Chemical Foundation, submitted to the committee documents covering suits of the alien property custodian against H. A. Metz, New York dye manufacturer, to get control of his plants, alleged at that time to have been partly German-owned. He offered the evidence, he explained, because he would not be able to reply to testimony of Mr. Metz Monday, which he described as "littered with abuse."

Arguments advanced by the dye-makers seeking an embargo that theirs was a key industry were attacked by Earl J. W. Ragsdale, lieutenant-colonel of ordinance, who is credited with the conception of the Edgewood (Md.) arsenal. Mr. Ragsdale asserted that as head of the "explosives desk" in the war department during the war, he had been given only "patriotic co-operation" by the chemical industry. He expressed the belief that its leaders did not realize then that their business would last after the war.

Mr. Ragsdale said he could not credit the dye and chemical makers with more importance than most others of national scope, although he believed they were entitled to protection that would permit "healthy and natural development." While informing the committee that the industry would be an asset to the government in event of future wars, the witness said none could forecast what chemicals would be the important ones in future wars and therefore no more emphasis should be placed on it than on many other great commercial enterprises.

BOOKKEEPER IS ACCUSED

Ex-Employee of Armour Charged

With Embezzling \$156,000.

SHERBURN, Minn., Aug. 10.—Two Chicago detectives left here late Monday with Nick R. Freynick, accused in connection with the alleged embezzlement of \$156,000 from Armour & Co. at Kansas City, where it is said he was employed as a bookkeeper.

A week ago Freynick came here to join the local baseball club as a pitcher. According to the detectives, Freynick and three other men are alleged to be implicated in the pecuniations which were uncovered when Freynick left Kansas City.

COPYRIGHT HELD UNHURT

New York Times Wins Point in Suit

With Public Ledger.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Learned Hand, federal judge, dismissed the portion of a complaint alleging infringement of copyright in the suit brought by the Philadelphia Public Ledger against the New York Times in connection with the republication on February 1, 1920, of a letter written by Viscount Grey to the London Times.

The letter dealt with the attitude of the United States and the senate toward the league of nations and the Ledger said its republication by the New York Times violated the plaintiff's copyright.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Four men were killed and many more wounded in disorders at the great Austrian penitentiary at Steim Monday night. The inmates of the penitentiary mutinied after sending an ultimatum to the government, demanding that their sentences be reduced.

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Spanish Troops at Bay

Reports State Moorish Tribesmen

Have Captured Position.

MADRID, Aug. 10.—The arrival of troops in Melilla continues. It is believed here that shortly 50,000 men will be concentrated there. From Mount Arruit it is reported that General Navarro's forces continue to put

up a heroic fight against the Moors. With the contingent are some military chaplains who are using rifles and Maxim guns to keep the rebels off.

Reports received from Melilla, says a dispatch to the London Times from Tangier, are that the Rif tribesmen

have captured part of General Navarro's position on Mount Arruit. Navarro's column now is said to consist of 700 fighting men, all of the remainder being sick or wounded.

There has been a large increase in the enemy forces in the neighborhood of Melilla, says the dispatch. Fighting has occurred between the Spaniards and tribesmen on the Melilla peninsula in districts hitherto reported as loyal to Spain.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(Special.)—Although he is not dangerously ill, Henry P. Davison, partner of J. P. Morgan, may have to undergo an operation within a few days, it was learned last night.

Dr. Franklin Lewellyn Barker, eminent physician of Johns Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, will go to Peacock point, Glen Cove today to consult with other physicians concerning Mr. Davison's condition.

Mr. Davison has not once during the sickness, which has kept him at his home in Glen Cove several weeks, been confined to his bed.

When a rumor was circulated in Wall street today that the financier was in a serious condition and an immediate operation would have to be performed to save his life he was talking about his place at Peacock point.

STORE TO PAY DIVIDEND

Year's Sales of Student Co-operative Enterprise \$40,000.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Aug. 10.—(Special.)—A 5 per cent dividend has been declared by the University of Oregon student co-operative store and checks will be mailed within a few days to members of the association. Business amounting to \$40,000 was done in the nine months ended June 1, according to Marion McCall, manager.

To widen the scope of the business and provide the necessary capital, a holding company, to be known as the University Trading company, is being formed with a capital stock of \$10,000. The co-operative store was reorganized last year after having been closed during the period of the war.

Rich Strike Reported.

MEDFORD, Or., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—A rich strike is reported in the old Norling group of mines, four miles west of Jacksonville. The assay showing \$39.35 in gold and silver within three feet of grass roots. Another vein was opened up last Friday showing \$22.90 in gold and silver. Fifteen men are at work opening up the veins and erecting buildings.

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MINISTER TURNS UP ALIVE

REV. C. C. PRENTISS THOUGHT

VICTIM OF PUEBLO FLOOD.

No Recollection Had of Happen-

ings After Waters Caught Train

in Railroad Yards.

ALAMOSA, Colo., Aug. 10.—Believed to have been one of the victims of the Pueblo flood the night of June 3 last, and given up for dead by his daughters, Rev. C. C. Prentiss, a retired Methodist minister, returned to his daughter's home near Mosca Tuesday, unable to tell a detailed story of his disappearance.

Mr. Prentiss recovered his memory in a hospital in Oglethorpe, Ga., last week, but was unable to tell attending physicians how he arrived there. He was a passenger on a Denver & Rio Grande train that was caught in the flooded yards at Pueblo, and it was believed he had been lost. Mr. Prentiss walked into the home of Dr. Bredens Tuesday, where he told his story, as far as he knew it. He has no recollection of what happened from the time the flood waters entered the train until he regained his memory in the Georgia hospital.

JITNEYS INVADE TACOMA

Operators, Ousted From Seattle,

Quickly Start New Run.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—Jitney operators, ousted from Seattle by city ordinance, invaded Tacoma today.

Ten motor buses were put on the South Tacoma run on a day and night shift and will maintain a ten-minute service between Seventh and Pacific and Manitou park. It was announced by applicants for jitney licenses at the city hall.

Next week the same men, members of the Seattle Auto Drivers' association, plan to establish a similar service on the Sixth-avenue line and will later install service on Point Defiance. A ten-cent fare is to be charged until mid-September, after which it is to be advanced to 25 cents.

Three jitney licenses were issued today by the city clerk to former Seattle operators and many more inquiries were made.

The invasion of the Seattle jitney men brings to the city the first regular jitney service of any proportions which has been maintained since last summer and autumn. Inspired by the increase of carfare and approval on the part of several members of the city commission, the buses started operations, but after a brief span only a few remained.
