

WESTERN SENATORS ASK HIGHER TARIFF

Increase in Levies on Cattle,
Hides and Butter Wanted.

MR. McNARY URGES BILL

Veterans Told of Benefits to Be
Derived Under Reclamation
Measure; Support Asked.

Washington, Oct. 31.—Western senators who organized some time ago to work for higher duties on agricultural products than those fixed by the Fordney bill, which passed the house, met again today and agreed upon certain revised rates to be requested of the senate finance committee when hearings on the permanent tariff bill begin Thursday. The following increases in duties were agreed upon:

Cattle on hoof, 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents a pound; dressed, 3 to 3 1/2 cents a pound; butter, 8 to 10 cents a pound; green hides, 1 1/2 to 2 cents a pound; and halibut and salmon, 1 to 2 cents a pound.

Bean Rate Cut to Be Asked.
The senate finance committee will be asked to reduce the rate on beans carried in the Fordney bill from 3 1/2 to 2 cents.

At the close of the meeting the executive committee of the western senators met and discussed the bill. Senator McNary, chairman of the finance committee, and obtained from him a promise to report out tomorrow morning the bill extending the emergency tariff law to February 1.

Today's meeting was attended by Senators Jones of Washington and Warren of Wyoming, who have not heretofore participated in any of the conferences. Senator Gooding of Idaho presided. Senators McNary and Stanford took part in the discussions on all of the proposed schedules.

Senator Polinder sent his regrets to the conference, saying that he was sorry of his inability to attend because of other business, but that he was in thorough accord with the purposes of his western colleagues.

Veterans Want Reclamation.
Telegrams pouring in upon Senator McNary today from the national convention of the American Legion at Kansas City indicated that irrigation of the arid lands of the west is one of the big subjects under consideration by the veterans. Some of these telegrams disclosed that the legislative committee of the legion had not an accurate understanding of the \$250,000,000 general reclamation program carried in the bill introduced jointly in the senate and the house by Senator McNary and Representative Smith of Idaho.

It appears that the legionnaires had not obtained the latest draft of the McNary-Smith bill. Senator McNary replied, explaining that the bill as reported to the senate in June carries by use of the homestead law all of the free land provisions desired by the soldiers. Upon this statement he asked the legion to give its support to his measure. He said that he would consent to amend his bill to provide for paying out of the federal treasury all interest charges on construction costs on projects assessed against service men.

Legion Support Expected.
This offer is expected to enlist the American legion as a body in behalf of the passage of the McNary bill. Senator McNary's telegram to the legion read:

"My perfected reclamation bill, accompanied by report filed June 27 last, provides service men shall have preference right to enter on open public lands under homestead law, thus providing them with free lands. Absolutely necessary in order to finance construction of irrigation works in comprehensive way to retain irrigation district principle with power to issue bonds in order to keep sum liquid, thereby providing rapid turnovers for new projects.

"Will favor amendment to my bill that interest charges on construction costs of the projects assessed against service men be paid out of federal appropriations. My bill then as amended would give the soldier free public lands and money free from interest charges. I should like to see the American Legion in its annual convention recommend this proposed measure, as I believe it will do much for the soldier in the matter of land settlement."

States does not rest on her physical resources alone. Her moral position is impregnable. Not only will she never seek additional territory by conquest; she would not accept it as a gift.

"Within her borders lie unoccupied lands sufficient to sustain a population twice that which she now has."

Well, indeed, may she rest contented—a friend to all nations and, so far as her people are aware, without an enemy in the world.

"The coming conference, therefore, presages no arbitrament of the sword. It is an ordeal not of battle but of faith."

He recalled the embarkation of America during the war on a naval programme designed to make the American navy equal to that of any other power and continued:

Naval Construction Cut.
"There was no criticism of that prudent action then. That programme was in process of execution in the early part of the present year. Suddenly there came a change. The president announced his intention of calling a conference. Practically simultaneously at the instigation of the president, congress reduced the naval construction programme."

mat appropriation from \$184,000,000 to \$20,000,000, which, taking into account the increased costs of labor and materials, represented nearly 40 per cent of the sum which ordinarily would be allotted.

"Consequently the present rate of naval construction is about 40 per cent of the normal."

Furthermore he commented, the stipulation of congress prevents "in any event except war itself," the beginning of the building of a warship of any type before July 1, 1922.

The deduction was irresistible, he continued.

President Has No Illusion.
"The president," he said, "seems to say by his acts that the way to disarm is to disarm. Even so, his clear vision is dimmed by no illusion. None knows better than he that the traditions of centuries cannot be swept aside overnight, now more fully realized than to attempt too much is to jeopardize the prospect of any fulfillment."

Whatever the outcome of the Washington deliberations, he declared, conditions cannot remain the same. With the ending of the conference will surely come to the hearts of hundreds of millions either gladdening hope or deepening despair.

So, too, with the relations of our beloved countries. The bonds of friendship and forbearance, which now hold us more closely together than ever before in a century, are bound to be strengthened or relaxed by what happens in Washington. If we cannot act in unison now there is slight reason to believe we ever can.

"The project of raising from the straining backs of peoples the burdens of great armaments offers a line of less resistance than was ever before presented. No less essential is the removal of the causes of war which still hover over the Pacific. More difficult, but is not a happy luxury to be found in the fact that all such dread possibilities have disappeared from the Atlantic."

The Washington conference marks only the beginning of the trail, only the beginning. Yet greater works are to follow in fulfillment of the common
