

# IRELAND'S FATE MAY BE DECIDED TODAY

Parliament to Discuss British Offer in Secret.

## LEADERS STILL RESOLUTE

Nothing Less Than Independence for Ireland Will Be Acceptable, Declares De Valera.

DUBLIN, Aug. 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Dail Eireann will go into secret session tomorrow to discuss the British government's proposals for peace with the reiterated words of Eamon de Valera still fresh in the minds of its members: "The Dail Eireann cannot and will not on behalf of Ireland, accept the terms offered."

"At the second session of the parliament held today in the Mansion house, Mr. de Valera again dealt with the British offer. Again he insisted that nothing less than independence for Ireland was in the minds of the Irish leaders. He stressed his viewpoint that the status of a dominion government had not been made to Ireland. The statement that such a government had been offered contained two falsehoods, he said. There was no Ireland mentioned in the terms, only two broken pieces of Ireland dominions had the right to accede, but the Irish republic must stay within the empire whether it desired to do so or not, he said.

During his address Mr. de Valera held out the olive branch to Ulster by declaring that in the negotiations for a settlement of the controversy northern Ireland need not give up its own point of view. He said he would be willing to suggest that the Irish people give up a good deal in order that Ireland might be able to view the future "without anticipating distracting internal problems."

### Ulster's Support Desired.

Mr. de Valera declared again that the claims of the minority in Ireland, as represented by the Ulsterites, were unreasonable, but added that he for one would be ready to go a long way to give in to Ulster "if we could get them to come with us and consider the interest of their own country and not be allying themselves with foreigners."

Everywhere these words of Mr. de Valera with regard to Ulster were received as an indication that events were developing behind the scenes, having as their purpose the bringing of Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, into touch with the Sinn Fein leaders in the hope of securing the means of surmounting the present impasse.

Mr. de Valera said the Irish nation did not stand between England and the world and was not shutting up the seas between the two islands.

"We have no quarrel with England," he declared. "At least if this question were settled, I believe there would be none. The only enemy is to that rule which the Irish people hate to the marrow of their bones."

### "Irish People Won't Flinch"

It was said, remarked the republican leader that the Irish question was a problem. It was a problem, he declared—a problem of a powerful selfless person wishing to encroach upon the rights, the property and the freedom of his neighbors. That was the fundamental problem to be settled. Human nature had to be taken into consideration, he pointed out, and they who were working for a complete and final settlement were to see to it that relations must be justified on the basis of right. Therefore, in considering the problem, they who had fought on their side, he said, must count.

"The Irish people won't flinch now, because more arms are being sent for," he declared.

The public meeting of the Dail Eireann was adjourned this afternoon to an indefinite date. Private sessions will be held in the meantime, beginning tomorrow.

Interest in the meeting of the parliament continued unabated today, many people coming in from the country to witness one of the greatest events in the history of Ireland. Dublin was as animated as it was last week, when the horse show was held, but today's visitors were of an entirely different class. Law-abiding horsemen and society folk were here, while this week priests, farmers, small shop keepers from villages and Irish politicians crowded the streets.

An entirely fresh audience attended the session in the Mansion house today, it having been decided to issue no tickets each day, so as to satisfy the demands of the thousands who want to attend the sessions.

### Some Differences Noted.

It was understood before the session that the members of the Dail Eireann would discuss privately the possibility of inducing Ulster to join southern Ireland, or as an alternative, excepting the status of a separate dominion. A wide difference of opinion appeared to prevail.

Charles Burgess, minister of defense, and the most fluent speaker in the assembly, evoked a wave of applause, notwithstanding the prohibition by the speaker against such demonstrations, by the course of a short speech he said that naturally most of the work of his department was of a secret nature, but added "Our work against England already is done."

Countess Markievicz, minister of labor, and her substitute while the countess was in jail, told the assembly how the British labor department virtually had been deposed in Ireland and an opposition set up to settle all labor disputes. This organization, it was declared, already was working successfully.

Countess Markievicz said this department has in charge the boycott against Ulster and England, and added that except in a few places nothing made in Ulster or more definitely Belfast, now was on made in the southeast of Ireland, where even the branch of the Bank of Belfast had been closed. For hundreds of courts had been established to deal with this question, and certain government merchants who ignored the orders of the Dail Eireann had been fined \$100, while the English firms which had sent Belfast goods to Ireland as English goods had been placed on the blacklist.

### Drastic Action Withheld.

A certain amount of moral persuasion was required, the speaker said, to effect this, and she thanked the Irish republican army and the labor party, which had refused to handle Belfast goods for their assistance. Attention was called to the failures during the past year in Belfast, which, with the exception of a few, were the greatest in the history of that city. It was intended to take the boycott against England as effective as that against Belfast, the minister asserted, and in the

### meantime the truce did not mean that the boycott had been raised, but that at present "drastic action cannot be taken."

Minister of Home Affairs Cosgrave spoke concerning the steps that had been taken to create work for the people and to do away with workhouses. He said the Dail Eireann would be asked to vote authority for sums which the British government had refused to grant.

### TROOP RECALL PRECAUTION

Action of British Declared No Aggressive Movement.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—Masses of British troops on leave to their units in Ireland, announced yesterday, were stated in official circles here today to be purely of a precautionary nature.

It was claimed that the move was not aggressively precautionary because the last thing the British government would do would be to take steps to break the Irish truce.

## FOOD HELD PARAMOUNT

LENINE WOULD SUBORDINATE EVERYTHING ELSE.

"By Any and All Means," Says Russ Soviet Leader, "We Must Increase Food Production."

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Nikolai Lenin, the Russian soviet premier, is quoted by the official bolshevik organ, Pravda of Moscow, in its issue of July 16, last, as having declared in a discussion of the famine conditions in Russia: "We are living under conditions of such destitution, ruin, overstrain and exhaustion of the principal productive resources of the peasants and workers that we have temporarily to subordinate everything else to this one fundamental consideration: by any and all means to increase the amount of food production."

Describing conditions in the basic industries, the newspaper says: "The Donets basin, the main source of our coal supply, is painfully tottering to its fall. After passing 33,000,000 pounds in March, the output sank to 13,000,000 pounds in June. "No better is the condition of our metallurgical industry. A steadily increasing number of factories are being shut down and a growing number of furnaces are being extinguished. The percentage of workers failing to report for duty takes a sudden forward jump, being 39 per cent on an average. It is perfectly obvious that our whole industry is on the brink of a catastrophe."

# MURDER OF PRIEST PROBED BY CORONER

Jury Makes No Mention of William A. Hightower.

## PRISONER IS EXAMINED

Criminologists Test Pressure of Suspect's Blood and Rhythm of Heart Beats.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—The verdict of the coroner's jury which today investigated the death of Rev. Patrick Healin, Colma priest, made no mention of William A. Hightower, itinerant baker, held on a charge of murder.

The verdict said: "We find that Father Patrick Healin came to his death either by blows on the head which fractured his skull, or by two gunshot wounds, either one of which was sufficient to cause death."

There were only two witnesses at the inquest, Dr. John H. Clark, autopsy surgeon, and S. A. Landini, constable of Colma, who was a member of the party led by Hightower to the priest's grave on Salada beach, 30 miles south of San Francisco.

Duncan Matheson, San Francisco captain of detectives, said today the police had dismissed the idea that Dolly Mason, who, Hightower said, furnished the clue to the location of the priest's grave, is a living personality. They now advance the theory that Dolly Mason was the creation of Hightower's mind and was given many of the attributes of Doris Shirley, formerly his companion.

### Doctors Examine Hightower.

Scientific tests of Hightower's blood, respiration and heart beats, in order to determine if such tests indicated any criminal tendencies, were conducted today by August Vollmer, chief, and Dr. J. A. Larsen, medical adviser of the Berkeley police department, at the instance of the San Francisco Call and Post.

The tests were made with what is known as a sphygmomanometer, which records the slightest variations in the heart throbs and blood pressure of the subject, thus registering the changing emotions. Other scientific instruments highly developed by criminologists also were used.

The instruments revealed, the investigators said, that Hightower has a normal blood pressure of 120 millimeters of mercury; that he was seized with an "initial fear" when the instruments were first placed in operation; that he quickly regained control of his heart beats after a score or more of psychiatric questions calculated to put him at his ease were asked; and that suddenly his heart jumped when the question "did you murder Father Healin?" was put to him pointblank.

The body then was returned to the hospital.
