Ex-Minister to China Gets
Across Russia to Riga.

CONDITIONS ARE STUDIED

Trip of 7000 Miles Costs Diplomat
100,000,000 Soviet Rubles
and Stock of Supplies.

RIGA, Aug. 11.—(By the Associated Press.)—Charles R. Crane, ex-United States minister to China, arrived here last night from Riga, after completing a 7000-mile journey from Peking, which took him by the Trans-Siberian route. Mr. Crane, who was accompanied by four Americans and a Chinese cook, told the story of his trip to a crowd of American reporters waiting at the station to greet him.

The party left the Chinese capital June 16 and from that time until August 6, when it left Petrograd for Riga, it traveled under a special permit from Nikolai Lenin, Russian bolshevik premier.

Russian Conditions Observed.
The American humanitarian opportunity to observe the comedy and tragedy of the every-day life of the Russian people and to give a greater chance to inspect conditions than has been granted any Americans since the outbreak of the Russian revolution in 1917.

During the journey Mr. Crane spent about 100,000,000 soviet rubles, or about \$200,000, besides giving away the remainder of his stock of small merchandise.

Before their train had left the far eastern republic it was attached to a hospital train carrying soldiers who had been wounded in fighting against the forces commanded by General Baron Michael Ungern-Sternberg, leader of the anti-bolshevik troops there. The wounded men declared that the anti-bolshevik had been badly beaten.

Relief Conference Held.
Conferences between Walter L. Brown and Maxim Litvinoff, relative to relief measures to be taken in Russia, will be resumed here tomorrow, but both men have made it clear to each other that they are not appearing in behalf of their respective governments. Mr. Brown informed M. Litvinoff yesterday that he was representing the American relief administration. M. Litvinoff presented credentials as the representative of the Russian family committee.

Decision as to whether American relief supplies will be withheld from Russia until all Americans in that country have been released and placed outside the borders of bolshevik Russia has been left to the state department in Washington.

RELIEF WILL BE ORGANIZED

United States to Begin Negotiations to Aid Famine Sufferers.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 11.—Official word of the arrival at Riga of Americans released from Russia reached the state department today and relatives were notified by the department in every case where addresses were known. The department's advice from Riga is that nothing to accounts already published on the arrival of the Americans.

Negotiations have been started for famine relief will proceed on the assumption that all other Americans who choose to leave Russia will be given facilities to cross the frontier.

It was said authoritatively. There are known to be many Americans there who, not in jail, have been prevented from leaving and the soviet authorities are reported to have promised to circulate announcements that unconditional permission will be granted them to depart.

Appropriation of \$5,000,000 to be used by the president to aid in Russian relief was provided in a bill introduced today by Senator King, democrat, Utah.

ARMS INVITATIONS SENT

Executive in foreign relations. He summoned to the White House Senator Borah, republican, and asked him to call on the resolution requesting the calling of a disarmament conference, and in a conference of more than an hour, went over foreign problems generally as they are likely to affect the attitude of the American representatives in the conference.

One subject understood to have received special attention at the conference was the proposal for free tolls for American coastwise ships at the Panama canal.

Mr. Harding was said to have expressed no objection to the subject, but he was understood to have given it as his opinion that diplomatic negotiations now proceeding on the subject should be carried forward without interruption.

Secret Diplomacy Opposed.
Senator Borah was said also to have urged the president to avoid any appearance of secret diplomacy in connection with the disarmament conference. Administration officials have held, however, that although the public opinion must be brought behind the work of the assembled delegates to assure their success, the question of public or open sessions is one that only the conference itself can decide.

The text of the official invitations to Great Britain and China was made public today at the state department. It was identical with the notes sent to France, Italy and Japan, except for insertion of the respective names of the powers addressed, as follows:

Text of Invitation Issued.
The text of the formal invitation to the disarmament conference follows:

"The president is deeply gratified at the cordial response to his suggestion that there should be a conference on the subject of limitation of armaments in connection with which Pacific and far eastern questions should also be discussed.

"Productive labor is staggering under an economic burden too heavy to be borne unless the present vast public expenditures are greatly reduced. It is in the interest of humanity, of the assurance of social justice, of the security of peace, while justice and unproductive outlays deprive effort of its just reward and defeat the reasonable expectation of progress. The enormous disbursements in the rivalry of armaments have not only constituted the greater part of the encumbrance upon enterprise and national prosperity and avoidable or extravagant expense of this nature is not only without economic justification, but is a constant menace to the

peace of the world rather than an assurance of its preservation.

Limitation Is Suggested.
"Yet there would seem to be no ground to expect the halting of these increasing outlays unless the powers most largely concerned find satisfactory basis for an agreement to effect their limitation. The time is believed to be opportune for the powers to approach this subject directly and in conference and, while in the discussion of the subject of armaments, the question of naval armaments may naturally have first place, it has been suggested and may also be found advisable to formulate proposals by which, in the interest of humanity, the use of new agencies of warfare may be suitably controlled.

"It is, however, quite clear that there can be no final assurance of the peace of the world in the absence of the desire for peace and the prospect of reduced armaments is not a hopeful one unless this desire finds expression in a practical effort to remove causes of misunderstanding and to seek ground for agreement as to principles and their application.

Solution Is To Be Sought.
"It is the earnest wish of this government that through an interchange of views with the facilities afforded by a conference it may be possible to find a solution of Pacific and far eastern problems, of unquestioned importance at this time, that is, such common understandings with respect to matters which have been and are of international concern as may serve to promote enduring friendship among all peoples.

"It is not the purpose of this government to attempt to define the scope of the discussion in relation to the Pacific and far east, but rather to leave this to be the subject of suggestions to be exchanged before the meeting of the conference, in the expectation that the spirit of friendship and a cordial appreciation of the importance of the elimination of sources of controversy will govern the final decision.

"Accordingly, in pursuance of the proposal which has been made and in the light of the gracious indication of its acceptance, the president invites the government of Great Britain to participate in a conference on the subject of limitation of armaments, to be held in Washington on the eleventh day of November, 1921."

Note Is Sent to China.
The note to China was in the same language, except that the detailed discussions of the conference were omitted and the following was substituted as the concluding paragraph:

"Accordingly, in pursuance of the proposal which has been made and in the light of the gracious indication of its acceptance, the president invites the government of the republic of China to participate in the discussion of Pacific and far eastern questions in connection with the conference on the subject of limitation of armaments, to be held in Washington on the eleventh day of November, 1921."

CHEMICALS OF WAR STAY
Plans Laid to Carry Into Effect Special Army Act.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 11.—(Special.)—Plans have been perfected for carrying into effect the provision of the army reorganization act creating a chemical warfare service, which among other things, provides for the supervision and training of the army in chemical warfare, both defensive and offensive.

Plans for training the army along these lines have been worked out and communicated to corps area and department commanders, despite the certainty that the forthcoming disarmament conference will set an agreement limiting the use of gas and chemicals in warfare.

A special service school will train and instruct selected officers of the chemical warfare service for duty as "gas" officers for divisions, corps and armies and for technical duty in the service. To this school will be sent selected men, commissioned officers of the first gas regiment, for preparation for emergency commissions.

MARRIAGE DOCTOR'S THIRD
President's Father Talked Out of Wedding Employe in 1920.

MARION, O., Aug. 11.—(Special.)—No intimation of the supposed wedding of Dr. George T. Harding and Miss Alice Severns was given anyone here. Dr. Harding's daughter, Miss Abigail, said she was in the city and knew nothing today except the news reports.

The bride is a plain looking woman of medium build and height. She has been employed by Dr. Harding in a clerical capacity a number of years and the city directory gives her occupation as clerk. No one here claimed to be the doctor in some office case.

About 14 months ago, before the Chicago convention at which Senator Harding was nominated, Dr. Harding applied for a marriage license in the probate court intending then to marry Miss Severns.

The judge delayed matters until Senator Harding could be communicated with. Then the doctor was talked out of taking the step on the ground that it might embarrass his son and no license was issued. Relations with the attorney who had been believed the matter was settled for all time.

Dr. Harding is a veteran of the civil war. His supposed bride is regarded highly. This was said to be his first matrimonial venture and other wives having been taken by death.

WHITE HOUSE IS SURPRISED

Press Reports From Michigan Are First News of Wedding.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—To all appearances the marriage of Dr. T. Harding, the president's father, took the White House completely by surprise.

Those close to the president received their first news of the marriage through the press report from Michigan and after Mr. Harding himself had been informed the only comment was that no private word of the event had been received.

RISH SEEN TO TO LLOYD GEORGE

Premier Returning to London
This Morning.

ANSWER IS KEPT SECRET

British Officials Say Contents of Note Will Be Concealed Pending Conferences.

PARIS, Aug. 11.—(By the Associated Press.)—The British delegation, through Lord Riddell, tonight informed the newspaper correspondents that Premier Lloyd George, on receipt of the Irish answer to the peace proposals of the British government and in view of the deadlock of the Upper Silesian question, had decided to return to London tomorrow morning.

Premier Lloyd George studied the Irish reply until a late hour. It was then announced by members of the British delegation that Mr. Lloyd George would make no statement on the situation until after the cabinet meeting Saturday.

A report that the Irish negotiations have been broken off is denied by British and unofficial circles. It was declared that the reply was of a nature to permit further parley.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—(By the Associated Press.)—The reply of Eamon de Valera, the Irish republican leader, to the British government's peace proposals, was handed to Austen Chamberlain, government leader in the house of commons, at noon today.

Tenor Kept Secret.
The tenor of the reply was withheld. The official explanation was that it would be subject first to conferences by the cabinet and that it was unlikely to be divulged for some days.

Robert C. Barton, member of the Dail Eireann, gave the reply to Mr. Chamberlain in the absence of Premier Lloyd George in France.

Mr. Barton was accompanied by Art O'Brien, president of the Gaelic league in London. Both of these men had been DeValera's companions during his recent talks in Downing Street.

Mr. Chamberlain announced in the house of commons this afternoon the receipt of the reply, which was forwarded immediately to Lloyd George in Paris.

Crisis Is Rumored.
A dispatch to Reuters' from Paris tonight said Premier Lloyd George will return to London Friday owing to the developments in the Irish situation. It is rumored in French sources, added the message, that Eamon de Valera's reply means a grave crisis.

It was announced tonight that De Valera's reply had been received from London to the prime minister in Paris by airplane.

APPLE OUTLOOK BRIGHT

Hood River Growers Advised Irish Demand Will Be Heavy.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Aug. 11.—(Special.)—According to a letter received by F. S. Davidson, ex-president of the Apple Growers' association, from Clarence W. Moomaw, who, with his brother, S. B. Moomaw, is London representative of American apple exporting concerns, the British apple outlook is bright this year.

Mr. Moomaw says that the English fruit crop has been made negligible because of droughts. The late varieties of apples apparently are ruined, and the early fruit, his letter states, is being pulled green in order to salvage it.

PRIEST IS FOUND SLAIN

on the night of Tuesday, August 2, were found in other pockets.

Man Is Reported Dying.
He had been told by the stranger that a man was dying and that he wanted the last comforts of the church and it was while on this errand that the priest met his end.

The police have no definite idea as to when Father Heslin was taken to the desolate strip of beach and killed. There was evidence to show that one of the six bullet holes in his body was made while he had his back to his murderous assailant.

The murder was a cold-blooded one, five more bullets into the body. The skull was crushed, presumably by his fall from the cliff.

There was a bullet hole through the priest's head and one through his heart. There were other wounds in the body.

Woman Drawn Into Case.
Hightower said he obtained his first clew when he came upon Dolly Mason last Saturday. She confided to him, he said, that man, half intoxicated, had come to her room the night before. This man drew a revolver from his pocket and when she expressed fear, he said: "You are right to be afraid of that gun; it has taken human life."

He then gave Dolly Mason information which Hightower said gave the clew to the grave's location.

Hightower was waiting last night at the residence of Archbishop Hanna for an interview when he met a newspaperman to whom he told his story.

The last person known to have seen the Rev. Mr. Heslin alive, aside from the abductor, was the priest's housekeeper, Miss Marie Wendel. She was unable, however, to give an accurate description of the man who called for her employer.

Next Day Is Demanded.
The next day, before any publicity had been given the fact that the Rev. Mr. Heslin was missing, Archbishop Hanna, San Francisco, received a special delivery letter, unsigned, demanding ransom of \$5000 for the priest's release and stating that he was being bound and gagged in a bootlegger's cellar.

From that day until the body was found last night, unceasing search was made for the missing priest. Hundreds of possible clews were received and run down to no purpose. Rewards totaling \$8000 were offered—\$2000 by the Catholic diocese of San Francisco, \$2000 by public subscription of Coima citizens and \$1000 by the board of supervisors of San Mateo county.

Rev. Mr. Heslin was 58 years of age. He was the brother of the late Bishop Heslin of Tennessee. He was a cousin of Brother Basil of the St. Elizabeth's Franciscan monastery, Oakland.

The death of Father Patrick Heslin was brought about by a blow on the back of the head from some blunt instrument, declared Dr. John Clark,

San Francisco surgeon, who performed an autopsy on the body at Colma today. Dr. Clark said he came to this conclusion after careful examination. He believes the bullet wounds on the body, one through the heart and one through the head were inflicted after Father Heslin was dead.

Typewriter to Be Examined.
A typewriter rented by William A. Hightower recently and now in the hands of the police was believed by them to be the same machine upon which the first letter demanding ransom for Father Heslin was written. It was announced tonight. The machine, it was announced, would be thoroughly studied by experts and its type peculiarities compared with those in the ransom letter.

A formal charge of murder probably will be placed tomorrow against Hightower. It was said tonight by District Attorney Swart of San Mateo county and Captain of Detectives Matheson of the San Francisco police department.

Hightower tonight was confined in the jail as justice here, all approaches to the jail being under strong police guard.

Search Begun for Woman.
Dolly Mason, the woman from whom Hightower said he obtained the information that led to his discovery of the body of Father Heslin, was being sought tonight by the police. Headed by Detective Mitchell, a posse of detectives searched all day for a trace of the girl.

A description of Miss Mason given to the police by Hightower and attached at the police hotel, where she resided, was as follows:

Height—Five feet 2 inches.
Weight—Between 100 and 125 pounds.
Age—Between 25 and 30.
Stature—Small and exceedingly well formed.

Face—Very pretty, her beauty would make her stand out in a crowd.
Teeth—Dissimilar, probably from cigarette smoking.

Hair—Decidedly blonde.
Eyes—Large and brown.
Mouth—Sweet, but not fleshy; usually of dark texture.

Characteristics—Usually keeps to herself, is quiet and has little to say unless called upon.

PRIEST IS SHOT 3 TIMES
Birmingham, Ala. Pastor Is Seriously Wounded at Home.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 11.—Father James E. Coyne, pastor of St. Paul's Catholic church, was shot three times and seriously wounded early tonight while sitting on the porch of his home.

The assailant, who gave his name as Stephenson and said he was a Methodist minister, surrendered soon after the shooting. He refused to make a statement.

BARON BYNG TAKES JOB
CANADA'S NEW GOVERNOR-GENERAL SWORN IN.

Thousands Line Flag-Decked Streets of Quebec and Guns Boom Tribute to War Hero.

QUEBEC, Que., Aug. 11.—Amid the booming of guns from Quebec's ancient citadel Baron Byng of Vimy, a hero of the great war, today officially assumed the duties as Canada's new governor-general.

He was sworn into office at the provincial legislative building with impressive ceremony.

Premier Arthur Meighan accompanied him. A distinguished assembly of Dominion officials, headed by Justice Anglin, the acting administrator, officially greeted him.

A troop of cavalry trotted ahead of the carriage carrying the governor and Byng to the parliament buildings. Thousands lined the flag-decked streets and gave him a tremendous ovation.

Baron Byng waved his hand in acknowledgment and Lady Byng bowed repeatedly.

GASOLINE CRAFT ABLAZE
Schooner Norma Narrowly Averts Destruction by Explosion.

COQUILLE, Or., Aug. 11.—(Special.)—A large crowd gathered at the docks tonight at 3 o'clock when the gasoline schooner Norma, belonging to the Myrtle Point Transportation company, caught fire. Due to the efforts of the local volunteer fire department, two lines of hose were soon ready and the flames extinguished.

The boat was carrying a surplus quantity of gasoline, which, if it had exploded, would have endangered the business section of the city.

The extent of the damage is estimated at \$1000.

Tanker Amalthus Launched.
OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 11.—The oil tanker, Amalthus, 1400 deadweight tons, sister ship to three others launched recently for the Anglo-Saxon Petroleum company of London, was launched at the Union Construction company's plant here today.

Mrs. J. C. Van Eck, wife of the president of the Shell Oil Company of California, sponsored the vessel. The Amalthus cost about \$1,750,000 and has been under construction for five months.

Moose Lodge Plans Picnic.
Members of Moose lodge and their families will picnic Sunday at Crystal Lake park. A full programme of athletic events and stunts has been arranged by the committee in charge. The Moose band of 40 pieces, P. A. Selberling, conductor, will take part. A tug of war between one ton of fat men and one ton of "slims" is being arranged as a feature. Log-rolling events and a baseball game are on the schedule. A special dance orchestra will be on hand.

Hobos to Lose Camp.
WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 11.—(Special.)—The district known as "the Jungles," home of hobos, is to be made into a public playground. As soon as the banks of Mill creek are protected by bulkheads the work will be done, it was announced by Mayor Hill. Owners of the property have agreed to deed the land to the city for park purposes and Mayor Hill announced that the city has \$5000 available to improve the grounds. The \$5000 is the gift of an anonymous pioneer.

Regular Dividend Declared.
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—The board of directors of the Southern Pacific company at New York today declared the regular quarterly dividend of \$1.50, payable October 1, to stockholders of record on August 21. It was announced by local officials of the company.

Pineapple Filled Cookies
—2 cups butter or butter substitute, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, ½ cup milk, 2½ to 3 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup Crushed or Grated Hawaiian Pineapple, after draining. Cream the butter, add sugar gradually and well beaten egg. Mix sifted flour and baking powder, and add alternately with milk to first mixture. Chill, roll out, pat tablespoon of drained pineapple and one-half teaspoon of sugar in the center of one cookie, place another cookie on top and press edges together. Place on a slightly floured baking sheet and bake in a hot oven.

Pineapple Custard Meringue
—4 eggs, ¼ cup sugar, 3 cups scalded milk, ¼ teaspoon salt, ½ cup Hawaiian Crushed or Grated Pineapple, ¼ cup cherries. Beat slightly two whole eggs and the yolk of two eggs, reserving whites for the meringue. Add sugar and salt. Gradually add scalded milk, stirring constantly. Cook in a double boiler until mixture thickens enough to coat a spoon. Mixture must be stirred with cool spoon. Pour in the center of one cookie, place another cookie on top and press edges together.
