TOURISTS FAR AWAY HEAR OF PORTLAND'S AUTO CAMP

City Is Advertised by Thousands of Travelers Pouring in and Out. Crest of Eastern Traffic Reaches Grounds.

A ROUND twilight gatherings, where tourists mingle along the highways north, south and east, the Portland auto camp ground and the city are being advertised by the thousands of automobiles that have poured in and out at the rate of 300 or more a week throughout the summer.

"We heard of your camp ground a long while before we got here," said a man from Chicago yesterday. "Others carried the same story and the camp ground, which has cared for several thousand automobiles and many more thousands of tourists in its first year, will be the mecca of many who hear of it too late to make the call this year."

The crest of the eastern tourists traffic has reached the camp now and more tourists are about the grounds than at any time this season, according to those in charge. A great many from the east arrived early in the season, but most of them were tourists who had wintered in California. Now the reverse is true, for many intend to swing back "home," whether that means Oregon, Texas, or winter, a great many are planning to reach some point in California to stop for a while before they return home. Others are planning to locate either temporarily or permanently in Oregon.

"We've been on the road since May 23 and we didn't know what a real highway was till we struck the Columbia highway," declared J. R. Martin, who arrived in camp late Saturday. "We have had a hard time of it, but the American Rockies and all the rest, but for scenery and real beauty the Columbia highway has them all beaten."

Mr. Martin and his wife do not claim any place as their home, but expect that Portland or Eugene will be, at least for the winter. Since May 23, when they left Walla Walla, they have toured British Columbia, Alberta, Montana, Idaho and Washington, and have just come into Oregon. In Alberta they investigated the oil fields above the Peace river, miles and miles beyond the beach of railroads and highways that are open for motor travel. The oil fields have brought a great rush and the railroad is pushing out to tap them. Mr. Martin says. A great many wells are drilling, and a few small wells are already producing.

The Martins have heard much of Eugene as a place to live but are wavering since they have seen the land, for they like it here. They have visited practically all of the camp grounds in the northwest and compared with any of them, although some have been established longer have more permanent equipment.

Oregon's roads are coming to the fore and the amount of new con-

struction indicates that the state is forging ahead in this respect, declares H. C. Bucey, house-mover and contractor of Beach, Corvallis. Oregon will soon learn with California that the concrete pavement is the only one that will stand the truck and regular highway traffic, he believes. The new highway that Los Angeles is building to San Pedro is concrete paving 32 feet wide, with a 12-inch thickness in the center and eight inches on the edges. It is designed to carry the heavy auto truck freight service that connects Los Angeles with her seaport.

Mr. and Mrs. Bucey are making their first tour in a number of years. Before coming north to Oregon they visited Lake Tahoe and spent some time over the border in Nevada. They intended to come by way of Klamath Falls to Crater Lake, but turned back on account of bad roads and came by way of Medford. They probably will return home, after they spend a few days around Portland.

The six in all, in a small car, with 1100 pounds of baggage in a trailer behind, have found no trouble thus far on the road, and in spite of all their friends told them on the start, it is San Diego or bust with them, and they do not intend to throw overboard a pound of weight.

Nine neighbors from over the line in Vancouver, B. C., arrived at the Portland auto camp in the cars yesterday en route to visit friends in the Dallas. Everything was lovely there till the approaching automobile is stopped. He then ambles around to the side of the car and thrusts out an inquisitive nose to see what may be of use to him in the car. A few peanuts or candy or a good handful of meat in the car will satisfy him, and he backs away with- out further ado.

DEATH IS MYSTERIOUS

ALCOHOLISM OR NARCOTICS USE SUSPECTED.

Coroner to Hold Autopsy Over Body of H. D. Hadley, Stricken on Lawn of Hospital.

Either acute alcoholism or a reaction from long continued use of narcotics caused the death of H. D. Hadley at Good Samaritan hospital early yesterday, in the opinion of the coroner's office. An autopsy over the body will be held today to determine the exact cause of death.

Hadley, who was about 30 years old, was stricken suddenly as he was sitting on a bench on the lawn of the Good Samaritan hospital grounds late Saturday. He was with Mrs. Helen Hadley, 509 Irving street, at the time. The woman called a nurse to his assistance and he was removed to the hospital, where he died shortly afterward.

Mrs. Celmer was held by the police until yesterday morning, when she was released, after the coroner had completed his examination. She told police detectives she had met Hadley for the first time on Saturday night and had been to Council Crest with him.

Little is known of Hadley or his past whereabouts. Mrs. Celmer said he told her he had come to Portland recently from Seattle. He told her he was engaged in smuggling operations, she said.

THE OAKS TO CLOSE SOON

Special Programme Is Being Arranged for Labor Day.

With special attractions billed for next Sunday and Monday, the Oaks, Portland's outdoor amusement park on the river, will close the summer season with what has been declared to be a record attendance which exceeds that of any since the war.

He landed in a series of jumps, and he cut away from this and made use of a white parachute. For the last 1000 feet he used a blue one. He landed in the park without trouble.
