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WATER APPLICATION LISTED.—The application of the Powell Valley water district to obtain a supply of Bull Run water for the city of Portland at the city limits has been placed upon the calendar to be taken up by the council next Wednesday. Commissioner Bigelow and Mayor Baker declared in a recent council session that they would stand by a previous resolution to the letter and refuse to grant water to the new district so long as it included within its assessment district the property of those who have already paid for a water supply through their subscription to the Section Line Water company.

MOTHER AND BABE DO WHIRL.—In spite of the fact that she sustained slight injuries in an automobile accident an hour before she gave birth to a boy, Mrs. S. D. Plummer, 68 Buchtel avenue, will suffer no ill consequences, according to attending Good Samaritan hospital, where she is confined. The mother and baby were said to be in fine health last night. Mrs. Plummer was injured when the ambulance which was taking her to the hospital turned over in a collision with another machine on East Burnside street. Mrs. Plummer underwent a Caesarian operation immediately upon her arrival at the hospital.

COMPLAINTS HELD PAUSE.—Complaints of property owners who have been recently completed on East Eighth street, between Dekum and Almsworth avenues, was of poor quality are not being out by an inspection of the work, according to Commissioner Bigelow. NEW REED MEN ARRIVE

NOTED EDUCATORS WILL JOIN COLLEGE FACULTY.

Registration of 300 Students Expected Upon Opening of Enrollment, September 12.

The arrival of two of the ten new members of the faculty of Reed college during the past week marks the beginning of the new academic year. The two professors who have arrived are Dr. William Dailum Wallis, formerly of the University of California, who will take the chair of political and social science, and Dr. Barry Reed, newly appointed professor of comparative literature, who comes to Reed college from the University of Wisconsin.

Dr. Wallis, an authority on anthropology, is an educator well known on the Pacific coast. His bachelor's degree was earned in Dickinson college, Pennsylvania, from where he went to Oxford as a Rhodes scholar, and to the state of Maryland. He received his doctor's degree from the University of Pennsylvania, and is a member of the faculty of that institution for some time.

Dr. Barry Reed arrived in the city on Friday and was the guest of Richard F. Scholz, president of Reed college, during the day. He formerly held an important chair in the college of literature in the University of Wisconsin.

Other additions to the 1921-22 faculty who are expected to arrive in Portland shortly are Dr. Edward O. Sisson, former president of the University of Montana; Dr. Edward Chittick, professor of English at the University of Washington; and Dr. J. H. Thompson, professor of biology of the University of Pittsburgh, and Anton Fredrick, from the department of economics of the University of Chicago.

President Scholz said yesterday that registration for the coming year, which will begin on September 12, was expected to reach 300 students. Applications of 270 have already been received, and a fair waiting list is reported.

Several teams have been given by the various societies in honor of the high school graduates preparing to enter the different colleges and universities on the coast. NOTED DRUG ADDICT HELD AS VAGRANT

Police Say Prisoner Answers Description of Burglar.

MAN'S CAREER PITIFUL

Wife Said to Have Died From Use of Narcotics After Learning Habit From Husband.

Arthur Test, drug addict, whose use of narcotics caused his wife to learn the habit, and resulted in her death from an overdose of morphine, was arrested yesterday by inspectors Coleman and Collins. The police said he answered the description of a man who recently committed a number of house burglaries, and suspected that he had taken to theft to obtain money for the purchase of drugs. A tentative charge of vagrancy was filed against him.

Test, whose past life is known to the entire police force, was arrested in company with Louis Dorris, another known drug addict. Both were held for court action this week. Test's life story is one of the most amazing and pitiful chapters in the world records of the Portland underworld. Educated, refined, and son of a respected Seattle family, Test became addicted to the use of drugs during an extended illness. At a sanitarium where he was confined, he fell in love with his nurse. A few years later they were married. As time sped on, Test became the father of two children, a boy and a girl.

Second Illness Comes.

But another illness several years after his marriage caused Test to succumb to the craving for drugs. Once more, the faithful wife nursed him back to health, and the little family was held intact.

Soon the old craving returned, and Test could not withstand the appeal of the narcotic. He became an addict after time his wife pleaded with Judge Rossman in municipal court for his release, promising to do her best to break him from the habit which was tearing him down.

Two years later, Mrs. Test made her last appeal for her husband. The bloom of health had fled from her face. Her two children were poorly dressed and showed every evidence of lack of nourishment. On Judge Rossman's advice, Mrs. Test left her husband, and with her babies returned to her people in the state of Washington.

Narcotics Kill Woman.

Nothing was heard of the Tests after that last court appearance for nearly a year. Then one night the police received word that a woman was dying in one of the evil little north end dives. Investigation showed this woman to be Mrs. Test. She had died of an over-dose of narcotics.

With her tragic death, the final chapter of this life tragedy had been revealed. Her love for her husband had been too strong. Leaving her children with her people near Seattle, Mrs. Test had returned to Portland to be with her husband. Because he was an addict, she, too, became one. Deceitfully and by choice she became an outcast just for the sake of being with the man she loved.

News Causes Hysterics.

One of the most tense and dramatic moments witnessed in police court was when Judge Rossman broke the news of Mrs. Test's death to her husband. The man was in a semi-raving condition through the excessive use of drugs. As Judge Rossman told Test of his wife's death in the north end resort, the husband threw back his head and burst out in a hysterical laughter. He was still laughing when the jailer escorted him away.

Since the death of his wife, Test has been arrested periodically for the use of drugs. News has been given by the police that he has been suspected of theft, but as the narcotics destroy his will power and stamina, he is beginning to dip into petty crime, according to the police.

As a drug addict, they say he is beyond all hope of reformation. If he insists, just a bit of life's riotous which soon will be washed up on the beach and forgotten.
