DEATH DUE TO POISONING

SECOND SIMILAR FATALITY OCCURS IN SAME HOUSE.

David Craig Takes Carbolic Acid and Dies Shortly After Arrival at Hospital.

The second case of carbolic acid poisoning to occur in the same house resulted in the death yesterday noon of David Craig, 45 years old, at 42 East Burnside street. About ten days ago Mrs. May Connelly swallowed carbolic acid at 42 1/2 East Burnside street, when a bad cold developed into pneumonia, and died later in St. Vincent's hospital.

Craig was found in his room, which he had occupied but a short time. Just a few minutes after he had taken carbolic acid. Whether it was a case of suicide or a mistake cannot be determined.

Craig died a few minutes after he reached St. Vincent's hospital. His body was taken by the coroner. Little is known of him in Portland.

FIREMAN IS CENSURED

Own Company Called to Put Out Fire in Hoseman's Home.

John Peterson, hoseman of engine 22, First and Jefferson streets, is a glowing example of the man who thinks himself exempt from the rules which he teaches others to obey, according to the fire marshal. Peterson's company was called to put out a fire in his own home at 300 Park street about 8 o'clock yesterday morning.

The fire marshal attributed the cause to a match that Peterson had tipped into a barrel used as a wood box while he was getting breakfast. The fire did little damage but has brought upon Peterson the censure of his department.
