LOGGERS GET MAGAZINES

Captain John Anderson Ships 50 Boxes to Lumber Camps.
 Captain John Anderson, originator and manager of the Anderson system, yesterday shipped 50 boxes of magazines out of Portland to the logging camps throughout the state and Washington. Each box contained about 150 magazines, collected in the boxes placed about the city. This is the first shipment Mr. Anderson has made since June 28. He said shipments were temporarily discontinued because many of the camps were closed during the summer. They are now reopening and calls are flowing in to the Anderson system for reading material for the men. Another shipment of 62 boxes will be made again next week.

Captain Anderson said the boxes on the city streets are not filling up as rapidly as they have in the past, due, he believes, to the fact that people were out of the city for the summer rather than to any decline in interest.

18,000 PEOPLE VISIT MOTOR CAMP GROUNDS THIS SEASON

Travel Slacking Up—"Autobungalofer," Unique Vehicle, Parks Here. Attendants Have Time Keeping Peripatetic Merchants Away.

 THE number of machines at the municipal auto camp was 215, which shows that the season is drawing to a close, for, with the exception of one day in June, this was the lowest number on the grounds since the opening. All told 4500 machines have camped there since May 9, when the grounds were really formally opened. So about 41 machines a day have been received there. It is estimated that four persons in the motor camp are kept busy at the entrance, which shows that about 18,000 people have visited the camp since the opening. The grounds are a rule more than 50 per cent of them have gone away with the kindest of feelings for the people of Portland.

The autobungalofer is the most unique traveling vehicle that has been here during the season, and other campers who have passed and been passed by it on the road during the trip say that it stands alone for its novelty and luxurious fittings. It is a bungalow, 8 by 17 feet, and has all the comforts of a high-class residence. It is mounted on a two-ton truck. It comes from Cedar Falls, Ia., and is owned by the Ley brothers, who built it. It is said it took three men 90 days to make it and the furnishings. There are seven passengers traveling in it, the Ley brothers, their wives and three children. It left here Monday morning on its way to California.

Not much publicity has been given to P. M. Keane, who has charge of the camping grounds, or to his assistants, O. R. Cady, the night man, and D. J. Durand, assistant in charge. These three men have been on the job since the old camp opened last year. When they came to the grounds, which were vacated in May, the best of order has at all times been observed. The grounds have been kept neat and clean, no peddlers or solicitors have been admitted on the grounds and no handbills allowed to be distributed. All of this has required constant watchfulness and good management. In one instance a flock of 1000 geese came to the grounds with a few dozen chickens concealed in his machine and began selling them. His business was soon put to a stop. And he had to rent a pretty good outfit for making edge tools, and they set up their forge and hammer on the grounds. When expatriated with the manager said one of their number had just taken a \$50 automobile broke into a room at the rear of the store.

The little town of Fontanelle, Ia., is shy five automobiles and 13 citizens, and as the town has a population of only 85, that is equal to Portland losing more than 300 citizens. She sends in a weekly report to the Fontanelle Observer, giving a full account of their week's doings.  Resolution Adopted by Veterans of Summer Post Advises Suppression of Organization.
 "A rank, un-American and un-American order, a menace to national institutions and calculated to hinder and obstruct the due process of law" was the opinion of the Ku Klux Klan held by veterans of summer post of the Grand Army of the Republic as expressed in a resolution just adopted by that organization.

"Hundreds of secret and open cold-blooded murders of law-abiding citizens were committed by the Ku Klux Klan, according to history, through a period of years," asserted the resolution. "The Klan practiced lawlessness, night raids, shocking violence, and jealously utter defiance of law."

In conclusion Summer post "strongly condemned" the Ku Klux Klan and would warn all good people to beware of the deception practiced by paid agents of the K. K. K. and would recommend suppression of the Klan by law, "possible."
