MISS FOSSLER HONORED.—In honor of Miss Anna K. Fossler, retiring head of the technical department of the Portland public library, a dinner was held at the Benson hotel Tuesday night, at which heads of departments of the library were hostesses. After five years' service as head of the technical department, Miss Fossler will leave Portland tomorrow for Los Angeles, to become assistant librarian of the University of Southern California, southern branch, which she has just opened there. The following heads of departments who acted as hosts: Miss Margaret McLachlan, Miss Nelly Fox, Miss Alice Taylor, Mrs. George Parrish, wife of Dr. Parrish, city health officer, was removed to Good Samaritan hospital, where an operation was performed.

HOLDUP GIVE JAIL SENTENCE.—Albert Reynolds, shot by patrolman at the act of holding up a Greek card room, at Broadway and Ankeny street, June 24, was sentenced to nine months in the county jail by Judge Stapleton yesterday afternoon on the recommendation of investigating officers. He is 32 years old, it was his first attempt at crime, and he was under the tutelage of an ex-convict who planned to profit most by the holdup, it was said. Reynolds has been in jail for more than three months already. He had just lined up the patrons of the cardroom when Officers Travis and Nelson arrived on the scene. Travis halted the holdup by dropping the highwayman with a bullet.

RITZ HOTEL SOLD.—The Ritz hotel, including stock, lease and furnishings, has been taken over by Mr. and Mrs. Frank A. Clark, according to announcement made yesterday. The hotel, which is located at Park and Morrison streets, was the property of the Ritz Hotel company and the deal was said to have been for \$100,000. The George T. Moore company represented both sides in the transaction. Mr. and Mrs. Clark were formerly proprietors of the Clyde hotel. They sold their interest in the latter hotel about a year ago. They will take active charge of the management of the Ritz hotel.

CHURCH CALL IS OUT.—Special services and good music were promised at the services in Portland churches Sunday, which have been proclaimed "go-to-church Sunday." The churches and the city are carrying the announcement of the plans for Sunday services. This is the first "go-to-church Sunday" in this city for several years. The plan has been endorsed by the Portland federation of churches, which placed this date on the calendar for church activities for 1921-22. Mayor Baker will issue a proclamation soon giving his official sanction to the day's observance.

RADIO CONCERT TO BE GIVEN.—The Business Women's club has arranged with Walter Haynes of the Oregon Institute of technology to hear a wireless concert with the aid of the radio amplifier at its clubrooms this evening. This is the first concert of the kind to be given by a club in Portland. Music by wireless has been transmitted before, but with the aid of the radio amplifier sounds may be transmitted with such volume that they can be heard by a whole assemblage at once.

RUNAWAY VICTIM HAS SISTER HERE.—Levi Morgan Fanning, who died in his home at Echo Monday night as the result of injuries suffered in an accident with a runaway team, was a brother of Mrs. W. B. Glafke, of 1148 Thurman street. Mrs. Glafke was notified of the death shortly following its occurrence, but was unable to go to Echo. Mr. Fanning was thrown out of his wagon when the team ran away, and was found unconscious by the roadside a short time following. He was 70 years old.

BUDGET HEARING DELAYED

Port Estimates to Be Considered Monday Instead of Friday.

Consideration of the budget of the Port of Portland has been postponed until Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock by the county tax conservation commission. The hearing was previously set for Friday afternoon but owing to the fact that Fred W. Mulkey, chairman of the commission, would have to be out of the city at that time the change was decided upon.

The commission devoted yesterday to going over different estimates in order that the members may be familiar when hearings are held. It was announced that a definite date for consideration of the Multnomah county budget had not yet been decided upon.

RANCH LIGHTENS PENALTY

JESS BOYDSTON ESCAPES WITH 5-YEAR PRISON TERM.

Reparation to Man and Woman Shot by Jealous Interloper Has Weight With Court.

Because Jess Boydston has a sister and brother-in-law who are willing to make some reparation for the shooting of Thomas and Mabel Baker by deeding to the Bakers their 280-acre ranch near Bozeman, Mont., Boydston escaped a penitentiary sentence of 20 years yesterday, but must serve five years at Salem.

It was with great reluctance that Circuit Judge Stapleton permitted Boydston to escape with a five-year sentence, and only on the petition of the Bakers themselves.

"Boydston deserves no pity," John Collier, attorney, told the court, "and the reason for the attack was inflicted by Boydston April 13. Her husband has not regained the entire use of his arms as the result of being shot. Boydston came on the pair as they were cutting wood near their home in Woodstock and opened fire without warning, dropping both."

The reason for the attack was obscure, except that Boydston was supposed to be enraged because Mrs. Baker refused to leave her husband, who had returned from war service overseas, where he had been commissioned a captain. Boydston had endeavored to win the affections of Mrs. Baker while her husband was away.

Mr. and Mrs. George Jones of Bozeman, Mont., were the brother-in-law and sister who proposed to deed the Bakers their ranch if Boydston could escape heavy servitude in the penitentiary.

Boydston was captured in Bozeman, August 23. He admitted the shooting.
