COOPERAGE RATE ANNOUNCED—J. E. Lounsbury, general freight agent of the Union Pacific railway, announced yesterday an export rate on cooperage and cooperage shingles. The rate is to be 90 cents per hundred pounds on carload lots, minimum of 40,000 pounds. There has been no previous export rate on this commodity.

EAST SIDE MARKET UP TODAY—An ordinance will be before the city council today, granting permission to the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association to use and occupy East Main street, from East First to East Third streets, and East Third from East Madison to East Taylor streets for a period of five months, for the loading and sale of vegetables and garden produce. The use of these streets is preliminary to the erection and occupancy of the proposed big building which this association expects to have started soon. The low bidder on its construction was Robert Payne, 316 Lewis building, who formerly was a contractor at Boise, Idaho. The building is to be 200 by 200 of concrete construction.

COLONEL HAMMOND TO BE GUEST—Colonel G. C. Hammond, commander of the 16th Infantry, Oregon national guard, who has returned to his regiment after an absence of 18 months on duty with the general staff at Washington, D. C., will be tendered a military reception and ball at the army on Thursday night, January 26. Invitations are being sent to all officers of the guard in Multnomah county, regular army officers on duty in this city and Vancouver, county and city officials, state legislators and state officials. Major James F. Drake is chairman of the committee on arrangements for the reception, assisted by Major Roy R. Knox and Captain James S. Gay.

LIBRARY APPOINTMENTS MADE—Since Miss Ann Foster, who for five years was in charge of the technical department of the public library, resigned to take up other work library officials have been looking for a person to take her place. Yesterday Miss Algonu Fisher, for two years in charge of the east side branch library, was appointed head of the reference department at central library. This appointment takes effect February 1. Miss Helen McRath, who has been stationed at the Arleta branch library, is to become head of the east side branch, and Miss Mary Heathmore, who has been in the order department at central library, will take charge of the Arleta branch.

The father is said to be in poor health and is not expected to live much longer and would like to see his son again. P. Worden is about 55 years of age, slim, of medium height and has blue eyes. He has been in the army in Oregon and Washington. He was in Portland when last heard from.

REALTORS PLEDGING DENIED—M. V. Stoltz, real estate man who was arrested here last Friday on telegraphic advice from Denver charging embezzlement, never was a president nor a member of the Denver Real Estate exchange, according to a telegram received yesterday by Paul A. Cowell, secretary of the local Real Estate board, from Denver. At his arrest it was given out that Stoltz was a former president of the Denver real estate body.

SEWER PROJECT MAY STOP—All proceedings for construction of the Oswego-street trunk sewer system in St. Johns district will be discontinued if the city council adopts the recommendation that will be made by Commissioner Barbur. He also recommends discontinuation of all proceedings for the construction of a sewer in East Sixth street from 55 feet north of Wygant street to a sewer in Going street.

DANCE DEBATE TONIGHT

MINISTERS AND LAYMEN TO SEE SCHOOL BOARD.

75 Scheduled to Appear at Regular Meeting of Directors and Make Protest.

Seventy-five ministers and laymen have been scheduled to appear before the school board, at its regular session tonight, in protest against dancing in any of the schoolrooms of the district. They will be representatives of the Methodist ministers' committee and various other churches and organizations.

Members of the board have been reluctant regarding what action will be taken when they are confronted formally with a request that the district institute a ruling against dancing. It is believed, however, that the matter will be referred to the educational committee for investigation, and that the case of dancing will not be considered by the full board until this report is at hand.

Members of the ministerial committee have asserted that should the board decline to formulate a ruling, they will carry the case into the courts on the ground that such usage of schoolrooms is illegal. A delegation went to Salem yesterday to confer with the attorney-general respecting his opinion.

The question of dancing in school buildings will be debated by Dr. Clarence True Wilson of the anti-dance committee and John H. Stevenson at the session of the Civic league on Saturday noon at the Hotel Benham.

Ministers of the Evangelical association, representing the constituency at Portland and Milwaukie, Or., have endorsed the stand taken by the Methodist Episcopal ministers against dancing in public school buildings. The resolution was signed by pastors of the Lenten, Milwaukie and Clay-street Evangelical churches, and by other pastors who are members of the association. The congregation of all these churches have also adopted the resolution commending the Methodist stand on their firm stand on a moral issue of the day.

I would like to have something which would "cut me off" as I am so tall, also suggest what color please. I have medium brown hair, blue eyes and fairly good complexion—lots of color. S., Dayville, Or.—You are indeed a tall young miss and I can think of no better way to "cut you down" than to suggest a dress having a blouse waist and the rather full skirt, the sides of the latter having the new popular and effective cascade panels, whose points hang an inch or more below the skirt's edge. Have the gathered round neck and trim the lower portion of your waist in a wide band of the combined woodcock, such as cherry, black, green and a yellow tan. A Canton crepe in the French blue will be youthful and versatile, and with sprays of white and yellow, you will be glad for the lighter shade. Have the sleeves in the kimono type and banded with the emerald, also the back. The two inches below gathers. A crush girdle and ending with a saucy bow will be just what you need. The cascade panels, which, if you fancy, can be trimmed with the woodcock.

ALBANY, Or., Jan. 1.—Dear Madame Richer: I have a wool jersey dress in what I call the "mammy" shade during the day. Have drawn sketches to give you some idea how it is made. Long waist, attached to pleated skirt with a slash in the slash covering the joints—three-quarter length bell-shaped sleeves piped with black satin, also the plain round neck. The trimming being a row of Jersey-and-satin buttons outlining the side front opening. The dress shows no sign of wear, except that it is rather shabby, and the style is becoming a little out of fashion. I would like to have the dress altered, and if so, what color? I could you suggest a new touch of trimming after having the dress cleaned and pressed? I do not wish to spend much money on it, but I would like to have it in a new and good color. Perplexed, Albany, Or.—If your Jersey is of the better quality and will not shrink too hopelessly in the dyeing, I would most certainly advise you to change the now "mammy" shade to a blue and blue and then emerald in worsteds a three-inch band around neck and where the buttons now trim. The sleeve edges, too, should be so treated, and the new girdle of blue satin or the old one of black if you rather, should end with a wooden bead drop having the colors outlined in the embroidered ribbon which, with a cherry red, golden sand, green and black, would be most effective and well worth the labor required in its production. Choose an all-over scheme of line and arrange your colors with thoughtful relationship. The above directions, if followed, will afford you a decidedly effective frock.

Home Dressmaker—Such a shade of green will be charmingly pretty for a miss with red hair and I am sure that the following proposed dress will prove "just the thing."

First remove the fichu vest and the ruffled bands at the sleeve edges. Lay the upper half of a round necked, long waisted blouse, be of the same shade of taffeta also the lower vest line. The sleeves can be most attractive by having the now popular kimono cap, of the taffeta and an under fall of the crepe de chine. Join the long waist to the skirt proper or better the skirt to an under waist of lawn. The skirt is quite all right as it is and the only change to that portion of the garment will be in the very effective and youthful trim which should charm the most fastidious. Cut three-inch wide bands of black ribbon and use as an all-over trim for the skirt placing these black motifs at interesting spaces. The motifs should be embroidered in black ribbon. The taffeta portion of the blouse should have the design worked upon its surface.
