BODY TO REST IN VAULT

Burial in Louisville to Be Made in Spring -- "Marse Henry" Known for Fearlessness.

JACKSONVILLE, Fia., Dec. 22 .-Colone: Henry Watterson, known to the American people as one of the last surviving members of the old school of journalism and to his friends "Marse Henry," died early today a hotel here.

Death came peacefully, the venerable editor rataining consciousness almost to the end, and conversing during his last half hour with his

during his last half hour with his wife, son and daughter. Colonel Watterson came to Jack-monville several weeks ago in ac-cordance with annual custom of pass-ing the winter in Florida, usually at Fort Myers. He contracted a slight cold Tuesday and while seated in a chair yesterday morning soon after breakfast he suffered an acute bron-chial attack and was ordered to his chial attack and was ordered to his bed by his physician.

His condition grew worse during the day and night and the end came at 6:15 this morning. The immediate cause of his death, his physicians


