Psychology LUNCHEON SUBJECT.—"Applied Psychology" will be the subject of an address by Mrs. Grace Palmer Craig at the weekly luncheon of the National Progress club to be held today, at 12:15 P. M. at the Portland hotel. Mrs. Craig has a wide reputation as a speaker and instructor in psychology. The National Progress club is one of the new luncheon clubs and recently has been established in Portland. The organization is nation-wide in its scope.

THOMAS' ADDRESS PUBLISHED.—The latest issue of the Journal of Education, published in Boston, contains the address delivered by George B. Thomas, school director, at the last meeting of the National Education association. Mr. Thomas' topic was "Vocational Education" and he used as an example of the value of this type of training the work done at the Benson Polytechnic high school in this city.

PARCELS OF ESTATE SOLD.—Last parcels of the estate of Herman Metzger, wealthy wool merchant who died in Portland in 1915, were sold from the courthouse steps yesterday morning for \$16,900.88 in satisfaction of mortgages held by the Ladd & Tilton bank. They were located in Multnomah, Josephine and Washington counties and were bought in by the Meier & Frank company.

NEIGHBORHOOD QUARREL.—As the result of a neighborhood quarrel, a warrant for the arrest of J. Potter, 532 Sixth street, was issued yesterday on the complaint of Morris Greenstein, who lives across the street, charging assault and battery. Greenstein declared that Potter threw over his head a brick which hit him in the eye with brass knuckles. Bail of \$500 was set.

EX-SERVICE MEN TO STUDY PLANTS.—Ex-service men taking up stationary engineering under the federal board for vocational education will be permitted to make a study of plants in the Multnomah and other county institutions, decided the county commissioners yesterday, ordering that county employees offer the young men every courtesy.

YOUTH ACCUSED OF LARCENY.—Earl B. Ciper, a youth with a fairly long misdemeanor record in the office of District Attorney Evans, was arrested yesterday in Seattle on a charge of larceny of an automobile. Ciper is accused of driving away with an automobile on which he had neglected to make final payments.

GAME LAW VIOLATOR FINED.—N. E. Stingley of Portland paid a fine of \$50 for killing and having in his possession a young deer, according to a report received yesterday at the office of the state game warden, Ed Walker, deputy game warden, made the arrest near Roseburg.

STILL IS SEIZED.—Joe Beeman, deputy sheriff, returned from a two weeks' vacation by ferretting out a 20-gallon still within one hour of reporting for duty yesterday morning. Beeman was telling the office force about the big ones that got away until about 9 o'clock yesterday morning. At 10 o'clock, he telephoned from a spot on Taylor's Ferry road for an automobile to take the remains of a still into the city. J. W. Maxwell was the proprietor of a 20-gallon outfit located by Beeman. One hundred and twenty gallons of mash were found, but only one gallon of finished product. Before noon, Maxwell had pleaded guilty to a bootlegging charge and had been fined \$200 by District Judge Bell.

TELEPHONE TO BE DEMONSTRATED.—The first public telephone demonstration in which all the intricate features of telephone exchanges are exposed, will be given tonight at the Sunnyside Methodist church, East Thirty-fifth and East Yamhill streets, in connection with an entertainment given by the employees of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company. The idea of staging telephone demonstrations was conceived in Detroit and so successful it has proved that employees of the company in Portland indicated a desire to attempt the same plan as the means of acquainting telephone users with the problems that go with giving telephone service.

QUEEN BACKS FAIR.—News of Oregon's determination to hold a world's exposition in Portland in 1925 is being spread by the queen of Rumania to Mayor Baker. The message read as follows: "May the Portland exposition of 1925 be crowned with great success and may it be the means of stimulating friendship and love between nations far and near. This message is sent as an expression of appreciation for the help Portland gave in the world war."

JOHNSTON FUNERAL TODAY.—Military funeral services will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock for A. G. Johnston, world war veteran, under the auspices of the Portland chapter of the Disabled American Veterans of the United States. The funeral will be held from the Gable Undertaking parlors at 1972 East Glisan street and interment will be made in the soldiers' sailors' and marines' burial plot in Mount Scott cemetery.

TELEPHONES TO BE REDUCED.—A preliminary survey in the city hall, made yesterday by city commissioner Pier, in charge of the finance department, has resulted in the elimination of sufficient telephones and extensions in the municipal building to effect a saving of \$100 a month. It is probable that even a few more telephones than those marked for removal will be eliminated. The next move planned by Commissioner Pier is the elimination of other leaks in the city hall, which he states are costing the city in the aggregate a considerable sum of money.

HIGHWAYMAN IS HELD.—Kenneth Kavanagh, confessed highwayman who held up the Lefty grocery store on Yamhill street late Saturday night, appeared before Municipal Judge Rossman yesterday and waived preliminary hearing on charges of assault and robbery. He was held to the state grand jury under \$2500.

Judge Kavanaugh Speaks at Members' Forum Programme.

"The constitution of the United States is the greatest charter of human liberty ever devised. It has stood the test of time and in it lies the hopes and the promise of the times to come."

LA GRANDE PUPILS GAIN.—Increase Is Declared Largest in History of Schools.

LA GRANDE, Or., Sept. 12.—(Special.)—What is probably the largest numerical increase in students in the history of La Grande schools on the opening day was registered today, when 1534 grade and high school students entered, this being 140 more than last year's first-day registration. The 1920 mark showed an increase of 71 over the previous year and this was considered at the time as an exceptional increase.

Of the increased registration, the high school had 62, a 25 per cent increase over last year's mark. There has been no increase in the number of teachers.

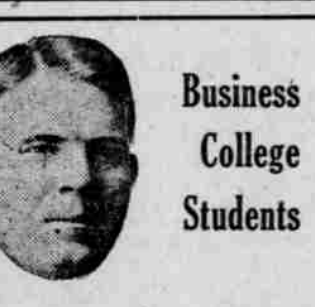
