

ARMAMENT SESSION TO START ON NOV. 12

Definite Decision Is Made by
State Department.

2 PROGRAMMES CONFLICT

Even Informal Gathering Is Held
Impossible on Same Day as
Tribute to War Dead.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—The state department today announced its decision to hold the conference on limitation of armaments on the morning of Saturday, November 12, instead of Armistice day, November 11, as was announced today at the state department.

It was found impossible to reconcile even an informal gathering of the conference on Armistice day with the programme of ceremonies connected with burial of America's unknown soldier.

The conference will be called to order by Secretary Hughes and the welcoming address to the delegates by President Harding will follow. It is expected that the conference will perfect its organization and adjourn to take up its real deliberations.

The appointment of committees to consider special topics, arrangement of conferences in which those nations invited to participate only in the discussion of American and Pacific problems may be present, and similar matters will be deferred until the following Monday.

IOWA CONFERENCE IS HELD

Large Amounts of Taxes Eaten Up
by Armament Discussion.

DES MOINES, Oct. 28.—(Special.)—The people once thoroughly understood how much of the money they pay to the federal government goes for war purposes and such popularity slump far below its present low level. Dr. Charles Medbury told the Iowa conference on limitation of armaments in the opening address of the afternoon session today.

"It has been computed," he said, "that the average tax paid to the government in 1920 by each person was \$43.64. How was this money spent? Here is the answer: For war of the past we spent 63.2 per cent of the whole; in preparation for future wars we spent 29.4 per cent of the whole.

"Out of every dollar paid to his government by the American citizen in 1920 more than 92 cents went to purposes of war. For civil departments of our government we spent 4.8 per cent. When we pass from war we pass from billions.

"For public works we spent 1.4 per cent, while—while—while we spend 4.8 per cent. When we pass from war we pass from billions.

Cheers Drown Conversation.

Then he entered the city hall and Mayor Hyland bestowed on him the keys of the city. The marshal didn't need them. All doors were unbarred for him.

Conquest of America Begun.
But the man who once had commanded members of the American Legion now was under orders from the organization. On to Washington was the word passed to him and the marshal re-entered his car with General Pershing.

At the Pennsylvania station, the generalissimo passed into another sea of welcome, a sea which at times threatened to engulf him. Then he stepped onto his special train and with cheers resounding behind, set forth on his conquest of America.

General Pershing left a few minutes before on a regular limited train.

WASHINGTON, D. C., IS HOST
Marshal Foch Greeted With Cheers

When Special Train Arrives.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—The American republic took Marshal Foch of France, soldier of soldiers of the great war, to its heart tonight on his first day in the national capital en route to Kansas City as the guest of his old comrades of the American Legion at their annual convention.

He was greeted with wild cheers at the Union station when his special train came from New York, and a roaring tribute followed him as he was whirled swiftly to the New Willard, where he will pass the night.

The only ceremony that marked the conclusion of the great French soldier's first day in America was his formal induction at the station into the American Legion itself. He was made an honorary member of the George Washington post, the national chapter of the legion, some time ago, and tonight Lieutenant-Commander Clark pinned on his breast the badge of membership as Marshal Foch stood in the president's waiting room at Union station with General Pershing.

French and American officers and officials grouped about, members of the American Legion, and the structure and thousands of Americans waiting in the concourse outside the station to cheer him as he emerged.

General Pershing hastened to Washington in advance of the marshal, arriving scarcely half an hour before the train bearing the French leader pulled in. He was met by high officers of the army and navy and of the French embassy and the state department and headed the group standing at the steps of the marshal's private car when the French general stepped down.

PRESIDENT GETS MESSAGE
Greetings Are Sent to Harding by
Marshal Foch.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—A message received by President Harding through Secretary Hughes from Marshal Foch, before the latter arrived in the city, was the first to come from the French leader to the secretary of state were made public tonight at the state department.

Marshal Foch, in his message, said: "At the moment when I am about to land on the soil of the United States, I greet the president of the great republic with the warmest of thanks for the honor which he has done me by sending an American flotilla to meet me."

The secretary of state, in reply, said: "The president desires me to express to you his warmest thanks for the thoughtful message to him and to say that he is anticipating meeting you tomorrow with much pleasure. Please accept my own cordial wishes of warm welcome to the United States."

GERMAN DIPLOMATS SHY
Mark's Value Makes High U. S.
Post Undesirable.

BERLIN, Oct. 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—The German government is still endeavoring to find a man willing to accept the post of ambassador to the United States, but available candidates are becoming scarce as the mark depreciates in value.

The latest candidate to be considered is Prince von Hatzfeldt-Trachenberg, former counselor of the German embassy at Washington, and now commissioner of the occupied Rhineland zone.

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MR. BLANTON MAKES APOLOGY TO HOUSE

Letter to Colleagues Is
Warmly Applauded.

MALICE INTENT DENIED

Probe of Conditions at Public
Printing Office Proposed
in Resolution.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—An apology to the house, which was made yesterday by Representative Thomas Blanton, democrat, of Texas, in a letter to Speaker Gillett, read to his colleagues and warmly applauded today, especially by republicans.

The Texas congressman, who was seated from which he arose to defend himself against the charge that he had printed in the congressional record an obscene affidavit relating to a conversation between two printers, took no part in the brief discussion preceding the presentation of his apology.

Apology Is Offered.
The letter was sent to the speaker and laid before the house by Representative Blanton, democrat, of Texas, in a letter to Speaker Gillett, read to his colleagues and warmly applauded today, especially by republicans.

"I am involved in no issue now before the house, hence what I now say is not a sacrifice of any principle."

"When I expressed a wish of being able to place before the country the record expunged I was misunderstood by my colleagues who believed that I would circulate the objectionable language. My intention was not to do this, but to circulate the expunged record with all the objectionable words and abbreviations contained in the employment affidavit eliminated and circulated only to show to the country the honest bona fide purpose of my remarks."

"I realize that the judgment of no human is infallible. I bow to the collective judgment of my colleagues, against none of whom I harbor malice, and offer this, my apology, to the house for what my colleagues in their decision, determined was an error."

Four Words at Issue.
Speaking in behalf of Mr. Blanton, Representative Garrett of Tennessee, asked the speaker to read to the reading, asked that four words used by the Texas in answering Representative Longworth, republican, Ohio, be stricken out of the permanent record of congress on the ground that they had been uttered in the stress of debate and were intended. Representative Mondell of Wyoming, the republican leader objected.

Longworth had asked Mr. Blanton if there was any truth in the report that he had expressed an intention to send out 250,000 copies of his speech, expunged from the record last Monday, and he had replied that if financially able he would put it in the hands of every male voter in the country "just as it is." It was agreed among republicans that Mr. Longworth had put the Texas "on a limb" and that probably two score or more who had been in doubt voted for expungition simply because of the member's own statement.

Given the right to edit his speech, Mr. Blanton said he would have printed the words "just as it is" before printing, but in the distress that followed a vote of censure by the house and a public reprimand by the speaker he had overlooked them. These were the words Mr. Garrett had asked to be eliminated, but which remained upon the instance of Mr. Mondell.

Printing Inquiry Sought.
Mr. Blanton told members today he merely wanted to say in reply to Mr. Longworth that he would reprint and circulate his speech without including profane and obscene words, alleged to have been used by employees of the printing office and put into the form of an affidavit and filed with the public printer.

The Texas was in his seat when the house convened and stayed there most of the day.

Investigation of conditions at the public printing office by a special committee of five members was proposed in a resolution today by Representative Lineberger, republican, California. During his fight yesterday to retain his seat, Representative Blanton charged that it was practically impossible for a non-union man to work at the office.

ALBANY COLLEGE, Albany, Or., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—An organization of Albany college alumni residing in Linn county has been formed to assist in the present campaign for an increased endowment for the college and the obtaining of a fund to use in the erection of buildings on the new campus. A group of alumni was named to undertake the work of obtaining the addresses of all ex-students of the college as well as alumni and participate otherwise in the campaign.

STOLEN CAR IS FOUND
Machine Taken From Astoria Located at Lovelock, Nev.

ASTORIA, Or., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—A message was received by the police today stating that the touring car stolen from Joe Andre of this city on September 9 is in the possession of Sheriff Jurgeson at Lovelock, Nev.

The car was rented by Mr. Andre last September to Emil J. Lundewig and Delores Bloom, two ex-soldiers of Fort Stevens who failed to return the car. Upon investigation it was learned that they had left the city with Myrtle, a well-known local Chinese girl, and Gertrude Kiljunen, 16, both of this city.

HONOR PAID REFORMER
Work of Frances E. Willard Recalled in School Programmes.

Honor was paid to the memory and deeds of Frances E. Willard, American educator, reformer and temperance crusader, by appropriate exercises in the public schools of Oregon yesterday.

All high schools and grammar schools of Portland carried out in some degree the official programme for Frances E. Willard day prepared by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction. Copies of the programme had been sent to school principals recently with the suggestion that they use as much of the material as possible.

The programme provided for the singing of patriotic songs, readings and discussion of Miss Willard's activities, and talks on national prohibition and the anti-cigarette law of Oregon.

Miss Willard was president of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and later a member of the executive committee and president of the world's W. C. T. U. She wrote a number of books and pamphlets, and was a contributor to magazines.

STILLMAN BOYS STAKE
MOTHER'S PLEA FOR GUARDIANSHIP IS HELD UP.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—(Special.)—Cohalan reserved decision today on an application of Mrs. Anna U. Stillman for guardianship of her two sons, James 17 and Alexander 11. Both boys will have a week to present briefs.

Opposing the application, Outbridge Hovey of Mr. Stillman's counsel, said the father had wisely handed James' personal property of \$157,110, yielding \$11,885 a year, and the \$1999 in securities owned by the younger son. He denied the boys were specific beneficiaries under any trust funds and said their holdings were largely presents from their father and grandfather.

Counsel for Mrs. Stillman, replying to Mr. Hovey's declaration that the father did not want the boys to squander their money and that Mrs. Stillman was inexperienced in business affairs, declared she was thoroughly equipped to care for their material as well as physical welfare.

OIL PERMIT IS REVOKED
Portland-Texas Company to Be Reorganized.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—It was announced today that T. E. Handley, state corporation commissioner, had revoked the permit of the Portland-Texas Oil company, with headquarters in Portland, to sell stock in the company pending an audit of the books of the company and a complete reorganization of the corporation's affairs.

GRANGE ROW UP AGAIN
STATE OFFICERS SEEK TO ENJOIN MR. BOUCK.

Judge Ronald Takes Under Advice—Request for Temporary Injunction in Case.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—Judge Ronald today took under advisement the granting of a temporary injunction preventing William Bouck and his followers from using the name of the Washington state grange or the title "Fraternal of Husbandry" in connection with their organization, which is attempting to function as the state grange in spite of the national grange. The national organization recently ousted Bouck from the grange. A meeting was held in Seattle and Bouck was elected head of an organization which is defying the national officers.

The suit was brought by the officers of the state grange as recognized by the national organization, and against the officials elected by the group that has not been recognized. It is the contention of the regular organization members that the insurgent organization should be restricted from proceeding with grange work.

Attorneys for the regulars asserted that the insurgent organization was being done irreparable damage by permitting the present insurgent organization to continue to hold out to the grange that it is the regular organization and to invite them to co-operate with it. Bouck's attorneys replied with evidence that he and his followers were all regular early elected members of the Washington grange. It was asserted that Bouck's status within the grange had not been finally determined. The attorneys asked that the courts leave the matter to the grange, allowing it to be settled through the regular channels of the organization.

It was asserted that Bouck had defied the national organization and asserted his intention of continuing as head of the Washington grange despite the national officials. A week ago Judge Ronald dissolved a temporary injunction that had been issued by Presiding Judge Smith placing the same restrictions upon the new organization that are sought in the temporary injunction. At the conclusion of the argument today the judge asserted that he desired to review carefully the legal issues involved before announcing a decision.

WARREN RUDE, 89, BURIED.
SOUTH BEND, Wash., Oct. 28.—
(Special.)—Warren Rude, 89 years old, the oldest Mason in Pacific county, was buried here yesterday. Rude was a member of Hobart, Okla. lodge. He came to South Bend 15 years ago, but has not been in active business here. He is survived by three sons and the widow. The South Bend Masonic lodge assisted in the funeral services.
