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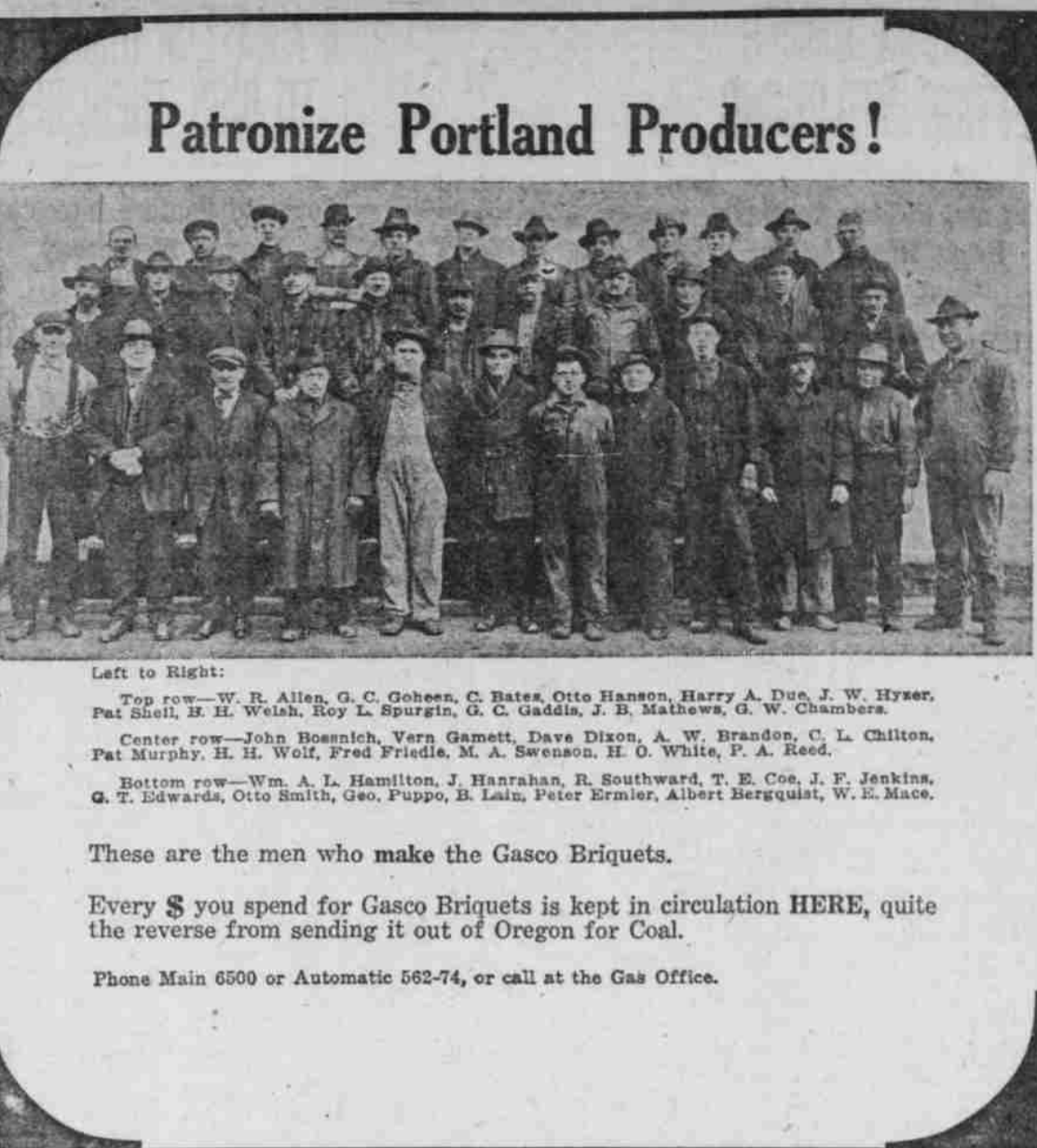

Italian Clubs to Build
Portland Federation Has \$100,000 Cash for Structure.
That the members of the Italian federation of Portland, with which are affiliated 11 Italian organizations embracing many thousand members, has \$100,000 in cash on hand to construct a modern, four-story building at the southeast corner of Fourth and Madison streets, was announced yesterday by P. Tusi, following the annual meeting of the Italian-American club. A contract probably will be let within 30 days, he said. The chief business transacted at the meeting of the Italian-American club yesterday was election of officers. Mr. Tusi was chosen president for the ensuing year, this being his fourth consecutive election. Other officers are C. Battaglia, first vice-president; D. Rinauto, second vice-president; C. Calistro, political secretary; Mike Carnese, financial secretary; and Angelo Cunzio, chairman of the board of directors.
