

SUICIDE ATTEMPTED BY EVELYN NESBIT

Ex-Wife of Harry K. Thaw
Expected to Recover.

EVICTON CAUSES DEED

Overdose of Morphine Is Taken
While Furniture Is Being
Moved Into Street.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Evelyn Nesbit, one-time wife of Harry K. Thaw, took an overdose of morphine today and screamed to a marshal, posted outside her apartment to evict her, that she had swallowed enough poison to kill 20 persons.

Miss Nesbit was resting comfortably tonight.

It was a vivid day in the life of Miss Nesbit, who after the Harry Thaw marriage became the wife of a dancer, Jack Clifford, and who now no longer a dancer herself, owns a tea room in the theater district.

Distress Recently Revealed.

Her financial distress, which caused all the excitement today, came to light a month ago when a city marshal appeared at her tea room with an eviction warrant. Miss Nesbit arranged to pay overdue rent in the \$300-a-month tea room and her \$150-a-month apartment upstairs. The marshal went away.

Today another came on a similar mission and began taking furniture out to the street while Miss Nesbit sobbed, wrung her hands and frantically called her lawyer on the telephone. The lawyer obtained a truce of a few hours with the landlord, and Miss Nesbit began calling friends in the hope of raising some cash. In this she failed.

Telegram Sent to Mother.

She telegraphed to her mother in Philadelphia and a few minutes afterward leaned out of the window and screamed:

"I've taken enough morphine to kill 20 persons," she yelled to the marshal, falling back with the cry that she was going to die.

An ambulance surgeon came quickly and used a stomach pump.

An ambulance arrived in a few minutes and after antedotes had been administered, the ambulance surgeon left his patient, exclaiming from her promise to walk up and down the length of her apartment supported on either side by the waitresses. This the surgeon impressed upon her attendants, was to keep Miss Nesbit from lapsing into unconsciousness.

ROAD SUE FOR \$25,000

Death of Sergeant Basis of Action
Against North Bank.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—A \$25,000 damage suit brought by W. A. Wells, as administrator of the estate of W. J. Shover, against the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad, was begun in superior court today.

The case has to do with the death of Mr. Shover, who was a sergeant of the engineer corps, stationed at Vancouver barracks in December, 1917. Mr. Shover lost his life when he fell off the top of a box car which was being shunted on the spur to the army post.

On the point as to whether Mr. Shover had the right to be aboard the car in the performance of his army duty, he is survived by a widow and child. Ex-soldier witnesses are being brought to the stand from as far away as Wyoming and Montana.

ILLINOIS CHIEF COMING

Governor Lowden to Lead Delegation to Livestock Show.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Frank O. Lowden, ex-governor of Illinois, president of the Holstein-Friesian association of America, will lead a delegation of middle western and eastern cattle breeders leaving here November 4 to attend the Pacific International Livestock exposition at Portland, Or., November 1-12.

ROADBUILDING FUND WINS

House Conferees Yield to Appropriation to Aid States.

C., Oct. 28.—The deadlock between senate and house conferees on the \$75,000,000 bill for federal aid in roadbuilding was broken today when the latter, under authority given by a special house vote, yielded to the senate demand for a straight appropriation to continue federal aid to the states as a substitute for the house provision merely for an authorization of funds.
