

5-POWER NAVY PACT ABOUT COMPLETED

Signatory Nations Will Get Text in Near Future.

APPROVAL TO BE ASKED

Treaty Later to Be Submitted to Plenary Conference Session for Adoption.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—The five-power naval limitation treaty which will define the agreements reached by the Washington conference, is nearing completion and soon will be ready for presentation to each signatory power for approval.

In its present form the covenant comprises a number of sections, each treating one aspect of the naval question as it has come before the conference. It is understood they include the following:

- (a) Agreement for scrapping capital ships, detailing time periods within which vessels must be rendered unfit for service.
(b) Agreement for eventual limitation of capital ship fleets under 5-5-3-1.66-1.66 ratio.
(c) Agreement for limitation of individual capital ships in size and guns.
(d) Agreement on standard international unit for measurement of tonnage.
(e) Agreement for replacement chart setting forth dates of replacement and dates of commissioning of new ships.
(f) Agreement for limitation of individual aircraft carriers in size and guns.
(g) Agreement for limitation of individual auxiliary craft in size and guns.
(h) Rules for use by aircraft of torpedo tubes.
(i) Regulations fixing the status of merchant vessels in war time and covering their possible conversion into armed cruisers.
(j) Regulations covering building in private yards of signatory powers, both on their own soil and by their nationals abroad, of warships destined for other powers either of those signing the treaty, or the non-signatory powers.
(k) Divers Regulation Up.
(l) Regulations for use of submarines.
(m) Regulations broadly defining conduct of signatory powers in case of future wars, and especially in cases of wars with non-signatory powers.
(n) Regulations defining the exact status of "refitting" a capital ship; whether installation of new and later guns will be permitted, for instance, or whether old guns may be rebored.
(o) Agreement as to Pacific fortifications.

FRENCH BOAST IS QUOTED

PREMIERS RESUME TALK AT CANNES

Alliance Between France and Great Britain Is Hope.

SITUATION HELD GRAVE

Delegations Agree That Entente Powers Must Come Closer Together; Finance Plans Shaping.

CANNES, Jan. 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—With the air full of talk of an alliance between France and Great Britain as the only means of keeping the entente intact, Premier Briand and Lloyd George today resumed their conversations in London.

The difference of opinion appears to center around the question of who ought to make the concessions necessary to bring about closer accord. The atmosphere today was generally pessimistic.

FINANCE PLANS SHAPING

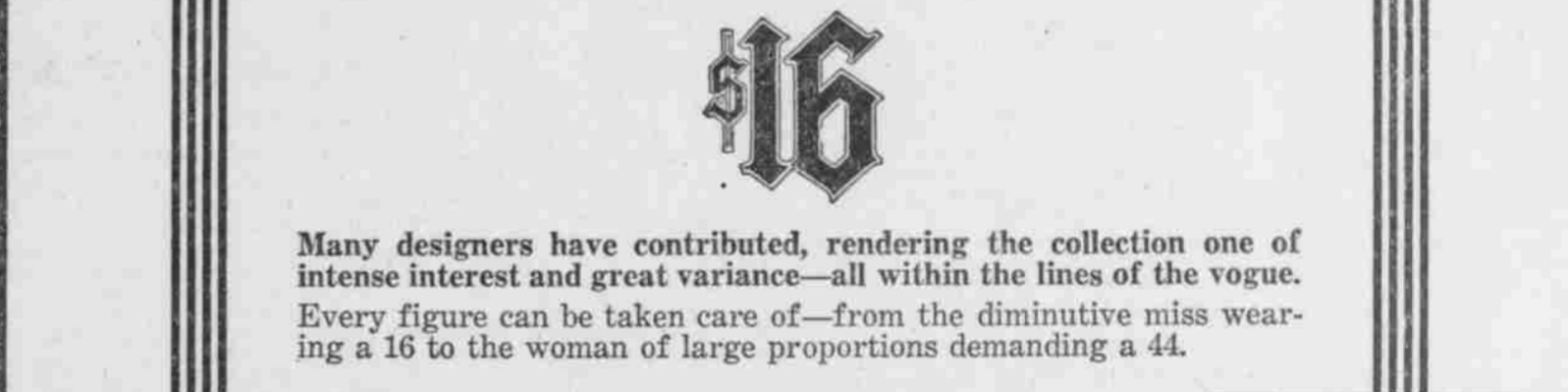

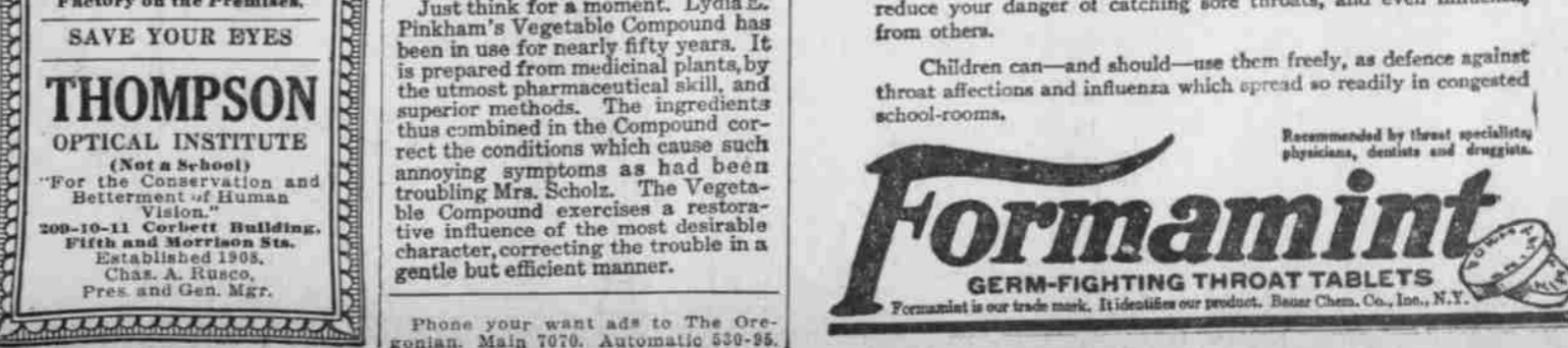
