

**\$1,000,000 TO BE
GUARANTEED VOTERS**Fair Committee Assures
Clause in Amendment.**ELECTION DATE NOT SET**Large Amount of Funds to Be
Raised in Portland by Private
Subscription or Stock Sale.

Guarantee that \$1,000,000 will be raised in Portland by private subscription or stock sale for the support of the 1923 exposition will be included in the proposed charter amendment to be submitted to the voters of Portland.

Assurance that a clause containing such a guarantee would be inserted in the amendment was given members of the city council by members of the exposition committee after City Commissioner Barbur had advocated it.

The legislative committee of the exposition was instructed to redraft the ordinance to include this provision as well as several others suggested at the meeting yesterday.

Election Date Not Set.
No date has yet been set for the special city election, although such election probably will be held on November 19. Julius L. Meier, chairman of the exposition committee, told the city commissioners that the committee would enter into a contract with the city relieving the city from any expense in conducting the election. It was explained that many of the judges and clerks of election boards already have offered to serve without compensation and it is likely that others will make similar offers.

City Commissioner Barbur explained that he favored the submission of the proposed charter amendment but felt that the taxpayers of the city should have some assurance that the \$1,000,000 planned to be raised through stock sales or private subscriptions would actually be raised. He held also that money derived through such means at the conclusion of the exposition as well as any profits should be paid back to the city in dividends on the same basis as subscribers and stockholders receive dividends.

Additional Time Wanted.
J. B. Kerr, one of the members of the legislative committee, stated that he agreed with Commissioner Barbur and urged that additional time be granted in order that the amendments might be included in the proposed charter amendment.

The same proposals as were offered by Commissioner Barbur were echoed by J. N. Teal, who stated that he was making the suggestions so that the council might have ample opportunity to include the suggestions in the amendment.

"I believe that the people who are to vote on this measure should have ample time in which to learn what it is all about," said Mr. Teal, "and if this is done no one can have any objections to offer."

Mr. U'Ren Requests Arguments.
Mr. Teal objected to a provision in the charter amendment returning any dividends from the fair to the school board of district No. 1. No one could explain just why the school district was made the potential beneficiary from exposition profits derived through investment of funds raised by taxation in Portland and it was generally agreed that any dividends resulting from the city's financial assistance to the project should go back to the city and be used in defraying regular city expenses.

Opportunity to present arguments for and against the proposed measure was requested by W. S. U'Ren, who was told by City Auditor Funk that such opportunity was available under an ordinance passed by the council years ago, and that any argument submitted by either the proponents or the opponents of this or any other city measure would be printed and sent to all voters within the city.

Labor Behind Exposition.
Organized labor is solid behind the exposition project, according to C. N. Ryerson, editor of the Oregon Labor Press, who represented Otto Hartwig, president of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, at the meeting.

Mr. Ryerson urged that the exposition committee consider all suggestions made by both proponents and opponents of the exposition idea, so that in the end all Portland and the state of Oregon might be united behind the exposition project.

Submission of the location of the exposition site to the city council, together with a complete analysis of the development, was urged by F. W. Mulkey, before the amendment was submitted. Mr. Mulkey stated that the city council should have a part in the selection of the site.

Funds Declared Lacking.
Franklin T. Griffith, chairman of the site committee, explained that it would be impossible for the present committee to enter into any contract for the lease or purchase of a fair site, as the present committee lacks funds. He stated that, therefore, the proposal to submit the location of the site prior to the submission of the charter amendment was impossible.

He said the council would appoint a commission, as would the state, to conduct the exposition and disburse the funds and through these commissions both the state and the city would have a part to play in the selection of the site and the outline of the plan of development.

State to Participate.
Mr. Griffith stated that it was proper that the city council and the representatives of the state should take this part in the exposition affairs and that by the very terms of the acts to be submitted to the voters of both the state and the city, such protection would be afforded.

Under the terms of the charter amendment which will be submitted, it is proposed to raise \$370,000 in 1922, 1923 and 1924 in the city of Portland, provided that the voters of the state approve a state levy of \$2,000,000 and an additional \$1,000,000 is provided through stock sales of private subscriptions.

The council will consider the revised amendment at a special meeting next Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

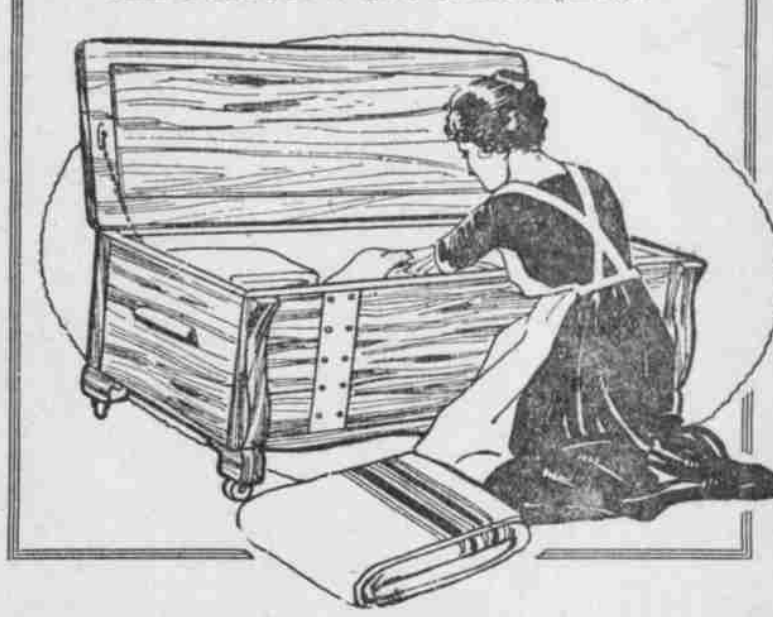
