

COUNCIL IN FAVOR OF NEW PIPE LINE

Third Tube to Bull Run Is Approved Formally.

COST TO BE \$2,000,000

Sale of Bonds for \$750,000 Will Be Authorized to Raise Funds to Begin Work.

Construction of the first unit of the proposed third pipeline from Bull Run headworks, 30 miles east of Portland, to the reservoir at Mount Tabor, will begin next year, providing bonds issued by the water department can be sold. The completed pipeline will cost approximately \$2,000,000 and will take fully two years for construction.

Plans for the construction were approved yesterday by the city council. By this approval an item called for the sale of \$750,000 of bonds for this work was placed in the annual budget of the water department. Fred M. Handlett, chief engineer of the water bureau, announced that plans and specifications would be drafted for the new conduit, but that such plans would probably not be completed for several months.

New Line Needed.
Portland now has two pipelines through which its water supply flows from the headworks at Bull Run to the reservoir. One of these pipelines was constructed in 1894 and the other somewhat later. Portland is now drawing the capacity load from these two lines in the summer, and water department officials believe that with this pipeline growth in population a third line will be absolutely necessary in two years.

All preliminary work for the construction of the third pipeline has been completed, the council having authorized this work more than a year ago.

Inventory to Be Taken.
Before an effort will be made to offer the bonds for sale, Water Superintendent Keyser and Chief Engineer Handlett stated that an inventory of the properties of the water department must be taken. Without a valuation of the plant it was believed that difficulty will be encountered in disposing of the bonds. A statement prepared for the city council as a supplement to the water bureau's budget showed that the annual revenue of the water department is now approximately \$350,000, while the yearly cost of operation and maintenance, which has paid out of earnings, is \$361,989.54.

Sinking Fund Maintained.
The water bureau is now called upon to pay in interest and into a sinking fund being built up to retire outstanding bonds, a total of \$506,328 every year. In addition the estimated figures for operation of the water bureau in 1922 is \$195,454.54 and the maintenance of the plant at \$160,000. The 1922 estimates also call for the expenditure of \$100,000 out of earnings to cover the cost of repairs to reservoirs.

The total estimates for new construction, which included the first unit of the third pipe line, is \$1,425,200. While in the past some new construction has been paid for out of earnings, the members of the city council and officials of the water bureau have declared against any further inroads into the earnings for this work.

War Bonds Bond Sale.
During the war period it was impossible for the water bureau to sell any of its bonds, and it was therefore necessary to expend some money from earnings to handle necessary new construction.

New construction items included in the 1922 budget call for a new water pipeline for Sellwood, at an estimated cost of \$90,000, a new standpipe at Burlingame estimated to cost \$15,000, and improvements at the Woodmere station to cost \$7500.

A total of \$860,290.97 was the estimate of the cost of construction work on the existing distributing plant. This includes the purchase and installation of pipe, hydrants and other improvements necessary in extending the plant throughout the city.

Outlay to be \$2,385,190.
The total estimated outlay for the water department in 1922, including operation, maintenance, fixed charges and construction, is \$2,385,190.51, of which \$961,989.54 will be paid out of earnings and the remainder will be handled through the sale of bonds.

The budget estimates, as finally fixed by the council, were turned over to S. Grunze, clerk of the council, and John Curtin, deputy city auditor, for extension. A report giving the completed figures of the budget will probably be given to the city council tomorrow or Saturday morning. It will be turned over to the tax supervision and conservation commission Saturday.

Grand Chancellor Finseth was chosen to head a committee of seven from the grand lodge officers, including the three trustees, to work with similar committees from California and Washington on the location of a Pythian home for orphans and the aged.

Officers elected yesterday in addition to those announced on Tuesday were: Henry Friedlander, Portland, grand master-at-arms; W. B. Smith, McMinville, grand inner guard; J. D. Anderson, Hillsboro, grand outer guard; and W. J. H. Clark, Portland, grand trustee.

In ceremonies, concluding with a midnight dinner at the Oregon grille, 40 candidates were initiated into the dramatic orders, Knights of Khorassan, highest rank in the Pythian order, on Tuesday night. Mayor George I. Baker was included in the number.

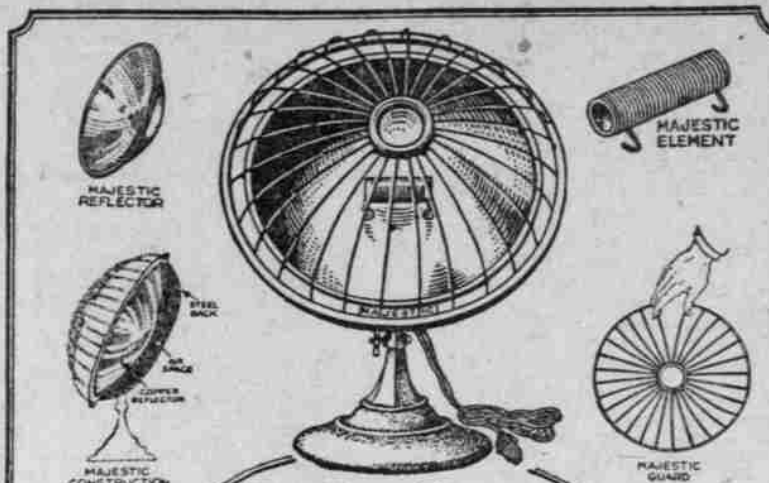

COMMON LAW TIE HOLDS
DECISION BY JUDGE STAPLETON IS HELD IMPORTANT.
Ruling on Marriage, if Sustained by Supreme Court, Will Have Far Reaching Effect.

Common-law marriages are legal in Oregon, according to a decision by Circuit Judge Stapleton yesterday in an unimportant case. Hereafter the general view of the law has been that common-law marriages are not recognized in this state, but Judge Stapleton bases his opinion on the decision of Federal Judge Gilbert of the circuit court of appeals in a recent case brought in Alaska, where the statutes of Oregon are in force.

Though the Oregon law prescribes the form for legal marriages in the state, Judge Stapleton held with Judge Gilbert that the statutes of this state do not declare that no marriage is valid unless solemnized in the prescribed manner. If sustained by the Oregon supreme court, this decision will have an important bearing on the disposition of the case of Juane Desamps, alleged common-law wife of the late Ernest Desamps, who is fighting for his \$70,000 estate against distant nephews.

The ruling of Judge Stapleton was in the suit of Fred C. Twigger against Martha Twigger, his step-mother, in which he sought a one-half interest in three lots on Columbia Heights left by his father, F. C. Twigger, on the ground that his father and step-mother never were married legally. Mrs. Twigger was divorced July 13, 1914, in Clackamas county, from A. J. Ward and married Twigger in Stevenson, Wash., before

the end of a month—though a six months' limit is prescribed by Oregon law before a second marriage is legal.

The Twiggers lived in Portland as man and wife. Twigger died intestate last May. The suit was thrown out of court by Judge Stapleton on the ground that the fact that the Twiggers lived as man and wife in this state constituted a common-law marriage and was legal.

Military Man Turns Farmer.
EUGENE, Or., Oct. 12.—(Special.)—Captain H. I. Beck, for 15 years an officer in the United States army, who resigned his commission last February, has arrived in Eugene in company with his wife and they have taken up their residence on a little farm which they have purchased near Springfield. Captain and Mrs. Beck came here from Camp Meade, Maryland. The captain is a son of G. T. Beck, well-known teacher of this city, and a brother of W. H. Beck, ticket clerk at the Southern Pacific station here.
