 standards. Mr. McClellany was fined

SCULPTOR IS REVEALED

DR. E. R. BUSH CARVES WOMAN'S FIGURE ON BOULDER.

Mazamas on Visit to Crater Lake Are Mystified by Work of Art Found on Rock.

"The Lady of the Woods," a figure of a woman carved on a boulder near Crater lake, is not a mystery to Dr. E. R. Bush, who made the figure in the summer of 1917. The rock has been visited this summer by Mazamas who searched for some mark to learn the author of the work of art.

Dr. Bush is now in the United States health bureau in Cincinnati, according to Mr. Miller. Dr. Bush was at Crater lake in the summer of 1917, while a doctor in the United States engineers and was in charge of the health of all the men working on the construction of the road around the rim of Crater lake.

"The tools with which he chiseled out the figure were made by the blacksmith in charge of the work-
 shop," said Mr. Miller yesterday. "The doctor did the carving at odd moments. He chose the secluded spot a mile and a half south of the lodge at Crater lake in which to do his work, so that he would not be disturbed."

Dr. Bush had never done any work in sculpture before, according to one of his friends, who says that the figure is remarkably lifelike. He did the work in six weeks and it was not until nearly the end of that period that the men at the camp learned of the task, which he had carried on in secret.

A detailed description of the statue by Anne Shannon Monroe was printed last Sunday in The Oregonian.

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BLIND SCHOOL IS ROBBED

CARS WILL BE REROUTED

MT. TABOR, SUNNYSIDE AND BROOKLYN LINES TO REOPEN.

Service Over Morrison Bridge Will Be Resumed Tomorrow Morning on East Side.

Portland Railway, Light & Power company officials announced last night that beginning with the regular service tomorrow morning the cars on the Mount Tabor, Sunnyside and Brooklyn lines will be restored to their regular route, via the Morrison bridge. The Sunnyside and Mount Tabor cars have been operating a shuttle service on the west side during the closure of the Morrison span.

In order to tamper somewhat the inevitable congestion that will result on the Morrison bridge, the street car company has decided to continue the diversion of the Montavilla cars over the Burnside bridge for the time being.

There are likely to be several readjustments of street railway service routes on account of the closing of the Hawthorne bridge, but these changes will be made only as traffic conditions require.
