William Johnston Defeats R. Norris Williams II.

WASHBURN IS SUCCEEDED

Cup First Won in 1919 by William T. Tilden II Goes to San Francisco Player.

SEABRIGHT, N. J., Aug. 12.—William Johnston of San Francisco, member of the American Davis cup team, today defeated R. Norris Williams II, Boston, also selected today as a cup player in the final of the Seabright Lawn Tennis and Cricket club singles, 6-0, 6-4, 6-2. The Boston player was unable to get started in the first set. The western star played a steady, forceful game, which enabled him to gain the net. Williams was weak on the backhand.

By his victory Johnston becomes successor to Watson M. Washburn as holder of the cup. It was won for the first time in 1919 by William T. Tilden II, who did not take part in this year's tournament.
