

EDITORS TO CONFER AT EUGENE TODAY

70 Newspaper Men to Attend Fourth Annual Event.

BANQUET WILL BE GIVEN

Chamber of Commerce and Journalism Undergraduates Will Be Hosts at Dinner.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 12.—(Special).—The general situation of the newspapers in the state will be the main topic to be considered at the fourth annual newspaper conference which opens here tomorrow morning.

The last arrangements for the meeting, including changes in the programme, have been made preparatory to the arrival of approximately 70 editors, publishers, owners and representatives. This is nearly twice as many as have attended heretofore.

Mr. Sawyer to Preside.

Robert W. Sawyer of the Bend Bulletin, president, will open the conference at 1:30 o'clock, at which the general topic will be the "Eugene subject" which will be considered from all angles and the speakers will be: Paul Robinson, Aurora Observer; H. L. St. Clair, Oregonian; J. C. Brown, Corvallis Gazette-Times; W. R. Smith, Myrtle Point American; and Powers Patriot.

The banquet to be given the editors in the evening will be one of the big affairs. It will be given under the auspices of the Eugene chamber of commerce and journalism undergraduates.

A luncheon is to be given all the editors at noon, and they have been invited to the Journalism Jinx Saturday night.

DR. WHITING ASKS CUSTODY OF CHILD

Mother and Father Argue on What Is Best for Son.

ALIMONY ALSO IS ISSUE

Local Physician Agrees to Pay Divorced Wife \$205 Due by Order of Bench.

Battle for the custody of 14-year-old Curtis Whiting, and involving the question of alimony to Mrs. Iva M. Whiting, broke into open court yesterday after simmering in local legal circles since last June.

Attorneys Held to Point.

Attempts of attorneys for both sides to air the domestic history of the case, and Whiting in court were nipped in the bud by Judge Tucker, who refused to listen to anything except that which related specifically to the matter in hand, asserting that his only interest in the entire controversy was the welfare of the two Whiting sons, who were awarded to the mother by Circuit Judge Gatens at the time of the divorce.

Sons to Be Questioned.

Before deciding the pending question, Judge Tucker desires to interview the sons, Curtis, aged 14, and Thomas Sanford, aged 12. He asked that they be brought to his chambers Saturday morning. He has announced that he will determine first the custody of the boys, with the alimony question a secondary one.

Physician Gives Check.

She said that she understood that the money was paid from the private means of Mrs. Whiting No. 2, but the attorney for Dr. Whiting insisted on the check in payment of the settlement was signed by the physician.

Mother Pleads Case.

"I realize that a boy must be employed after school hours and that a mother who works long hours is handicapped in giving a boy the care and supervision which he should have," said Mrs. Whiting No. 1 in response to a question from Judge Tucker as to what she would do were she in the place of the judge.

Boy Goes to Mother.

Sunday last Curtis Whiting returned to his mother, saying that he could not stand the treatment of his stepmother and father longer and preferred to remain with his mother, testified Mrs. Whiting No. 1.
