WOULD-BE SLAYER FAILS

ATTEMPT TO KILL EX-WIFE AND SELF FRUITLESS.

Pendleton Man in Hospital and Will Face Serious Charge When Released.

PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 12.—(Special.)—Thwarted in an effort to effect a reconciliation with his former wife, Mrs. Osla Weatherford, Charles A. Weatherford, a laborer, former resident of Arlington, Or., last night while intoxicated, it is said, attempted to shoot his divorced wife at her home here and then turned the weapon on himself.

Weatherford is in a local hospital with a bullet in his back, but is not seriously wounded, it is said. Mrs. Weatherford was not injured beyond burns inflicted on her neck by powder.

Mrs. Weatherford obtained a divorce July 16 and is said now to be supporting four children by her labor at a local laundry. The court found in pending a decision in her divorce complaint that Weatherford had twice threatened her life if she did not return to him.

Weatherford will be arrested on a charge of assault with intent to kill as soon as he is released from the hospital, according to Deputy District Attorney Randall.

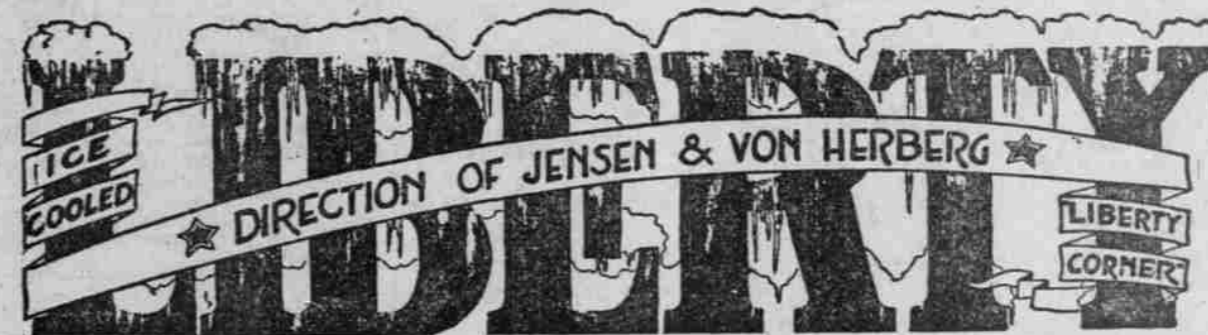
