

TREATY RATIFIED BY GERMANS THIS MORNING

Reichstag Almost Unit in Favor of Pact.

DEBATE DISPENSED WITH

Communists Alone Oppose Adoption of Resolution and Leader Fiercely Denounces Bill.

BERLIN, Sept. 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—Approval of the peace treaty with the United States was voted by the Reichstag today. Debate on the bill ratifying the treaty was dispensed with by agreement of all the parties except the communists, and thus but a few minutes were required for the proceedings when the treaty was reached on the day's calendar.

Herr Loeb, president of the Reichstag, asked if there were any objections to the bill, whereupon Walter Stoecker, communist, rushed to the speaker's stand and for five minutes indulged in a denunciation of the treaty, describing it as a mockery of President Wilson's "fourteen points," and as having been dictated by American capital. As none of the other parties desired to speak, the bill immediately passed all readings by a vast majority, which showed an overwhelming majority. The nationalists cast their votes for acceptance.

Herr Loeb thanked the house for promptly disposing of the issue and expressed gratification over the impending resumption of friendly relations with the last of Germany's numerous foes.

Nations Again Friends.

"By virtue of this resolution, normal relations between the two countries will be restored," he said. "I gladly take occasion to express satisfaction and further pending matters can now be settled by negotiation. I believe in a voice the great majority of the house, perhaps of all, in expressing the expectation that friendly relations between the United States and Germany, which were interrupted by the war, will henceforth and for all time remain undisturbed."

Loud cheering greeted Herr Loeb's speech.

Stoecker, in his denunciation of the treaty, declared: "The wicked, inhuman, and unchristianlike war caused American capitalism to enter the war from which it emerged with gigantic booty. What remains of President Wilson's famous 14 points, which European pacifists and the majority socialists extolled? The peace treaty with the United States is another dictate which the German bourgeoisie approves because it wants to shift the heavy burdens to the shoulders of the working classes."

Another Ordy Predicted.

"We reject the new dictate, not because we don't wish peace with the American nation, but because we deny the right of the German capitalist and bourgeois government to dictate the fate of the German workers. . . . The coming Washington conference, prating in smooth phrases on disarmament, will only serve to veil its true character; namely, partition of the booty among the bourgeois of New York, London, and Washington. We call on our American brethren to persevere in the fight on capitalism, which surely will break any agreement with the White House. What remains of the peace treaty? It is a dictate which will be another ordy of murder and slaughter."

TREATY ARGUMENTS LIMITED

One Hour Each to Be Allowed Senators in Debate.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 30.—An agreement was today reached to limit today to impose a debate time limit of one hour to each senator in consideration of the peace treaty with Germany, Austria and Hungary, beginning October 14, in order to expedite a vote on ratification. Under the agreement it is expected that the vote will be reached by October 14.

MEN PAID TO HUNT WORK

Salvation Army Places 175 in Positions in Few Days.

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—By paying jobless men \$1.50 a day to hunt for work, the Salvation Army in Chicago has placed more than 175 in positions during the last few days. Commissioner William Peart, organizer of the plan, announced that the plan favors men and clubs backing the plan furnish the money.

Many War Veterans Idle.

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 30.—Four hundred and seventy-nine posts of the American Legion have reported to the national headquarters here that 48,650 ex-service men are unemployed. It was announced at the legion unemployment conference which began today. The reports represent virtually every part of the union and show that the average per cent of unemployed ex-service men in these states is 21.5. The average for the nation was 32.5 per cent, the reports show.

LINN COUNTY PAVING UP

Meeting at Albany Favors More Good Roads Efforts.

ALBANY, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—That Linn county has never received near its share of state highway work was the idea emphasized at a meeting of the chamber of commerce here yesterday and plans were developed to try to relieve this condition. Local organizations, which the chamber demands to take up, operate with the state in the work, were blamed for the condition more than the state highway commission. Committees were named to take up with the commission the matter of completing the paving of the Pacific highway, and the other roads in the county besides one of the roads between Albany and Lebanon.

Part-time work by manufacturers, thus increasing the number of workers used by each plant.

Private houses, hotels, offices, etc., to contribute by doing their repairs, cleaning and alterations during the winter instead of in the spring, when employment would be more plentiful.

Municipalities to expand their

school, street, sewerage, repair work and public buildings to the fullest volume compatible with existing circumstances. As indicating the present favorable circumstances, the conference noted that more than \$700,000 of municipal bonds, the largest amount in history, has been sold in 1921. Governors to unite all state agencies in support of the mayors and expedite construction of roads, state buildings, etc.

Building Era Gives Work.

Federal authorities, including the federal reserve banks, to expedite the construction of public buildings and work covered by existing appropriations.

LEGION TO CARE FOR IDLE

21.5 Per Cent of ex-Service Men of Nation Unemployed.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 30.—The task of caring for the 900,000 unemployed ex-service men of the country will be taken over by the American Legion, it was announced today at a special unemployment conference at the legion headquarters here. The conference, which was called by Commander John G. Emery, was attended by national officers and members of the legion. The committee and presenters at the meeting showed that approximately 900,000 veterans were out of work two weeks ago. It was shown that 21.5 per cent of the ex-service men are unemployed, and that those employed had experienced an average cut in wages of 22.5 per cent since the war.

2 SUBSTITUTE TAX BILLS ARE OFFERED

Smoot and Simmons Put in Separate Measures.

MANUFACTURERS ARE HIT

Utah Senator Would Impose 3 Per Cent Impost on All Goods Ready for Use.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 30.—Two separate tax programmes as substitutes for most of the levy provisions in the pending revenue revision bill were presented today to the senate, one from the republican and one from the democratic side. Senator Smoot of Utah proposed: A manufacturers' sale tax of 3 per cent on articles as finally finished or produced for consumption for use.

Repeal of all of the special war taxes, of whatever nature, including the excess profits and transportation levies.

Retention of the existing 10 per cent income tax on corporations.

Senator Smoot proposed no change in the committee plan with respect to individual income taxes, or the existing tobacco, liquor and inheritance taxes.

Senator Simmons of North Carolina proposed:

A graduated income tax on corporations ranging from 12 1/2 to 25 per cent in lieu of the excess profits tax.

Restoration of the income surtax rates to a maximum of 52 per cent on incomes in excess of \$50,000.

Repeal of the transportation taxes on freight, passenger and Pullman accommodations.

Retention of the corporation capital stock tax.

Repeal of the \$2000 exemption allowed corporations.

That individual exemptions be confined to incomes below \$20,000.

Slight reductions in the normal rates on incomes below \$20,000.

Assault Made on Tax Bill.

Senator Simmons told the senate that if there could be an agreement for an equitable readjustment of the taxes so that the several groups of taxpayers would be on a parity, as proposed in the democratic programme, he personally would be willing to give serious consideration to a manufacturers' sale or consumption tax, properly safeguarded, as a substitute for all of the miscellaneous taxes imposed under the present law.

Opening a general assault on the republican tax bill, Senator Simmons of North Carolina, who is ranking democrat on the finance committee, charged that the revisions proposed by that committee were solely in behalf of the corporations and that the taxpayers whose net incomes exceeded \$66,000 a year.

Senator Simmons said that immediately after the armistice the tax laws were revised and reductions made in the taxes on individual incomes and corporations. Now, he added, it was proposed to make a further cut one-half in the amounts paid by corporations while the millions of people at large were paying the peak wartime rates.

Senator Smoot explained that his proposed sales tax would be in substitution for "all of the various war taxes, the excise taxes, luxury taxes, stamp taxes, capital stock tax, transportation, telegraph and insurance taxes, the taxes on soft drinks, ice cream, cosmetics, admissions and dues, and all of the other '57 varieties' of taxes which have been levied since January 1, under a series of amendments to the revenue revision bill introduced by the senator."
