## TILDEN NET MASTER IN TOURNEY CLASSIC

40th Annual Singles Titular Event of Nation Opened.

NEER WINS HIS MATCH

More Than 100 of World's Bes Tennis Players Gathered at Philadelphia for Play.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 9.—Rapid-fire eliminations marked the initial play in the 40th annual singles cham-pionship tournament of the United States Lawn Tennis association here today. Fifty-odd matches were played and but one upset marked the progress of the leading racquet wielders of America and Australasia in the second and third rounds. A majority of the matches were won in three straight sets.

Play opened promptly at noon. An overcast sky and a humid, sultry breeze confronted William T. Tilden II, world's champion, and Irving C. Wright of Boston.

100 Players on Hand. More than 100 of the world's best tennis players were gathered for the

Tilden romped through his match with Wright with a loss of but one game, the scores being 6-0, 6-0, 6-1. The champion was completely master of the play at all times, and appeared to be in excellent form.

The outstanding surprise of the afternoon was the defeat of Norman Peach, captain of the Australas in Davis cup team by W. W. Ingraham of Providence, R. I. Peach, who was expected to advance as far as a match with R. Norris Williams, ex-national champion, fell before the racquet prowess of a player still in his teens. Ingraham proved entirely too fast and accurate in both his service, stroking and placing for Peach.
