BLOW DEALT BOOTLEGGERS.—The bootlegging industry of Portland received a blow yesterday when Judge Bean decided that intoxicating liquor seized by the police would be recognized as evidence in the federal court whether it was taken with or without a search warrant. John Remak, Michael Zarkovich and Antoni Kozumich had been arrested by the police, who seized from them a suitcase containing liquor without first having obtained a search warrant. The court sought the return of the liquor through the federal court.

ARMISTICE PRAYERS PLANNED.—A "quiet hour of prayer" and thanksgiving will be observed in the auditorium of the Portland Y. M. C. A. tomorrow in commemoration of the ending of the world war by the signing of the armistice. A public meeting will be held from 11 to 12 o'clock. Prayers will be spoken in thankfulness for the conclusion of the great war. J. W. Palmer, executive secretary of the department of social and religious work of the Y. M. C. A., will preside.

KITCHEN IS PROPOSED.—A kitchen will be established next year in the city jail to prepare food for prisoners. The question was presented to the council by Chief of Police Jenkins last year, but was rejected. At that time it was estimated that \$2070 would be required for equipment and that \$6500 would cover the cost of the food. The city pays out approximately \$16,000 a year for meals purchased under contract. The question is now under advisement.

DAMAGE SUIT TRIAL OPENS.—The suit of Henry A. Schmidt of Tillamook against the Cudahy Packing company for \$25,000 damages alleged to have been inflicted when he was struck by one of the company's automobiles while walking on a sidewalk near Tillamook started yesterday in the federal court before Judge Wolverton. In addition to the \$25,000 Schmidt is seeking \$1000 punitive damages and \$1000 punitive damages.

The legion post of the city has arranged a programme which, in all respects, will typify army life in France. There will be singing, acting and dancing.
