

LEAGUE ASSEMBLY ADJOURNS SESSION

Brazil, Belgium, China, Spain
Re-elected Members.

RESULTS ARE SATISFYING

Delegates Express Variety of Opinions on Conference on Limitation of Armament.

GENEVA, Oct. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—The second session of the league of nations assembly adjourned tonight after electing Brazil, Belgium, China, and Spain the four non-permanent members of the council. President Van Karnebeck, summing up the work of the session, said those who had expected the league to be a mere talk shop were disappointed, but the pessimists who had predicted dissolution of the league were confounded by the result of the work accomplished. He dwelt upon the importance of the international conference of justice and the various technical organizations set up by the assembly as real progress toward the kind of internationalism the league was organized to bring about.

Opinions Are Divided.
Opinions of a majority of the delegates regarding the work of the league are divided, but the pessimists apparently give general satisfaction. The attitude of the delegates toward the Washington conference on the limitation of armament is according to the situation of the different countries. The small states say it is for the large nations to make a beginning in this direction, hence Washington is the proper place for such a beginning, since there all the greatest armed nations will be gathered together. There is also a considerable skepticism, but most of the delegates are hopeful.

Separate Body Favored.
In some delegations the opinion prevails that at the Washington conference some international organization may be formed which would be apart from the league of nations as presently constituted. Some apprehension is expressed over the possibility of such a rival organization. The question of registration of treaties as provided for by article XVIII of the covenant, which it is proposed to amend, has been postponed until the next assembly.

"PRISON STIR" BLAMED

Ex-Convict in Bad Check Attempt Declared Overcome by Temptation.

"Prison stir" was assigned by Tom Garland attorney, as the reason why Frank White, just out of the penitentiary, attempted to pass a forged check on a Portland clothing store this week. This plea was made by White's attorney, who appeared before Judge Roseman in municipal court yesterday for preliminary hearing. White waived examination in the lower court and was committed over to the state grand jury under \$1000 bonds.

White, according to his attorney, had just been released from a mid-western penitentiary after serving seven years and 28 days. He came directly to Portland and attempted to pass a forged check upon his arrival here, it is alleged.

"Prison stir," according to White's attorney, is a forcible insanity which overcomes convicts just after they are released from long prison sentences. They are overcome with temptation, but before they have a chance to get their bearings.

Judge Roseman said he would let the grand jury consider the "prison stir" theory in disposing of White's case.

Competent testimony. He added that there was no real assurance that Dr. Mahood could be present at the trial at a later date, and that a postponement would cause a great inconvenience on the prosecution, which had about 60 witnesses in readiness for trial at this time.

"I do not desire at this time to discuss at length the relevancy or irrelevancy of bringing Dr. Mahood here," said Judge Blingman, "but we know the engagements which prevent him coming at present may be a pleasure trip of some sort. I will not grant the request of the defense for a postponement."

Seven Tentatives Are Selected.

Roseburg wanted a just but a speedy trial. The accused dentist, he said, and excellent progress was made in the preliminary work today. Seven tentative jurors were selected, and a continuance at this rate should bring the trial to the stage of hearing testimony Saturday afternoon or Monday morning.

The jurors accepted today were: Harry Larkins, Oakland, farmer; M. H. Payne, Yoncalla, rancher; Walter G. Coates, Olney, rancher; James R. Claycomb, Tyee, rancher; Amos E. Cripp, Riddle, rancher; Q. W. Hartshorn, Sutherlin, orchardist, and James Marvin, Sutherlin, road worker.

Larkins was passed as a tentative juror after he had declared, among other things, that he had a prejudice against a defense based on insanity, that he was not against the infliction of the death penalty, and that he was opposed to capital punishment as a result of a conviction on circumstantial evidence unless specially instructed by the court.

Scruples Gave Excuse.

Examination of all other prospective jurors followed the general line of questions asked the first man accepted.

C. L. Chenoweth, hardware merchant of Oakland, was the second man examined. He was challenged by the district attorney on the ground that he had scruples against infliction of the death penalty and had voted twice against capital punishment in this state. Chenoweth was excused from serving.

H. H. Strong, rancher, of Sutherlin, was also excused after he had declared his challenge to the defense. At the opening of the afternoon session, George Hall of Oakland was excused after he admitted that he had a fixed opinion on the trial which he felt could not be put aside.

M. H. Payne was passed by both defense and prosecution. He said that he had been a patient of Dr. Brumfield's about six years ago, and that their relations had always been pleasant.

Messrs. Coates, Clayton, Cripp and Hartshorn were passed with little difficulty. Mr. Marvin, the last tentative juror accepted today, was challenged by the defense, but the chal-

enge was over-ruled by Judge Blingman. George R. Best was excused without examination when he submitted evidence showing sickness in his family. John H. Hersing of Molalla was excused on the same grounds. George Hall was excluded on challenge of the defense that he had a fixed opinion on the case. H. R. Kruger, manager of a farm exchange at Oakland; R. N. Way, contractor of Myrtle Creek, and J. A. Jacques, Glendale rancher, were excused because they admitted having fixed opinions which might influence their decisions as members of the jury.

Other possible jurors called today, who will be examined tomorrow, were T. K. Medley of Oakland, John O. Lyttel of Glendale, J. L. Roach of Tillamook, and Walter Haines of Ellettsville.

The first panel of 24 men available as jurors will be completely exhausted after examination of these four men. The panel was reduced from full strength for various causes before the trial opened today.

A new panel will be called tomorrow, and selection of tentative jurors will continue until 12 men have been accepted. The defense and prosecution will then be allowed to make peremptory challenges, the former being permitted 12 and the latter six challenges of this sort. The procedure will be repeated and continued until the final jury is chosen.

Courtroom Crowded at First.
The spectators' portion of the courtroom was crowded at the morning session today. There were comparatively very few women in attendance, and a large part of the audience was made up of old men.

In the afternoon, attendance dwindled gradually until less than 50 spectators were present. The somewhat dull routine of these early stages of the trial has not interested citizens enough to bring out large crowds.

When the jury is chosen and the taking of testimony begins, however, the courtroom is expected to be filled. The session today ended shortly after 5 o'clock. Judge Blingman announced that the case would be resumed at 9 o'clock tomorrow.

ZR-2 VERDICT RETURNED

CORONER'S JURY SAYS ACCIDENT FROM CAUSE UNKNOWN.

No Blame Placed for Deaths.

Bodies of Six Men Killed in Disaster Not Yet Found.

HULL, England, Oct. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—A coroner's jury investigating the disaster to the big dirigible ZR-2, which fell into the Humber river August 24, killing more than 40 persons, among them 16 Americans, returned a verdict today that it was due to an accident brought about by the breaking of the airship from some cause or causes unknown.

While the inquest was particularly into the death of Lieutenant-Commander Charles G. Little of the American navy, verdicts of accidental death were given in all the cases.

Harry Bateman, one of the surviving scientific experts on board the ZR-2, testified the first test of the craft was carried out successfully at a speed of 49 knots an hour. He said the other experts were so satisfied with the condition of the airship that they were anxious to cross the Atlantic in her. No previous airship had ever been so thoroughly tested; its structural strength was never doubted.

According to Bateman, there were lateral and longitudinal shocks, which caused the airship to reel and pitch during the flight. He thought it was due to the engine clutch slipping, but he said he never heard any explosion.

Lieutenant Wann, pilot of the ZR-2, testified that Lieutenant Wann, who was in the cockpit, saw the airship pitch and roll, but that his mind was a blank as far as the accident was concerned.

It was learned that the bodies of six men killed in the disaster have not been recovered.

OFFENDERS ADMIT GUILT

Several Cases Disposed Of in Federal Court at Medford.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—At today's session here of the United States court for southern Oregon, Judge Blingman disposed of several cases. Jake Baer, a miner living near Kirby in Josephine county, was fined \$10 by Judge Blingman on his plea of guilty to building a small fire in the Siskiyou national forest to burn out a rattlesnake. He neglected to extinguish the blaze, and it later spread over two acres of ground, causing small damage.

Martha Schenckin, Klamath Indian woman, admitted theft of some clothing from a Klamath Indian reservation home at which she had been residing.

The jury in the trial of Levi Barney and Willis David, Klamath Indians, on the charge of stealing a calf, returned a verdict of not guilty. The case of Ed Jason of Bly, Or., charged with having a still in his possession, went to the jury late this afternoon.

CITY SUED FOR \$3,825,000

50 Residents Complain Property Is Ruined by City Dump.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Fifty residents living near the city dump grounds today filed suit in superior court against the city asking \$3,825,000 each or a total of \$191,250,000. The residents declare that the air is polluted by the refuse from the city.

Defendants to the action are the city of Walla Walla, Mayor Hill, Commissioner Ferguson, Grove Cookery and Sanitary Inspector Root. The plaintiffs petitioned the city several months ago asking that the city cease using the ground as a dump and that at time Mayor Hill promised to find a new location. He declared today that he was still trying to find the new location.

1925 Fair Committee Men Quits.

BEND, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—R. W. Sawyer, member of the 1925 fair committee, resigned his position tonight to Julius L. Meier, stating that he could not bring himself to believe that the proper method of financing the fair is by taxation, and that he felt he should not accept the designation as a member of the committee charged with the duty of obtaining a favorable vote on any measure providing for a tax.

BANKERS EXPECTING HOT SESSION TODAY

Conflict About Establishing Branch Houses Predicted

DELEGATES TAKE SIDES

State Institutions and Smaller National Ones Thought Likely to Oppose Plan.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 5.—Conflict over the matter of establishing branch banks was today predicted for tomorrow on the floor of the convention of the American Bankers' association.

Delegates were today discussing the expected battle, which, they said, would center around the desire of national banks to expand through branches, a privilege now denied them while state banks are permitted to have as many branches as they wish.

Delegates predicted state banks and the smaller national institutions would oppose the larger national banks' desire for expansion. The extension of forces for and against national banks, as suggested in a proposed law reported to be fostered by the highest court, was begun this afternoon.

The seriousness of the question was indicated by declarations of Oscar W. Schaeffer of Girard, Kan., that an "octopus" menace state banks. Branding extension of branch banks as a foreboding of ruin, Schaeffer asked the state banking division: "The war is over, and a war labor board is no longer needed," he said. Medical Class Is Large

REGISTRATION FOR FALL TERM REACHES TOTAL OF 152.

Free Dispensary at Fourth and Jefferson Streets to Open With Increased Facilities.

The enrollment of the University of Oregon medical school, which opened the fall term Monday, was the largest in the history of the institution. Total registration reached 152, the maximum number possible until the larger quarters are completed.

Enrollment of new students in all classes was limited to 10, as to hold the registration within limits, but Oregon and northwest students received preference.

With the opening of school, the Portland free dispensary at Fourth and Jefferson streets will open with increased facilities. The dispensary will be open six hours daily, from 8 to 12 A. M. and 1 to 3 P. M. daily.

Students of the medical school have been divided into clinical groups under direction of various physicians of the city as a means of giving them practical observation in the diagnosis and treatment of the sick.

LOCAL CONVENTION OVER

Lectures of an educational character featured the closing sessions yesterday of the convention of the Oregon State Fire Insurance Association, which were held yesterday at the North Pacific college. SEATTLE TAX 63.37 MILLS

RATE IS 10.18 POINTS LOWER THAN LAST YEAR.

Property Owners Still Must Pay More Than in 1918; Millage for Districts Compiled.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Seattle property owners, within the city limits, will pay taxes in 1922 at the rate of 63.37 on every \$1000 assessed valuation.

The county budget approved requires a levy of 10 mills, the school district budget 13.37 mills, the city budget 25.999 mills and the port commission meets this afternoon to fix a levy of 1 mill. The state recently levied 13 mills.

The 63.37 mills total tax is 10.18 mills lower than that levied last fall for this year but is still 6.32 mills higher than the 1918 levy.

Frank W. Hull, county assessor, this morning began extending the tax to property in the outside municipalities and will be unable to begin work on Seattle taxes until the rate has been certified to him. The millage for the various taxing districts within the city, exclusive of the area embraced in the old city limits, was being worked up today in the city controller's office. As soon as this is completed the tax ordinance will be drawn and introduced in the council.

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CUT IN FREIGHT ASKED

Hardwood Men Testify Before Interstate Commerce Commission.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5.—Representatives of the hardwood industry in southern and northern Arkansas brought to hearings before the interstate commerce commission today their application for general reduction of freight rates on hardwood forest products.

H. M. Nicky, president of the Southern Hardwood association, declared that the price drop of hardwood products had been so marked that justice required reduction of the carriers' charges. Witnesses for the carriers, it is expected, will be called tomorrow.

Kiwanis to Gather at Salem.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Between 300 and 350 persons will be present at a banquet to be held here Friday night, when the Salem Kiwanis club will receive its charter from the national headquarters. The Portland Kiwanis club will send 40. Eugene will be present from Seattle and Tacoma. Many of the visitors will be accompanied by their wives. George Lawrence, district governor of the northwest, will be the principal speaker at the banquet.
