CANNERY OPERATION PROTESTED.—Members of the city council probably will refuse to issue a license for the operation of a cannery located in the Croston district. The cannery was viewed yesterday by the members of the council after a delegation of property owners, including C. W. Tyler and Robert Walsh, appeared before the city commissioners and entered vigorous protest against the continuation of the industry in a residential section of the city.

SEATTLE BOARD OF TRADE.—The Seattle board of trade and community club will have its next meeting at the Community clubhouse Tuesday evening, January 17. This is designated the "1922 exposition" meeting, and addresses will be given by John E. Gratke, secretary of the fair committee, and others. Election of officers for the board of trade and community club is scheduled for the meeting on February 7.

NEGROES GET 60 DAYS.—Lena Browning, a negro, was sentenced to 60 days in jail yesterday after she had pleaded guilty before Municipal Judge Rossman to the theft of a dress from a store at 264 Morrison street. She told the court she had stolen the dress in order that she might wear it to the Milwaukee prize fight last Friday night when two negroes battled for the world's colored heavyweight championship.

ALLEGED FORGER HELD.—Rudolph W. Lawson, an alleged forger, was held to the grand jury under \$500 bail when he was arraigned yesterday in police court on a charge of forgery. He was alleged to have forged the signature of H. A. Sargent, a saw manufacturer, to a check for \$1850, which he deposited in a local bank. Lawson, also a reputed forger, was held to the grand jury under the same bonds by Judge Rossman.

ORFÈVRES' HALL RISES.—The new hall for Villa Orfèvres' lodge at Montavilla, located at East Eightieth and East Gilliam streets, is nearing completion, and the address will represent an outlay of approximately \$15,000. Two large stores are on the ground floor and on the second floor are the main lodge hall, dance hall and auditorium, dining room and kitchen.

SLAIN WOMAN LEAVES ESTATE.—Agnes B. Purdie, who met death at the hands of her divorced husband, Charles Wesley Purdie, the night of December 31, left an estate valued at \$2500, mostly in real estate, according to a petition for letters of administration filed in the circuit court yesterday by Rita Moore. There are two children—William L. and Edna Ellen Yergen, by a previous marriage.

ROAD BONDS TO BE SOLD.

STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION.

PLANS \$1,000,000 ISSUE.

Offer to Highest Bidder Will Be Made This Morning at Meeting of Body.

At the meeting of the state highway commission this morning \$1,000,000 of bonds will be offered to the highest bidder. The commission also will consider the proposed Cornell road improvement district. Later in the month the commission probably will hold a special meeting, or a conference, at which time it will map out the highway program for 1922. It also will be necessary soon to file with the secretary of agriculture maps of the primary and secondary roads of the state in compliance with the new federal aid law.

The 1922 programme was held up by the commission pending the special session of the legislature, as it was not known what the legislators might want to do in the way of road matters. Since the session the commissioners have not been able to meet to go over the details of the program. The new policy is likely to interfere with early letting of contracts, so the contractors can go on the work and take advantage of the summer.

Entail Irrigation Bonds Sold.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 9.—The first sale ever made of irrigation district bonds held by the state was consummated recently by Assistant Director of Conservation, William W. Adams, who disposed of \$29,000 worth of bonds of the Entail Irrigation district in Chehalis county for \$31,500, or 90 cents on the dollar. The state holds 100,000 in irrigation bonds from six different districts. The purchasers in this case were Smith and Straut of Seattle. They turned into the reclamation revolving fund.

HOME IS FOUND FOR BABY

226 FAMILIES RESPOND TO ADVERTISEMENT.

Mother Does Not Know Adopted Parents, Nor Do They Know Name of Infant's Mother.

In all, 226 families in Portland applied to Dr. M. G. McCorkle for the privilege of adopting the 4-days-old baby girl for which he advertised in the papers last week. Out of these one was picked which was thought to be able to give the baby a good home, and the final adoption papers were completed yesterday. The mother of the child does not know who its adopted parents are, and the new parents do not know whose daughter the baby really is. This arrangement was agreed upon, so that no possible stigma could be placed on the child in after life. Only Dr. McCorkle knows the full details of the adoption he arranged. The father of the child had promised to marry its mother, but a short time before it was born he suddenly married another girl, and the mother applied to Dr. McCorkle for advice. The doctor said yesterday that he had plans for establishing such a service, where unfortunate girls could have adoption arrangements made and save their children from baby homes and orphan asylums. The number of people, he said, who expressed themselves as willing to adopt babies, many of them prominent and wealthy citizens, convinced him that such a scheme would be practicable.

UNITY IN 1925 PREDICTED

PEOPLE WILL BE FOR FAIR, SAYS MEDFORD MAYOR.

Recent Episode in Legislature Looked Upon as Lesson for Co-operation in Future.

C. E. Gates, mayor of Medford, speaking on the relation of southern Oregon to Portland yesterday before the members' forum of the Chamber of Commerce, declared that Oregon will have an exposition in Portland in 1925 and that at that time everyone in the state will be for it. "Different sections of the state too long have looked on each other with suspicion," Mayor Gates said. "What happened at the special session of the legislature is the greatest example of this. I consider that in the end this episode will prove a good thing, regardless of the result. The legislature or anything else we are going to have a fair. Do not blame all southern Oregon for what a few people did. We are not going to blame Portland for what some of your people did."

"What more proof do the people of this state need than the fact that we have 61,000,000 more acres of land in this state not yet under cultivation. Portland should act as the hub of a great fan. It should find out the needs of southern Oregon, find out the needs of eastern Oregon and find out the needs of the rest of the state. If they do not know what they need, please tell them."

"For we must get together and co-operate. We must help each other work out our problems. We have two years to get together and work out a wonderful fair. And why? I decided I want to see a great electric sign over the state house, reading as follows: 'Oregon, 1925, a United State.'"

TEACHER TESTS POPULAR

Many Persons, Lured by High Salaries, Fail to Pass.

Better salaries paid to Oregon teachers have resulted in a rush of applicants to take the examination, with the additional result that the percentage of failures who took the December state teachers' examination was unusually high, according to W. C. Alderson, county superintendent, who has just returned from the county superintendents' convention in which he assisted in grading examination papers.

He said yesterday that many persons who had applied for the examination and for positions were not qualified for teachers, although the percentage of these was low in Multnomah county, he declared. In an examination in which only one paper out of 15 received a passing grade. The convention, taking the low rating in consideration, was against indiscriminate issuing of teachers' permits without examination.

CHEST DIVISIONS FORMED

Headquarters of Woman Workers Bustles With Activity.

All was bustle and business at the headquarters of the woman's division of the community chest drive in the blue parlor of the Hotel Portland yesterday. The various divisions were being organized, the workers instructed and their work outlined. Yesterday morning Mrs. Milton Kahn, vice-chairman for the west side of the river, had a meeting of her colonels, when the districts were divided and the campaign outlined. each captain ten workers or lieutenant, making a total of 1200 women under Mrs. Kahn's personal supervision.

The east side of the river, under supervision of Mrs. J. F. Chapman, is also being organized, and a meeting of her colonels will be called within the next few days. Mrs. Dallas Bache is in charge of the schools and the headquarters, Mrs. C. B. Simmons is the general chairman in charge of the entire women's division.

The worst confusion caused by the changing of 4500 telephone numbers from the Main-Marshall exchange to the Broadway exchange had been passed late yesterday afternoon, according to C. E. PAY FIXED AT MINIMUM

CLACKAMAS FIGHT OVER COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER ENDS.

Dr. Orel A. Welsh to Stay in Office and Receive \$25 a Month—Order Is Filed by County Court.

OREGON CITY, Or., Jan. 9.—(Special.)—Virtual agreement that Dr. Orel A. Welsh will remain health officer of Clackamas county is the interim result of the fight between the county court, fixing the salary for that office at the minimum of \$25 a month allowed by law. This marks the beginning of the end of an official fight which has been waged here for the last six months. Dr. Welsh, who had been appointed to combine the offices of county physician and health officer under Dr. W. E. Hempstead. It was found that Dr. Welsh could not remove without action before the state health board. He refused to resign, and his bills for salary were stopped. The county court, however, was not removed the salary would be reduced to the legal minimum, the order filed Monday is regarded as an indication that the court has concluded that Dr. Welsh will retain the office. The change, according to the judge, is made in the name of economy, which he says, was the intention of the attempt to combine offices originally.

Dr. Welsh, who has served nine years, being reappointed after an absence while in the service, has received \$55.33 a month and expenses. No order was ever made fixing his salary, but because a \$700 allowance was made in the budget, the figure was obtained by dividing by 12. The order of the court, however, is retroactive to January 1, 1921.
