

5 KILLED, 1 MISSING IN MINERS' BATTLE

Officers and Volunteers Clash With Armed Gangs.

DEPUTY SHERIFF IS SLAIN

Heavy Fighting Kept Up in West Virginia District—State Forces Establish Field Hospital.

LOGAN, W. Va., Aug. 31.—Hostilities continued today between forces of armed men who had been collecting on the eastern slope of Spruce Fork ridge and the thousands of more deputy sheriffs and volunteers who had been called to aid officers of Logan county. Despite President Harding's proclamation ordering the insurgents to retire peacefully to their homes by noon on September 1, I am sending General H. H. Bandholtz with instructions to report to me the extent to which the order of the president is obeyed. In case it becomes necessary to send federal troops, this officer is designated to command them.

"I very earnestly hope it may not become necessary to employ federal troops. If they are used it will be to restore peace and order in the most effective and prompt way. The problem will be regarded by the military authorities purely as a tactical one."

INSTRUCTIONS GIVEN GENERAL
Bandholtz Ordered to Carry Out
Harding's Proclamation.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—Final instructions were given by Secretary Weeks to Brigadier-General H. H. Bandholtz, who has been ordered by the war department to the West Virginia coal fields to observe the response to Harding's proclamation calling on all persons engaged in "unlawful and insurrectionary proceedings" to return to their homes by tomorrow noon.

UNFAIR TACTICS CHARGED

U. S. Trade Commission Com- mences Case Under Laws Regu- lating Interstate Commerce.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 31.—The Federal Trade Commission has formally charged with unfair competition and monopolistic policies "combined and conspired to suppress competition in interstate commerce in motion picture films," according to summaries of the official complaint filed today.

TAX LEVY TO BE SMALL

CLARKE COUNTY RECEIPTS CUT DOWN
Taxpayers' Burden.
VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—The cost of operation of the various county offices for the past year indicates that the tax levy necessary to maintain these offices next year will be but 3.5 mills. This small amount is due largely to the profits coming from the auditor's and clerk's offices.

The expense lists filed today will be used to prepare the budget for the coming year, and the matter of the budget will come before the county commissioners at their next meeting. The expense of the auditor, clerk, sheriff, engineer, superintendent of schools, prosecuting attorney, commissioners, justice court, constable and superior court offices totals \$106,771.

The auditor, clerk, sheriff, treasurer, justice and constable offices are the six productive ones of the county and these show a total of \$38,523 in receipts.

The difference between expenses and receipts must be met by taxation based on an assessed valuation of \$18,000,000, making a requirement of a 3.5 mill tax, it was announced today.

CONCRETE WORK FINISHED
Work on Big Overhead Railway
Crossing Near Eugene Progresses.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—The concrete work on the big overhead crossing where the main line of the Southern Pacific crosses the Pacific highway at McVeigh point, four miles south of Eugene, is practically completed and the wooden forms are being removed. It is said to be one of the highest structures of its kind in the state and will be one of the most important.

The outfit of the contractors who have the job of making the extensive fills at either end of the structure is on the ground. The work of the contractors is expected to be completed in the fall.

TARIFF ON HIDES REVIVED

FIGHT IS OPENED IN SENATE

FOR 25 PER CENT DUTY. Representative of Cattlemen Tells Finance Committee Makers of Shoes Are Profiteering.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 31.—The fight for a tariff on hides, a provision of the Fordney bill killed by the house, was opened today before the finance committee of the senate.

Cattlemen, through Frank E. McClain, Lancaster, Pa., vice-president of the National Livestock exchange, asked the committee for a tariff of 25 to 30 per cent instead of the 15 per cent duty voted down by the house.

Asked if a 25 per cent duty would reduce the cost of shoes to the consumer, the witness declared it ought not to raise the price 5 cents a pair. He followed this with a charge that shoe manufacturers were making exorbitant profits, declaring that shoes to "fit a 2-year-old child cost the farmer more than he gets for the hide from his bound stock."

"Talk about normalcy," Mr. McClain asserted, "there can be no normalcy, no dawn of a new day, until the dollar of the farmer buys for him the same as the dollar which he takes for what he sells."

Tariff questions had their last hearing for several days before the committee today, and the committee prepared to take up the house revenue bill tomorrow.

The tax measure will hold the center of the stage until final committee action has been taken and is ready for the senate. Leaders said it would be possible to complete committee action in two weeks, although the plan contemplates only having the bill ready for submission when the senate reconvenes September 21.

No open hearing on taxes have been announced, the committee intending to work behind closed doors. Secretary Mellon has been asked to prepare a new tax program announced yesterday by Senator Smoot, republican, Utah.

FREIGHT RATE REDUCED

Nitro-Cellulose Takes Lower Rate From East to West.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 31.—A reduction from \$4.66 1/2 to \$4.08 a hundred pounds has been declared by all rail carriers for nitro-cellulose moving from eastern to western points. It was announced today by G. W. Luce, freight traffic manager of the Southern Pacific company.

A westbound rate on roofing slate of \$1.92 a hundred from New York, \$1.75 from Pittsburgh, \$1.68 from Cincinnati and \$1.58 from Chicago and St. Louis has been declared also, he said. The date on which the rates become operative has not been announced.

WOMEN CONFEREES URGED

Washington State Arms Committee Ask President to Act.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 31.—Active participation by women in the disarmament conference was urged today by President Harding in a communication Tuesday from the newly organized Washington state committee for reduction of armament in session here.

The petition asked that a woman sit as a delegate to the conference, and that a woman serve on every committee appointed.

"As darkness fell a crowd of unionists congregated in Denmark street and attacked nationalist residents of Stanhope and adjacent streets. The result was a desperate conflict. Police armored cars were dispatched to the scene, but it was 11 o'clock before peace was restored."

GREEKS GAIN ADVANTAGE

Turkish Army's Second Defense Line Being Stormed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 31.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Greek troops in Asia Minor have broken through the second defense line of the Turkish nationalist army, which has lost its initiative of the last few days, and the Greeks have crossed the Sakaria river.

Certain contingents of the Greeks also have crossed the Iliza river and are storming the second Turkish defense line.

The Greek advance in the Salt desert, temporarily held up recently due to lack of water, has been resumed. Violent fighting is taking place.

HOP PICKING UNDER WAY

Annual Harvest in Willamette Valley Is in Progress.

BROOKS, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—With all the enthusiasm that characterized hop picking "before the war," and incidentally the prohibition, the annual harvest began Monday throughout the Willamette valley.

There is not an over supply of pickers as yet, owing to the fact that many are finishing up the evergreen berry picking and others are waiting to go to the prune yards, which will run neck and neck with the hops, while the grain harvest still occupies the male element of workers.
