

HARDING TO HONOR UNKNOWN WAR HERO

Cabinet Also Will March in Funeral Cortege.

ALL NATION TO PAUSE

Solemn Ceremonies to Be Observed and Body Will Be Laid to Rest in Virginia Hills.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 4.—Plans for the solemn ceremonies of Armistice day, when the nation will pay highest honors to its unknown dead of the great war, reached a climax today when President Harding and his cabinet decided to make a foot up Pennsylvania avenue at the head of the funeral cortege.

By presidential proclamation, the business and pleasure of the nation will stand at rest two minutes that day in tribute to the dead as the body from a lonely, nameless grave in some great struggle of the war is carried to its last rest in the peaceful Virginia hills that look down across the Potomac on the nation's capital.

Not Trip to Be Long One.
Trip since President Wilson led a preparedness march on the great avenue in 1916 has the chief executive appeared as often in parade in the capital and never has any president set for himself so long a trip as President Harding will undertake.

The war department announced today the makeup of the military escort which will precede the gun carriage on which the body of the unknown soldier will be carried. In addition to the regulars, sailors and marines, a provisional battalion of New York and Pennsylvania national guard will share in the honors to the dead comrade. Under army regulations, the escort will be that provided for the highest military rank of the service, a general.

Body Direct From France.
The body will come direct to Washington navy-yard from France. The war department has ruled there shall be no other ceremony but the nation's tribute in the nation's capital. The casket will be carried at night to the rotunda of the capitol to lie in state with a full guard of honor November 10 under the great dome.

The president would be authorized to confer the congressional medal of honor on an unknown, unidentified Italian soldier to be buried at Rome, under a resolution adopted today by the senate. Similar medals were conferred on British and French unknown dead.

NON-KNOWN TO CHOOSE BODY

American Soldier From Rhine Is to Visit Graveyard.

PARIS, Oct. 4.—(By the Associated Press).—“An American soldier,” who will find honored sepulchre in the National cemetery at Arlington, Va., will be selected by a non-commissioned officer of the American forces on the Rhine at Chalons-sur-Marne on the morning of October 21. The body will leave Havre on October 26, on board the United States cruiser Olympia.

Complete arrangements have been made for the removal of the body of the unknown American to the United States, it was announced by General Henry T. Allen, commander of American forces in Germany, here today. At the request of the American government, elaborate plans formulated by the French government for receiving the body in Paris have been abandoned.

The minister of war, Barthou, several French generals, General Allen and other French and American officials will go to Havre to attend the ceremonies just before the body is placed on board the Olympia.

A French general, not yet named, will pin the cross of the legion of honor to the chest of the unknown soldier. General Allen yesterday said that Marshal Foch would decorate the unknown soldier with the French military medal and the war cross at Arlington cemetery on November 11, when the body will be buried.

General Allen has taken the most complete precautions to insure the selection of a body which is impossible of identification. The bodies of four unidentified soldiers who fell in actual fighting, one from each of the four prominent American cemeteries in France, will be assembled near the railway station at Chalons-sur-Marne.

A non-commissioned officer selected by General Allen will then be ordered to place his hand on the chest of the four coffins. The one chosen will immediately be taken to Havre on a special train, accompanied by a guard of honor, military band, General Allen and a delegation representing the Paris post of the American Legion.

PLEA TO BE INSANITY

The district attorney refused to agree to accept Dr. Mahood's deposition, and as he cannot be here until the 24th of October, the defense asks in its motion that the trial of the case be deferred until that date.

The motion for continuance will be heard before Judge Bingham tomorrow morning and will be decided before any action in selecting the jury is taken.

Written Report Is Filed.
The affidavit states that on August 22, the attorney for the defense telegraphed Dr. Mahood, asking him for a report of Dr. Brumfield's condition at the time the prisoner was examined in the Calgary jail. Dr. Mahood replied by telegraph and later filed a complete written report. The report on Brumfield's condition was as follows:

“After apprehension and on examination after admission to the police cells here, Dr. Brumfield gave me the picture of a person in a very dejected condition. He appeared apathetic, unresponsive and sickly; there was a strange far-away look on his face, which gave evidence of mental deterioration, with little, if any, affection and mania. He complained of violent headaches, dizziness and inability to sleep. His appetite and digestion were impaired and he suffered from general toxemia. If disturbed in his cell he became intensely irritable, restless, depressed and at times exhibited evidence of developing hallucinations and delusions of an incoherent and unstable nature and of short duration.

Appearance Held Dazed.
“He appeared dazed, perplexed and was not able to concentrate his mind on anything but the cry that ‘Doc was killed.’ He denied he was Dr. Brumfield, but said he was Dr. Russell and that ‘Doc’ was killed in an automobile accident.

“He had a confused, incoherent, sequential way of answering questions which showed both intelligence and understanding impaired. Persons in the condition in which the doctor appeared here have been known to

commit various senseless and most peculiar acts.

“He showed a marked emotional defect and seemed to care nothing for friends or family. He appeared to realize something was the matter and to me he seemed to fear insanity. All of his actions and mental processes while here were remarkably slow.

“His pulse rate was 100 and his temperature varied from 100 degrees to 102 degrees while in the cell.”

Expense Fund Is Provided.
The defense alleges that it immediately communicated with the physician and that he agreed to come to Roseburg upon a payment of \$100 a day and expenses, but advised that his deposition be taken instead of putting the defendant to such an expense. The doctor's statement was not fully understood by the attorneys, they said, and they asked for a further agreement with him.

They said that they then took the matter up with the district attorney but that he declined to consent to a deposition and the defendant's relatives then raised sufficient funds to provide the necessary payment of \$100 a day and expenses to bring the affidavit continued to the effect that Dr. Mahood was notified to hold himself in readiness to appear on or about October 5, but that he telegraphed in reply that his arrangements had not been completed and that the first three weeks in October and that it would be impossible for him to come until the last week of the month.

In closing the appeal for a continuance, the affidavit sets forth that it is necessary to have the testimony of that witness for the reason that he is the only medical man and also the only person competent to testify as to the mental condition of Dr. Brumfield at the time of his arrest in Canada, and is the only physician so far as is known who saw the prisoner between the time he was arrested in Canada and his return to Roseburg, on July 13, until his return to Oregon.

Testimony Declared Vital.
It was further asserted that as the defense was based upon the mental condition of Dr. Brumfield on the day of July 13 that the defendant cannot safely go to trial without the testimony of the witness.

The motion will be hotly contested by District Attorney Neuner, and the state will fight every attempt further to delay the trial of the case, according to a statement made today by the district attorney. In the event that the motion is sustained, the date set by the court, but if it is denied the selection of the jury will start the trial.

Subpoena Issued.
Already Roseburg is crowded with people. Nearly all of the hotel accommodations have been reserved by persons who plan to attend the hearing. J. L. Hammerly, who was appointed to assist District Attorney Neuner in the prosecution of the case, arrived tonight. A large number of press representatives from all sections of the state were on hand, and spectators were beginning to pour into the city.

Great interest in the case is being taken by people of the rural communities who are coming into the city in great numbers and will be on hand early in the morning in an effort to obtain seats in the courtroom.

Only a limited number of seats are available and because of the intense interest it appears certain that these will be filled long before the hour set for the opening of court.

Judge Bingham was due to arrive in the city late tonight and will call the court to order promptly at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Judge Goes to Roseburg.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 4.—(Special).—Judge G. G. Bingham of the Marion county circuit court left here today for Roseburg where he will preside at the trial of Dr. R. M. Brumfield, who is accused of slaying Dennis Russell. The trial will start tomorrow morning. Judge Bingham said that the trial probably would last two weeks.

The task of selecting a jury, he said, probably would require a week. The prosecution has summoned more than 50 witnesses, and it was indicated recently that the defense would have that number.

LINN COUNTY FAIR OPENS

EXHIBITS ARE DECLARED TO BE EXCELLENT.

Attendance First Day Said to Be Satisfactory to Officials; Portlanders Attend.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 4.—(Special).—Marked by exhibits both as to quantity and excellence; racing, an interesting programme and attractions galore, and with a perfect Indian summer day, the Linn county fair opened here today.

The exhibits in the main pavilion and the athletic arrangements were far above expectation. The automobile display and exhibits in many of the livestock divisions are also far above the average for a county fair.

The attendance today was only fair. It was considered satisfactory for the first day, however, as many exhibitors declared it equalled that at the state fair. The grounds here and the building erected last year were formally dedicated today as the opening event of the fair. Senator Garland of Lebanon delivered the dedicatory address and W. W. Poland of Shedd, president of the Linn county farm bureau, also spoke. Frank J. Miller of Albany, formerly chairman of the public service commission of Oregon, presided, being presented by E. Pfeiffer of this city, president of the fair association. Musical numbers were given also.

Julius L. Meier of Portland, president of the 1925 exposition; Ira F. Powers, chairman of the publicity committee for the campaign for the exposition funds, and several other prominent Portland men visited the fair today, praising the show here as well as boosting for the 1925 exposition.

Postmaster for Walker Appointed.

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JOB DISTRIBUTION AT ONCE IS AIM

Colonel Woods to Head Central Agency.

INTEREST REPORTED HIGH

Many Reports of Conditions Made Already Declares Secretary Hoover's Pulse Is Felt.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 4.—Colonel Arthur Woods, ex-police commissioner of New York, will head the central agency to be established here by the national conference on unemployment to co-ordinate emergency relief of the workless wage-earners throughout the country.

The conference desires, Secretary Hoover said in making the announcement today, to see the whole country organized on a community basis to effect the quick distribution of jobs to the involuntary idlers through efficient operations of the emergency programs adopted last week.

Informal machinery, voluntary in its nature, is being set up in the form of one of the conference committees, which under the direction of Colonel Woods, can receive reports from various communities of the progress being made and transmit to the different localities successful employment methods tried out in others.

Interest High in Plan.

Hope was expressed in high administration circles today that President Harding's suggestion for a review by community authorities of the unemployment situation and steps taken to alleviate it in local areas would produce a picture from which it would be possible to determine where there is evidence of “slackness” in any community.

The municipal and other authorities were said to have shown great interest in steps being planned here to deal with unemployment, and where any community has failed to profit from the plan, it is being reserved for it to be brought to such unfavorable notice through publication to assist District Attorney Neuner in the prosecution of the case, arrived tonight. A large number of press representatives from all sections of the state were on hand, and spectators were beginning to pour into the city.

Many Reports Received.

Reports of local organizations were coming into the conference steadily. Mr. Hoover said, adding that telegrams have been received from the mayors of Memphis, Chattanooga, Nashville, Tenn., and Youngstown, O., stating that they were organizing to meet their unemployment situations along the lines suggested by the conference.

The report of the committee on municipal organization for unemployment tonight said:

“The methods of accomplishing relief were said to vary with each locality and no methods capable of universal adoption can with safety be raised. Therefore, specific recommendations to communities are being avoided. It is very urgent one that following the leadership of their mayors with united local committees they accept this primary obligation to the full.”

Losses Are Estimated.

Losses in earnings of workers throughout the country during the last fiscal year, due to involuntary idleness, were put at more than \$6,000,000, in an estimate prepared by economic experts of the unemployment.

This estimate, it was explained, covers the loss in wages because of unemployment of all the jobless in the country from July, 1920, to August 15, 1921, and was based on an approximation of normal pay levels other than on the scale at the peak of high wages. Efforts of the conference, it was said, would be turned toward a remedy for the economic loss to the country from such reductions of the earning power of its workers in the future by a more stabilized industrial plan.

ARCOLA RESTRICTION UPHOLD

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PROMPTNESS IN TAX REVISION IS URGED

Let Untried Methods Alone, Is Penrose's Advice.

SEVERAL AMENDMENTS UP

Senator Calder Makes Proposals to Stimulate Construction of Homes All Over Nation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 4.—Further revenue revision legislation ought to be enacted as soon as possible, Chairman Penrose of the senate finance committee said today in a statement emphasizing that the pending measure was merely of a temporary and emergency character.

Discussing the sales tax, he said there was “no use to advance novel or untried suggestions of taxation at a time when promptness of action of some kind is the slogan.”

House leaders were even more pronounced in their declarations regarding such a tax. Chairman Fordney of the ways and means committee, and Representative Mondell, the republican leader, declaring no such proposal could be put through the house.

House Sentiment Unchanged.

Mr. Mondell insisted there had been no change in the house sentiment that there should be a “lifting and not a shifting of taxes.”

Mr. Fordney took a similar view and it was indicated house leaders would insist upon a tax revision programme substantially in accord with that agreed upon at the White House conference last August.

Senator Penrose said there were many sources of revenue and methods of taxation that ought to be considered by congress at an early date and that he intended to address the senate on “this particular subject.”

“Just as soon as the pending bill becomes a law,” he said, “I hope to submit to the consideration of some tribunal—either a special tax committee or the committees of the house and senate—a number of suggestions that may be fruitful.”

Relief Action Is Urged.
“Meanwhile, we have only one thing to do: Get the country out of the depths into which it has been plunged and restore business and industrial activities and employment and correct inconvenience as much as possible.”

Senate consideration of the tax bill was confined today to a vigorous assault on the measure by Senator Reed of Missouri, a democratic member of the finance committee. He denounced the bill as “an infamous” piece of legislation and declared the republican plan to relieve the wealthy corporations and individuals of a large portion of their taxes was “a bold-lieking performance.”

Several amendments to the tax bill designed to stimulate construction of homes were proposed today by Senator Calder of New York. One would provide that profits from the sale of dwellings between January 1, 1921

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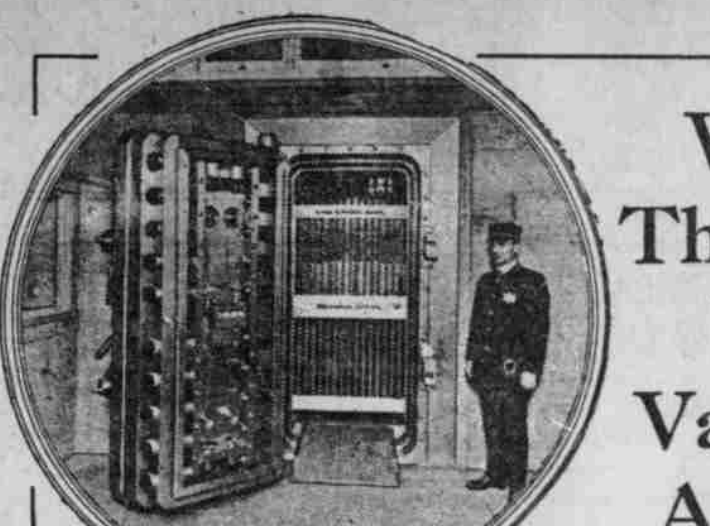
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CHICAGO FREE AT NIGHT
Control Over Closing Hour of Cabarets Held Lost.

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—This city today lost its control over the closing hour of Chicago's night life when the appellate court affirmed a decision by a lower court that the city has no power over a place operated as a restaurant except to regulate sanitation conditions.

The decision, rendered in the case of Coliseum restaurant, which had been closed for violating the 1 o'clock closing order for cabarets, will cost the city \$120,000 a year in license fees, it is estimated.

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
