

SNIPERS AT BELFAST KILL TWO, HURT SIX

Shooting Resumed With More Serious Results.

CHILD IN ARMS IS HIT

Boy of 14 Is One of Victims of Marksmen While Butchers at Work Are Targets.

BELFAST, Jan. 2.—Sporadic exchanges of shots that had been proceeding for 24 hours or more between members of the rival factions here without serious result became graver today. In the early hours two men were shot and severely wounded. Another man was shot in the head when a bullet grazed his neck.

After a lull caused by intervention of the crowd, the sniping was resumed at midday, with further serious consequences. One bullet passed through the head of a 14-year-old youth and struck a child in his mother's arms. Both children were mortally injured.

In the York street area this afternoon Alexander Turle was shot dead by the military.

John Murphy and his brother Francis were targets for marksmen as the two brothers were at work in their butcher shop on York street. John Murphy was struck by a bullet and critically injured.

Another death occurred when the 14-year-old youth who was struck in the head during the noon hour died early tonight.

PEOPLE APPEAR FOR TREATY

Speculation Rife as to Effect of Expressions on Dail Members.

DUBLIN, Jan. 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—The question of outstanding interest in the Irish situation discussed by the Dublin newspapers this morning is the effect of expressions of public sentiment in favor of ratification of the Anglo-Irish treaty will have on the opponents in the Dail. The Freeman's Journal and the Irish Independent declare the will of the people must prevail, the Freeman's Journal saying:

"No sophistry, however fine spun, can disguise the fact that to thwart this will would be to betray a sacred trust. That sort of treachery makes no appeal to Irishmen."

The Independent expresses the utmost confidence that the opponents of the treaty in the Dail will heed the popular voice, but a political writer in the Irish Times says there is no ground for this confidence. The Dail meets tomorrow "it will be any better disposed toward ratification."

At the week-end meetings of public organizations and Sinn Fein clubs strong appeals were made for the preservation of national unity. Speaking at a meeting of the Limerick county council, Councillor Michael Ryan declared negotiations were taking place in Dublin that would lead to a unanimous decision. No confirmation of his statement is available here, but it is evident that much is going on behind the scenes of which the press is kept in the dark.

The newspapers welcome the New Year message of Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, the Freeman's Journal saying that if his appeal meets with the response it deserves peace will not be long delayed.

"The tiniest spark of good feeling shown by the six counties," it adds, "would kindle bonfires throughout Ireland."

Display advertisements in today's Dublin newspaper announce details regarding the appearance tomorrow of the newspaper to be called The Republic of Ireland, which "stands for the absolute independence of Ireland."

It will be published by a committee of direction comprising Charles Burrell, the Dail minister of defense; Austin Stack, minister of home affairs; J. J. O'Dell, Erskine Childers, Robert Brennan and other members of the Dail. Countess Markiewicz, Miss Mary MacSwiney and Mrs. Kate O'Sullivan. The name of Eamon de Valera, it was noted with interest, does not appear on the list.

The editor of the new publication is Liam Mellows, member of the Dail for East Galway, who is widely known in the United States.

The newspaper, the announcement states, will be published daily during the remaining sessions of the Dail to state the case of the opponents of the treaty.

Resolutions in favor of ratification kept pouring into the mansion house today, and up to tonight only two bodies which had expressed themselves unfavorably had been reported. Virtually all members of the Dail Eireann had arrived tonight for the resumption of the sessions tomorrow to give further consideration to the peace treaty with Great Britain.

As far as could be gathered from conversations with members, the Christmas recess has not materially altered the lineup for and against the treaty.

It had been supposed the campaign in the country in favor of ratification of the treaty, supported by pronouncements of the Irish bishop and by resolutions not only of public representative bodies but of important units in the Sinn Fein organization, would have weakened the attitude of treaty opponents and induce them to vote in its favor.

An estimate made by one political leader gave 58 votes on each side, with four votes doubtful or "abstentionist."

A leader of the party favorable to the treaty said to the Associated Press today that he did not believe the vote of any of the men previously ranged against the treaty would be turned in its favor and that the majority for the treaty which in any event must be small, must depend on obtemperances from voting rather than on the transfer of votes.

Rumors of compromise and accommodation, as well as a statement that Eamon de Valera had decided to withdraw his alternative plan no longer are credited here. De Valera's original idea was to put forward his plan in the event of a rejection of the treaty, but his most intimate counselors say now that he will put it forward in any event.

PENROSE'S DEATH BLOW

illness and everybody liked him so that no one would suggest he should abdicate any of his responsibilities.

Penrose, in good health, was a big man and attractive in proportion to his resolute strength and courage. He was a bachelor. Power was his only child, and some of the more intimate aspects of his last two years were as poignant as a Greek tragedy. When

ever his physical weakness overcame him, his first interest was not to let it interfere with his public duties. It is a picturesque way of putting it, but it is probably true that if Penrose had come from California instead of Philadelphia, he would have been one of the greatest statesmen of his time. The mere nearness of his home state, three hours away, kept him a politician, consuming his time in matters of patronage and factions.

Weaker Men Gravitate to Him. Weaker men gravitated to him like hungry bees, consumed his time and fed upon his personality.

He had one of the best minds that ever functioned on the senate floor. Whenever he took part in debate, he beat his opponent by his sheer directness of thinking and boldness in expression. Probably the greatest weakness he had was his scorn of weaker men, of men less for the right or otherwise lacking in the will and strength of personality that he himself carried so easily. Penrose, in his prime, took the world as he found it, never compromised and never wined.

To "stand the gaff" was as easy for him as eating a meal or drinking a glass in the day's work. Penrose didn't hate insurgents as such. He merely despised some of them because they were weak men, or because he thought they were "soreheads," or because he felt, according to his way of thinking, that they were hypocrites who fooled the public. It is a striking fact that among the few senators for whom he ever showed much affection was La Follette. He liked La Follette because he had many of his own qualities of directness, pugnacity and intellectual integrity according to his light.

Penrose was a monumental figure. The history of the country has altered and changed by his illness, and will be more different yet because of his death.

DISTILLER IS MADE PEER

ORDER OF MERIT CONFERRED ON SIR JAMES M. BARRIE.

Honor Given Writer Is One of Highest at Command of King of England.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—Sir James M. Barrie is the most conspicuous recipient of the New Year's honor. He has received the order of merit for services to literature and drama. This is one of the highest honors and is strictly limited in numbers, others holding the decoration including Lord Curzon, Lord Balfour, Lord Morley and Thomas Hardy.

Four new peers are created—Sir James Buchanan, the famous whisky distiller; Sir Robert Nivison, financial adviser to the government and the overseas dominions; Joseph Watson, railway director and prominent in the horse-racing world; and Lieutenant Colonel Francis V. Wiley, head of the Colson and Boston (Mass.) firm of wool merchants.

Among the new knights are Gerald Du Maurier, actor-manager, and the actor, Charles Hawtrey; James J. Bush, Shannon, the artist; L. Adon Ronald, musician; Professor W. Abbott Herdman, scientist, and Colonel Joseph, chairman of the press association.

Among the women appearing in the new order of the British empire is Marchioness Curzon of Kedleston, wife of the secretary for foreign affairs, who was the daughter of the late J. Monroe Hinds, United States minister to Brazil and widow of Alfred Curzon of Buenos Aires. Mrs. Hughes, wife of the Australian premier, receives the same order.

SHERIFF IS BANK ROBBER

SIX OTHER MEN ARE ALSO ARRESTED IN ILLINOIS.

Woman Said to Have Confessed to Use of Home as Place Where Their Loot Was Divided.

HILLSBORO, Ill., Jan. 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—Arrest of Sheriff Wilson and six other men in connection with the \$31,000 robbery of the Panama State bank, resulted from the disclosures of a woman who implicated her own husband in the case. It was announced this morning by State Attorney Rainey, Mrs. Jerry Brown, the state's attorney said, made a detailed statement of the use of her home as a rendezvous by the alleged robbers. She implicated her own husband, Mr. Rainey announced, and declared she determined to tell what she knew after Mr. Brown had used the money the robbers had given him to buy a new automobile and "skip out."

Six men, not including the sheriff of Bond county, met in her home by previous agreement, with her husband, she said, and gave him his pay, \$700. The rest of the loot, according to her story, was divided into seven parts, and one part was for Sheriff Wilson.

Sheriff Wilson was released on \$10,000 bond and the other men are held in the county jail here.

FINNS YIELD TO SOVIET

Agents of Karelian Government Expelled From Country.

HELSINKI, Jan. 2.—Demands by the Soviet government that Finland withdraw all support of the revolution in Karelia have been met by the Finnish government.

Announcement is made that two members of the Karelian government have been expelled from this country. "In accordance with the provisions of international law," the help soviet threatened, "hostilities against Finland if alleged aid to the Karelian insurgents was not withdrawn immediately."

McCUMBER TO HEAD FINANCE COMMITTEE

Vacancies Caused by Death of Penrose to Be Filled.

SENIORITY RULE STANDS

Republican Leaders Forecast That Early Action Will Be Taken. Meeting Today to Be Brief.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 2.—Senate republican leaders today forecast early action in filling vacancies and making committee changes resulting from the death of Senator Penrose. It was expected that Senator Bragdon of Connecticut, chairman of the committee on committees, would issue a call soon for a meeting of the committee to act on necessary changes.

The rule of seniority has been strictly adhered to in the senate and there were no indications that a precedent would be established.

With the practical certainty that Senator McCumber of North Dakota will succeed to the chairmanship of the finance committee, over which Mr. Penrose had long presided, there will arise a vacancy in the chairmanship of the committee on pensions, now held by Mr. McCumber. On that committee Senator Smoot of Utah is the ranking republican and, leaders said, he undoubtedly could have the place if he desired it.

SMOOT GAINS PRESTIGE

Senator Smoot is thus brought into the ranking position of two of the most important committees, finance and appropriations.

Among republican leaders the suggestion was made that Senator Frelinghuysen, New Jersey, would be named as the new republican member of the finance committee. There were few hints as to who would be named to vacancies in the naval, immigration and banking and currency committees occasioned by the death of Senator Penrose. If the seniority rule is followed western senators will be given places on the naval and banking and currency committees and an eastern man added to the immigration committee.

Policy Not to Be Changed

Senators said the change in the chairmanship of the finance committee, now drafted a new tariff law, would occasion no change in the policy of the goal outlined. Its provisions discussed briefly and informally at a committee meeting today, is to continue the hearings and enter upon the work of writing the rates and provisions of the bill as rapidly as possible.

Tomorrow's senate session will be brief. It is planned only to adopt resolutions with respect to the death of Senator Penrose and then to adjourn.

SPROUL GETS MUCH ADVICE

Numerous Messages Received As to Penrose's Successor.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 2.—Governor Sproul today received numerous messages by telegraph and telephone concerning his course in naming a successor to the late Senator Penrose. He declined to make any statement.

One class of messages urged him to resign the governorship so that he could be appointed senator by Lieutenant Governor Beileman, who would succeed him, while others suggested that he make a temporary appointment and become a candidate himself in November for the remainder of the Penrose term.

Mr. Sproul's term as governor expires next January.

PENROSE FUNERAL PRIVATE

Arrangements Not Yet Completed by Family, However.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 2.—Arrangements for the funeral of Senator Penrose were still incomplete today. It was decided, however, that it should be strictly private, in accordance with his oft-expressed wish.

In making this announcement, Leighton C. Taylor, for many years the senator's private secretary, said that only members of the family and friends would attend the services, and that a congressional delegation probably would not come here for the burial. The date for the burial would be in November for the remainder of the Penrose term.

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he fixed, Mr. Taylor said, after hearing from relatives in the west. Meanwhile the body of the ex-senator, encased in a metallic coffin, covered with purple cloth, lay in his bachelor home here. No crepe or flowers marked the presence of death in the old-fashioned brick house where from a sickbed he had conferred by telephone with national republican leaders at the Chicago convention which nominated President Harding. Every wish of the senator for simplicity has been respected.

Expressions of regret at his death came to pour in today from all sections of the country. None of them was made public by his relatives. Governor Sproul said he had not decided on Senator Penrose's successor. Under the law the governor is empowered to make an appointment to fill the vacancy, until the next general election, which will be held in November.

ANTI-LODGE CAMPAIGN ON

Movement to Defeat Senator Is Started in Home State.

WORCESTER, Mass., Jan. 2.—A campaign aimed to defeat Senator Lodge for re-nomination at the republican primary next fall has been launched here by the council of presidents in Worcester county of the American association for the recognition of the Irish republic. About 25 councils were represented.

Members of the association are urged to cancel party enrollment and enter any primary as free lancers. "To aid friends and defeat enemies of the Irish republic."

A resolution embodying the recommendation adopted by the meeting was aimed at Senator Lodge for his statement that the resolution of Senator Norris, to recognize the independence of Ireland, would remain in the foreign relations committee "a long while."

50 ARE HURT BY BOMB

Explosive Is Thrown Into Crowd at Band Concert in Bavaria.

BERLIN, Jan. 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—A bomb was exploded among the crowd listening to a band in the market place of Dinkelsbuehl, Bavaria, on New Year's eve, injuring 50 persons, 20 of them seriously.

The thrower of the bomb, a youth, and several other persons were arrested.
