Ovation Given Generals

Vice-President Coolidge Arrives to Represent Harding.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 30.—Men from points as far east as New England to as far west as San Francisco, with their wives and relatives, had arrived today to attend the convention of the American Legion, which begins tomorrow.

Included in the hundreds of arrivals were General Armando Diaz of Belgium and General Baron Jacques of Belgium. They arrived within half an hour of each other and were given rousing welcomes.

Another notable to come was Vice-President Coolidge, who will be President Harding's official representative.

The western city tonight was a riot of color. Olive and drab colors were much in evidence.

Three outstanding questions are engaging the attention of legion members—the choice of the next commander, the selection of the next convention city and a fight to bring the permanent headquarters from Indianapolis to this city.

There seemed to be a general acceptance among delegates that a man from the south or west would be the next commander.

New Orleans and San Francisco apparently have come out as the strongest contenders for the next convention.

The legion began work today, after several hundred resolutions.

All preparations had been completed today for seating the delegations at the big convention.

The credentials committee today certified the total convention voters at 1960.

Delegates from Alaska, Africa, Chile, the British Isles, Canada, Panama, China, Cuba, France, Guatemala, Hawaii, Mexico, Japan, Peru, Porto Rico and Turkey will be seated.

Foch Welcome Pleases France.

PARIS, Oct. 30.—The French press except the socialist and communist newspapers today devotes much space to the reception in the United States of Marshal Foch, expressing great satisfaction over the warmth of the greetings accorded him in New York and Washington.

The French foreign office being notified only a few minutes before the train left.

French official circles are relieved that Alexander is about to take the throne. The king's party has been anxious to make it known that the delay in his return was due only to ill health.

Alexander proclaimed acceptance of the crown from Paris on October 17.

ST. LOUIS JOINS PROSPEROUS TRADE

Steel Barges Take Freight Down Mississippi.

SHOE FACTORY RUSHED

Wage Scale Lowered Somewhat, But Conditions Declared to Have Avoided Extremes.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—Festus J. Wade, president of the Mercantile Trust company, says the largest three wholesale dry goods companies in St. Louis are doing the biggest business in volume of goods in their history, and that the largest four retail department stores likewise are doing the largest volume of business in their history.

Buying was curtailed in the early part of the year, he adds, owing to the low price of cotton, but when the south's great staple crop went to 20 cents a pound there developed a brisk business in every line of endeavor here.

Joseph R. Barlow, who manages the business of Butler Bros. in a territory covering seven or more states, says he has received orders for goods valued at about 20 per cent in volume above the record of their biggest year—1920.

Shoe Orders Rush Company.

President Rand of the International Shoe company says his company is behind in filling orders, although manufacturing 60 per cent more shoes than ever before. Last year its shipments amounted to \$50,000,000. This year will show \$15,000,000 increase.

He describes the great demand for the St. Louis-made shoe to the fact that it is of standard character and has been brought down to within 42 per cent of 1914 prices, while shoes of the country making shoes of other styles have been unable to reduce overhead charges and have been left heavily overstocked.

Labor conditions here, he explains, are not so extreme as in the east and, although the wage scale has been somewhat lower in St. Louis, the Missouri shoe worker has made more money.

Improvement Is Noted.

Aaron Rath, vice-president of the great dry goods house of H. C. & Co., reports collections improving in the south before the advance in cotton. He has had a steady liquidation in his warehouse, which he expected would have to be carried over into next year. Sentiment has been improving steadily. A cold fall and winter will mean greater improvement.

A. W. Douglas, vice-president of the Simmons Hardware company, said there had been a moderate improvement in his business.

Paul Brown, editor of "America at Work," called attention to the fact that the unemployment figures are 60 per cent greater than in September last year.

The government reports are that there are 69,500 unemployed here. Various persons question the accuracy of the government figures. It is not proposed that St. Louis will be a city of the future.

The first municipal lodging house opens November 1.

Steel Center Planned.

St. Louis has visions of becoming the steel center of the west.

Over at Granite City, Ill., just north of East St. Louis, the St. Louis Coke & Chemical company has a \$10,000,000 plant in which it is making high grade coke out of the highly volatile coal of southern Illinois, which was supposed to be useless for steel making.

There are 80 coke ovens and one blast furnace in the plant. Out of 2000 tons of coal a day the recovery is 70 per cent in coke. Also there are products of tar, ammonium sulphate, benzol, toluol and xylol. The gas surplus goes to East St. Louis for use by that city and by the National Enameling & Stamping company in its mills.

This is the first time high volatile coal has been used in such large volume in coking. There is said to be a very great economy in the process used at Granite City, based on the fact that the time employed in the making of the coke, and in the by-products. These economies are expected to draw steel plants to the St. Louis district and give full play to the great advantages it possesses by its central location and its command of the Mississippi river.

Rivalry Is Expected.

Pittsburg and Gary have a rival in the making.

But while St. Louis sees great possibilities in coke and steel plants, it has some embarrassments which it must meet now or it will have trouble, more trouble than it has today. The city has some 25 or 30 railroads of big and moderate size. They have an amount of yardage that is appalling. Each road appropriated such space as it could to the city.

As usual the roads that were there before the new arrival did nothing to aid the new arrival. The result has been the growth of a horribly complex and utterly inefficient mass of tracks on each side of the river through which it is a long and difficult job to get freight. Not until a scientific and simple yard system is devised will St. Louis be able to handle freight, local or through, expeditiously and economically.

It is said it not infrequently takes a week to get a car through the maze of tracks from one main line on one side of the river to its train on the main line on the other side of the Mississippi and no man knows how many handlings it has made. It will be necessary for all the railroads to forget their rivalries and join in the work of correction or this situation will be a source of embarrassment to the city.

But railroads are slow to do this.

HARDING'S SPEECH WELCOMED IN SOUTH

Reports of Hostility Are Declared Premature.

STAND HELD RIGHT ONE

Danger of Some Negro Leaders Misunderstanding Remarks on Racial Equality Noted.

(No presidential speech of recent years has stirred the country as did Mr. Harding's Birmingham utterances on the race question. In the following article Mr. Stanley reflects the reaction of Birmingham and of the southern people to that speech. In the editorial comment which follows it is a commendation of Mr. Harding by two Birmingham papers and a rebuke by one.)

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—Reports which attribute to the people of Birmingham hostility to the remarks of President Harding Wednesday night, are premature and ill considered. When the president urged equality of economic and political opportunity for the white and black races he also said that men of both races may well stand uncompromisingly against every suggestion of social equality.

And he emphasized the fact that every economic and political equality should be proportioned to the house capacities and deserts of the individuals.

These views are unquestionably in accord with the best thought, not only in Birmingham but in the entire south. There unquestionably has been a misunderstanding of the mass psychology of the negro and misinterpretation of certain confusion or certain silences in the audience which heard the president speak.

About 30,000 Hear Speech.

It was estimated that there were between 30,000 and 40,000 people in Capitol park during the address. It was physically impossible for them to hear the president, and the saying of a section on one side was reserved for negroes and the section was filled almost to suffocation. Every time the president turned toward them they cheered as only negroes can cheer a republican president. Most of them couldn't hear a word he said. Those on the other side, who likewise could not hear, in turn began their noise making, many of them thinking that the president had said something very pleasing to his negro hearers. It is true that there is and probably always will be those in the south and elsewhere who are jealous of any suggestion of justice to the negro race. Some of them were probably in Wednesday's audience, but they do not represent Alabama, nor do they represent Birmingham.

It is a fair assertion that the daily newspapers of Birmingham reflect the sentiment of the people of Birmingham. Here is what the Age Herald said editorially on the president's address.

Harding's Solution Lauded.

President Harding offered a practical, common sense solution of the race problem. His views coincide with the best thought in this part of the country, and will be cordially approved. He spoke on the broad grounds of humanity and an equality of opportunity but he drew a sharp distinction between economic and social equality.

Southern leaders, white and black, have already accepted the doctrine laid down by President Harding.

It cannot be denied that politics have had much to do with aggravating the race question in the south. The cry of "black domination" has served demagogues ever since the civil war and continues to do so. This is due largely to the fact that negroes have been closely identified with the attempts of the republican party to gain a foothold in the south and have been used by the party and by politicians for their own selfish ends.

The Birmingham News, after pointing out that the president "has expressed the viewpoint," proceeds:

"The south will have no quarrel with President Harding upon his address. If the speech was greeted in a measure of silence it was because such statements from a president should be greeted with silence. The people were thinking and reflecting. It was not a matter for cheering but for study."
