

NORTHWEST VISITED BY BRIEF COLD SNAP

Fair and Warmer Forecast
for Oregon Today.

SUNDAY NIGHT CHILLY

Portlanders Reach for More Bed-
ding When Mercury Drops to
47 Degrees Minimum.

A cold snap, as short-lived as it was unexpected, visited the northwest early yesterday, reduced temperatures below freezing at several points, and broke a number of records for early frigidity. Fair and warmer weather today over the entire state of Oregon was predicted last night by Edward L. Wells, district forecaster.

While Portlanders were reaching for more bedding Sunday night in a minimum temperature of 47 degrees, the mercury dropped to 23 degrees at Baker. This is the lowest temperature ever recorded there in September. Yakima, Wash., and Helena, Mont., both experienced a temperature of 20 degrees, or two points below freezing, while an even 22 degrees was recorded at Salem, Or., and Havre, Mont.

The damage from the cold snap, in Mr. Wells' opinion, will be slight and will be confined to tender young garden truck, such as corn and tomatoes.

HOOD RIVER SQUASH HURT

Much Tender Vegetation Is Re-
ported to Have Been Killed.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Sept. 12.—(Special).—A minimum temperature of 30 degrees, the lowest recorded for early September, was reported last night by Superintendent Childs of the Hood River experiment station. Squash and tomato vines of lower valley gardens were damaged. In the upper valley, where the temperature was 2 degrees lower, all tender vegetation was killed. The district's large potato crop, however, it was said, was far enough matured to prevent damage. The frost, apple growers declared, will be beneficial in that it will result in better coloring of the apples.

No frost prevailed in the Columbia lowlands, where the community's heavy truck gardens are located.

WALLA WALLA FROST HEAVY

Tender Plants and Vegetables Are
Killed by Cold.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Sept. 12.—While the low temperature announced by the weather bureau was 36, a heavy frost early this morning killed some of the tender plants and vegetables. Reports from the Blue mountains east of the city stated that there was a snowfall of about three inches yesterday.

The snow-capped hills are visible from this city. The temperature equals the minimum record for September 12 at the local station.

SALEM HAS 32 TEMPERATURE

Tomatoes and Other Late Vegetables Are Affected Slightly.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 12.—(Special).—The low temperature record here for the month of September, which had stood for 25 years, according to official weather records, was equaled last night when the mercury dropped to the freezing mark, 32 degrees above zero.

No serious damage, however, was reported in the vicinity of Salem. Tomatoes and other late vegetables were affected slightly.

Pendleton Mercury Hits 25.

PENDELTON, Or., Sept. 12.—(Special).—Pendleton experienced the coldest September weather recorded in the past eight years this morning when the thermometer dropped to 25 degrees, accompanied by a heavy frost, according to Major Moorhouse, official weather observer. The low mark followed two days and nights of unusual cold weather for this time of the year. The temperature dropped 57 during the day, but dropped with the setting sun, with indications of an even lower mark being recorded Tuesday morning.

Gardens at Heppner Hurt.

HEPPNER, Or., Sept. 12.—(Special).—With a temperature of 27 degrees this morning, Heppner experienced the coldest September morning in 25 years. Frank Gilliam, local weather observer, said he has never known such a freeze so early in the season. Vegetables and flower gardens were damaged. A heavy snow storm was reported yesterday on the Ditch creek divide, 55 miles south of Heppner.

Cold Sets Record at Yakima.

YAKIMA, Wash., Sept. 12.—Temperatures here last night dropped to 31 degrees, the coldest September weather since 1909, when it dropped to 29 on the last day of the month. Tomatoes and other vegetables were nipped, but no great amount of damage was done. Reports indicated that a severe windstorm early yesterday morning damaged apples, hay and corn in Terrace Heights, east of this city, and in the Buena, Zillah and Sunnyside districts below Union Gap.

Lane Garden Truck Damaged.

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 12.—(Special).—A frost last night damaged garden truck in some parts of Lane county. Tomato, pumpkin, squash, bean and other vines were nipped. This is one of the earliest killing frosts ever experienced here, the farmers say.

Clackamas Vines Ruined.

OREGON CITY, Or., Sept. 12.—An early frost in Clackamas county Sunday night did much damage to gardens in the Crescent and Redland districts. Cucumber vines and tomatoes were ruined.

GRAND OPERA in tabloid form occupies first place on the new bill at Pantages, and the owner of the circuit, Alexander Pantages, sponsors the group of vocalists, Mildred Perkins directs the act, in which seven singers take part. Scenes and selections from a half dozen operas are given, with the characters in costume. The offerings include "Brindisi," from "Traviata," with the chorus by the company; the prologue from "Pagliacci," by Umberto Ravera; the "Miserere," from "Trovatore," offered by Florence Wright and Umberto.

Little Tony dances and springs about like a jack-in-the-box and takes his life in his hands every instant. Wyse handles the little fellow as if he were a rubber ball, tossing him about and throwing him into the air. The young Tony is a smiling, happy chap and makes friends with his clever antics and delightful personality.

Joe Whitehead returns and is the big comedy moment on the bill. Joe is original and full of new ideas. He has a faculty of making the guest all that comes to his mind and every incident in the audience is turned to excellent account. He is billed as "A Fool There Was," and several have as much fun as the audience. Joe recites and sings and dances considerably better than the average.

The two Act sisters are splendid terpsichorean artists and in a series of unusually brilliant dance creations they employ original ideas in steps and costumes. The girls are pretty and peppery and they add acrobatic whirly that amaze.

King J. Saul is a versatile chap whose biggest claim to interest lies in the beautiful pictures that he paints before his spectators. The pictures are excellently drawn and an unique arrangement of lighting adds effectively to the charm and novelty.

HENDRICKSEN WILL VALID

UNDUE INFLUENCE HELD NOT EXERCISED BY PARTNER.

Relatives of Late Business Man
Loss Suit to Contest Distribution of \$112,000 Estate.

No undue influence was exercised by David Dahm on his partner, Thomas Emil Hendricksen, at the time the latter executed his last will and testament, decided Circuit Judge Taxwell yesterday, upholding the validity of the Hendricksen will against attacks made by a brother in Sweden and Portland nephews.

In the office of Dahm's attorney two days after he had signed a will leaving his partner approximately \$12,000, Hendricksen executed his last will, under the terms of which Dahm was bequeathed about \$65,000. This was the chief circumstance on which relatives charged that the sick man had been improperly influenced by Dahm in drawing the final instrument disposing of an estate valued at \$112,000.

Hendricksen and Dahm were partners in the tent and awning business at the time of the former's death, May 4, 1920, and had been associated together for many years. Hendricksen came to America from Norway in 1892 and never married.

The first will of Hendricksen was drawn September 29, 1919, and left virtually his entire estate to George and James Jacobsen, sons of a sister in Portland. On April 21, 1920, 15 days before his death from a cancer which had been threatening him for more than a year, a new will was drawn by Hendricksen in which his partner was bequeathed \$12,000. On April 23, 1920, he executed a third will, giving Dahm \$55,000, relatives \$42,000, and two faithful employees \$2,000 each.

Judge Taxwell held that contestants of the will did not substantiate charges of undue influence on the part of Dahm.

WEST TO GET UNIVERSITY

Location of Training School for ex-Service Men Promised.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 12.—One of the four large vocational training universities for ex-service men to be operated by the government will be located in the Pacific northwest, Charles R. Forbes, director of the federal veterans' bureau, announced upon his arrival here today on a tour of the west.

Mr. Forbes said he hoped to be able to announce detailed plans for the university and its location within the next few days.

The prowlers gained entrance to the house during the temporary absence of the family. R. R. Adams, 701 Tillamook street, awoke yesterday morning just as a burglar was starting to "jimmy" open a bedroom window. Mr. Adams flooded the house with light and called the police. A search revealed footprints in the soft earth below the window, but the burglar had made good his escape before the police reached the house.

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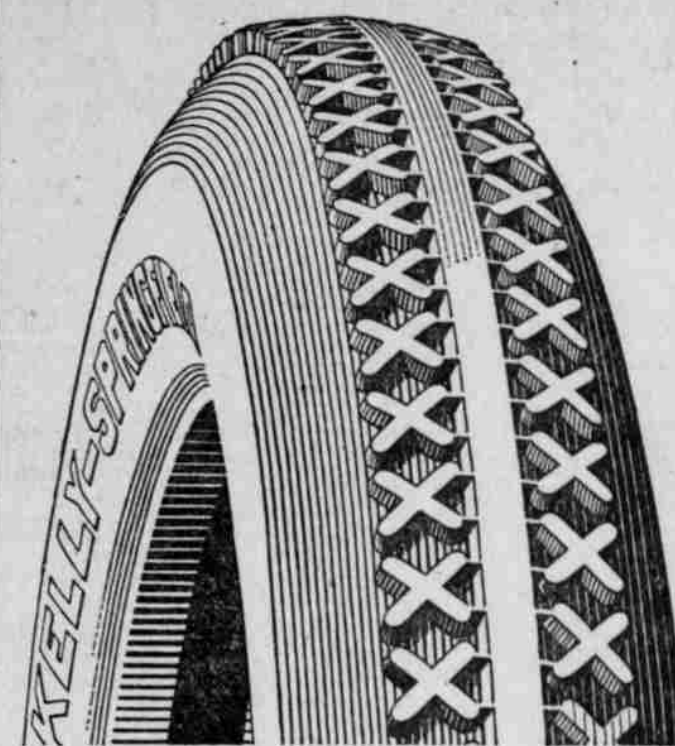
