STREET PROJECTS PROPOSED

Another petition will ask for the rolling of East Gasco street, between East Eighteenth and East Nineteenth streets.

BRIDGE TRAFFIC SLUMPS

DECREASE IN 1921 ASSIGNED TO SHIPYARD CLOSINGS

Interstate Structure Will Pay for Itself Within Next 21 Years, Is Estimate.

Within the next 21 years the interstate bridge will have paid for itself and accumulated a surplus should its earning power not decrease, according to the report of Alex. C. Rae made to the bridge commission yesterday. The bridge earned less in 1921 than in 1920, due to the closing of shipyards, according to the annual report, the figures being \$295,000 in gross income for 1921 and \$247,784 more in 1920. Operating expenses were \$42,616, leaving net earnings of \$252,388, of which \$152,930 goes to Multnomah county and \$101,453 to Clark county, Wash. The bridge to date has retired \$200,000 of the original bond issue floated for its erection, of which Multnomah county sold \$125,000.

Figures showed that 2,324,000 pedestrians and motorists had crossed the bridge in 1921, compared with 2,465,000 in 1920, and 3,000,000 street car patrons, compared with 1,603,000 in 1920. The number of street cars crossing in 1921 was 59,300, compared with 76,758 the year before; automobiles 734,000, compared with 746,000, and trucks 114,000, compared with 106,000.
