

## BOTH SIDES REST IN ARBUCKLE CASE

Final Arguments to Be Presented Today.

FATTY IS MORE JOVIAL

Physician Testifies for Prosecution That Rupture of Bladder Is Not Spontaneous.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30.—Both sides rested today in the manslaughter trial of Rose C. (Fatty) Arbuckle, but the prosecution reserved the right to question two physicians and introduce other testimony and the defense answered that it expected to rebut such new testimony. Prosecution counsel announced it would conclude finally by noon tomorrow. It was generally understood that the final arguments would begin with the calling of the afternoon session.

Arbuckle is charged with having caused the death of Miss Virginia Rappe.

Opposing counsel agreed upon four hours to each side for final argument. This would put the case in the jury's hands some time Friday afternoon.

The announced ending of the testimony taking today saw a slackening of public interest toward the case, although the courtroom and adjoining corridors were thronged. The tension among counsel and spectators that had marked the period on Monday when Arbuckle was on the stand was absent, but threats of perjury prosecution against a certain defense witness made today's session more a matter of general curiosity than would have been the case otherwise.

**Perjury Charge Answered.**  
The defense's efforts today were shaped to some extent toward answering this perjury charge. In defense of Mrs. Minnie Neighbors of Los Angeles, who testified that she had seen Miss Rappe at a health resort in Ventura county in August of this year, and who was made the subject of the charge as a result of her testimony, the defense produced an employee of the resort who said she also saw Miss Rappe there. The charge against Mrs. Neighbors followed testimony by Mrs. Mary Poulin, hostess of the resort, that there was no record of Miss Rappe ever having stopped there.

The prosecution announced also that it had the testimony of Mrs. Irene Morgan, a British war nurse and defense witness, under close examination to determine on its accuracy, but that no charge was contemplated.

Mrs. Josephine Harbeck, housekeeper for Miss Rappe, and Mrs. Minnie Buck, practical nurse, and others, all from Los Angeles, testified in prosecution rebuttal that they had known Miss Rappe for varying periods and that her health appeared good at all times.

**Rupture Held Not Spontaneous.**  
This testimony was offered to offset defense evidence that Miss Rappe's fatal injury was the climax of a chronic condition of long standing and was not caused by external force applied by Arbuckle as alleged by the prosecution. A leading witness today was Dr. Rufus L. Rigdon, San Francisco physician, who was called by the prosecution to rebut defense evidence that bladder injuries of the sort which resulted in the death of Miss Rappe could be caused by agencies other than external force. Dr. Rigdon testified that he knew of no case of bladder injury where such injury was purely internal or spontaneous in character.

Even a bladder which became gradually over-distended would not rupture, he said, as other organs would be fatally affected before such rupture occurred.

A feature tomorrow will be the introduction of a report by a medical commission of three which was named to determine whether Miss Rappe's bladder was healthy at the time he is alleged to have been fatally injured by Arbuckle. One of the experts was appointed by the court and the others by each side.

**Each Side Gets Four Hours.**  
Arbuckle displayed a feeling of relief today. He smiled widely at final adjournment and seemed to take the day's developments as being in his favor.

District Attorney Brady reiterated past statements, however, that the state has proved a strong case against Arbuckle and that there is considerable likelihood of his being convicted.

Mr. Brady announced that Leo Friedman, assistant district attorney, who has examined many of the witnesses, would make the first closing argument for the prosecution. The defense offered to submit the case without argument, but the prosecution declined the offer, and the defense thereupon said it would be satisfied with three hours for its final presentation. The prosecution named four hours and this was the time agreed upon.

Much of the testimony in the trial was that of medical experts, the issue appearing to rest as much upon this character of evidence as upon the actual happenings at the party in which Arbuckle is alleged to have fatally injured Miss Rappe.

## CHANCELLOR WIRTH ABUSED FOR SILENCE

Failure to Reply to Briand Rouses Ire of Germans.

OPPORTUNITY IS PASSED

Newspapers Declare France Has No Reason to Fear Teutons Who Cannot Make War.

The embarrassment in which Chancellor Wirth finds himself because of the lack of what he considers a proper method of replying to Premier Briand's accusations before the Washington conference has set loose a flood of abuse upon his head.

The mental picture of M. Briand leaving the conference while the effect of his eloquence was undiminished and the thought of the congratulations that were showered on the French premier have enraged the Germans, who feel they should have thrown his charges back in his teeth.

The Tagliche Rundschau expresses a strong desire to know why Dr. Wirth did not send a diplomatic note to Secretary Hughes protesting against M. Briand's assertions. This newspaper says the time for that is past, as the impression made by Briand has sunk into America.

**Silence Astonishes America.**  
It adds: "Chancellor Wirth's silence astonishes America, and everywhere people are asking why Germany does not make an official answer to Briand."

Dr. Wirth's reason for silence is that Germany was not invited to the conference, so she will not intrude. Vorwaerts, a coalition newspaper, says: "The question asked everywhere, why Germany had no reply to Briand's accusations? Is easily answered. Germany was not invited to the conference, so officially she can only listen and maintain silence."

Vorwaerts says: "The German newspapers may be able to do what the government cannot. It declares it was a one-sided method to make charges against a country which was not represented at the conference."

**Briand's Convention Loses Force.**  
Premier Briand's claim that it is necessary for France to keep armed because of the German danger loses force, because the question of Germany's power to attack was not discussed. Had a representative of Germany been able to present the conference with the sober facts, M. Briand's rhetorical triumph would have been much briefer. It is true that the old German military spirit is not completely dead, it is true that there are hidden nests of arms and munitions in Germany, but it is also true that the immense majority of Germans want peace and that the hidden arms may be not more than the number of those which French soldiers bear openly in French and German towns.

**German Generals Know Facts.**  
Only idiots find it possible to believe that a nation can go to war with hidden arms, and whatever one may think of the old German general, they are not idiots in the science of war. No general of the old army is fool enough to believe he can start a new war with rifles which may have been pulled out of mattresses and with cartridges which have been lying in dung heaps.

"From the German standpoint we can only deplore it if France is not given all the guarantees she seeks against a German attack before she is willing to disarm. As no sane man in Germany is thinking of attacking France, it makes no difference to us how many guarantees France has against an attack. But as a contributor to the armament of France and as a neighbor, Germany has an intense interest in seeing France freed from the military spirit which poisons the relations of the two peoples."

**Royal Arch Chapter Organized.**  
CENTRALIA, Wash., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—John M. Aronson of Tacoma, grand high priest of Royal Arch Masons, Friday night will institute the recently organized Centralia chapter of the order. The ceremony will be preceded at 8:30 o'clock by a turkey supper. The chapter will have a membership of about 50. It will operate under a dispensation until next June, when the grand chapter will be petitioned for a charter.

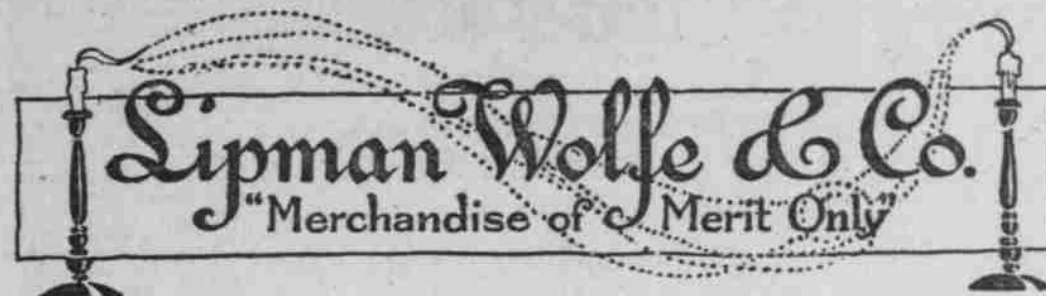

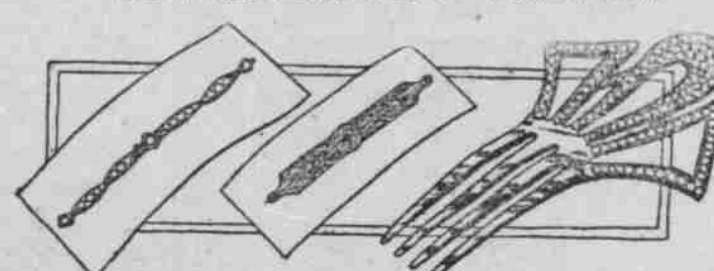

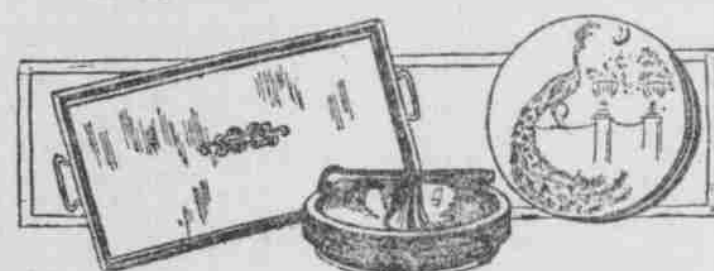
