

MORE AND ORCUTT GUILTY OF ROBBERY

Jury, in Session Throughout
Night, Returns Verdict.

NEW TRIAL MOTIONS SET

Judgment Stayed and Two Men, Ac-
cused of Looting Circus, Get Till
Jan. 31 to File Arguments.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—"Guilty as charged," was the verdict returned in the case of the state against Roy Moore and Bert Orcutt, charged with robbing the Sells-Floto circus of about \$30,000 on the night of September 16, 1921. The case went to the jury at 5:30 last night, and it was hoped by the state that a verdict would be reached quickly. Judge Simpson at midnight told the jury they would be permitted to go to bed, but this the jury refused to do, stating they wanted to finish. They were out yet this morning and breakfast was taken to them in the jury room. At 10:56 the jury came into the court room with the verdict of guilty.

Henry Clay Agnew, one of the attorneys for the defendants, immediately made a motion arresting judgment, and January 31 was set by Judge Simpson for the day to hear arguments for a new trial. The attorney was given until this time to make preparations for the motions. In the meantime the prisoners will be kept in the county jail.

Trial Cost to Exceed \$2500.
The cost of the two trials of these men will be more than \$2500 and possibly \$3000. Many of the witnesses live outside of the city and three came from Denver.

It is reported that the first ballot taken by the jury was 11 for conviction and one for acquittal, and the stood this way all night, a woman holding out for no reason, but possibly for sympathy. Finally, after breakfast, the entire case was taken over in detail, after which she said she was convinced that the men were guilty, and signed the verdict.

The case was most bitterly fought by George F. Vanderveer, counsel in this state for the Industrial Workers of the World, and H. M. Agnew, Joseph E. Hall, county attorney, was assisted by A. L. Miller in the prosecution, and George H. Simpson, judge of the superior court of Clarke county, tried the case.

Grip Is First Clew

The robbers held up the circus, went almost to La Center and buried the loot, with two guns and a suit of overalls belonging to Moore; then went to Seattle where they got Moore's wife and two children and Miss Gross, fiancée of Orcutt, and started back to pick up the loot. In the meantime, Mike Kane, near La Center, went into the woods near the lot while following a couple of pheasants and found a grip in which a few papers from the circus were left. This was close to where the ground was freshly broken. He returned with the grip and after notifying the sheriff's office and it was found that the big grip contained most of the money and the two guns, overalls and lumber.

Six deputies were placed around the lot to trap those who came for it and, about 2 o'clock, following a morning Moore and Orcutt with the party stopped the car in the road and went at once to the cache. When they stooped over, the command to hold up their hands was given and they fled, two deputies firing. The men were captured and held October 18, but the jury disagreed.

The men put up the defense that Orcutt had been offered \$125 by Frank Hauer, alias Frank Woodruff, to go to the cache and take it to an address in Portland.

They attempted to prove they were playing poker all night of September 16, when the robbery occurred, and had witnesses who swore they saw them in Seattle and played poker with them on the night in question.

Fire Department Organized

ILWACO, Wash., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—A volunteer fire department has been organized in the town of Ilwaco. Kenneth Inman was elected chief, A. T. Samuels, first assistant, and Erwin Saari, second assistant. A committee was appointed to draft by-laws and constitution. It consists of A. T. Samuels, W. A. Graham and L. Purdin. Thirty-three members enrolled and were divided into hook-and-ladder and hose-reel teams. Following the fire at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Graham a short time ago the residents of the town concluded a volunteer fire department could do more effective work by reason of being organized and trained.

VETERANS JOIN IN BALL

ALLIED WAR ORGANIZATIONS
SPONSOR CHARITY EVENT.

Big Dance at Auditorium Gives
Promise of Being Brilliant
and Successful Affair.

Bayonets have been buried, grenades spiked and tin hats junked, and for the first time in Portland rival organizations of war veterans are getting together tonight in an allied veterans' ball at the municipal auditorium.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion and the Disabled American Veterans of the World War, which have been on speaking terms for a long while, are here to show they have collaborated in any community entertainment, will be joint hosts with the Spanish-American War Veterans in this benefit ball. The proceeds from which will go to alleviate suffering among the sick, needy and unemployed veterans in the city.

Through the courtesy of city officials, the veterans were permitted to follow the big civic charity ball while the maple floor at the auditorium still is down and a capacity crowd may be accommodated. Because of the charitable purpose of the dance, there will be no war tax on the tickets, which will be sold at the door for 50 cents each. During the last three weeks, the various organizations have come in the sale of tickets, that making the best record being offered a prize of \$100 from receipts, which will be divided equally after that amount is taken out.

Though numerically the smallest organization, the disabled veterans thus far have made greatest ticket sales, according to unofficial counts. A 20-piece orchestra, rated as one of the best in the city, has been engaged for the event. The committee on arrangements consists of the following: Veterans of Foreign Wars, G. A. Stevens, J. E. Peist and Fred Angel; American Legion, Douglas McKay, E. T. Stretcher and Jerrold Owen; Disabled Veterans, G. H. Hastings, T. E. Mulvey and S. Payne; Spanish War Veterans, Harry Hekman, J. E. Peist and James McGarran.

Timber Survey Is Begun
HIGH OFFICIALS OF LONG-BELL COMPANY ARE IN COWLITZ.

Chairman of Board of Directors
Denies Further Purchases of
Land Holdings.

KELSO, Wash., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—To familiarize themselves with their Cowlitz timber holdings and the development project at Kelso, which will be the largest timber operation in the world, Robert A. Long, chairman of the board of directors of the Long-Bell Lumber company, F. J. Bannister, president, J. D. Tennant, vice-president, R. F. Davis, traffic manager; W. L. Prickett and W. F. Ryder have arrived here from Kansas City and will spend several days going over details of the project with Wesley Vandercreek, chief engineer, and inspecting the mill site, as well as the extensive system of maps of the timber lands acquired by the company.

Mr. Long emphatically denied that the Long-Bell company is purchasing the Hammond Lumber company holdings, or that additional timber will be acquired from the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, from which a huge tract in western Cowlitz and Lewis counties was acquired last year. Mr. Long also stated that no construction work is contemplated at once, nor can the date when building of the mill will be started be fixed at this time. Construction is entirely dependent, according to him, upon a reduction in the price of machinery and building materials. Lumber, he says, is the only building material that has returned to a normal basis, and the saving that can be made by waiting for a lower price level will justify delay in beginning construction of the mill. Meanwhile, all preliminary data will be completed and everything will be in readiness to begin construction as soon as conditions are right. Two years will be required to complete the mammoth mill plant and to construct a railway from the millsite at Kelso to the timber belt.

Accompanied by Mr. Vandercreek, the visitors inspected the millsite. Since Mr. Long's first visit here, about a year ago, more than 1000 acres of the millsite have been cleared of brush.

REED BENEFIT ARRANGED
COLLEGE WILL HAVE NIGHT AT BAKER THEATER.

Alumni Will Lay Basis for Fund to Endow Institution Where They Were Graduated.

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PHONE LINE HELD LIKELY
Direct Communication Between Bend and Klamath Falls Expected.

BEND, Or., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—Construction of a telephone line for direct communication between Bend and Klamath Falls is expected to be announced shortly, according to information received here from New York. Details are not yet available as to costs or location between the two main points. The purpose of the contemplated addition to telephone facilities will be to establish a trunk line for long-distance communication direct to San Francisco, eliminating the necessity for calling through Portland.

J. L. Galtier, local manager for the telephone company, interviewed in regard to the proposed development, was unable to give any information, but did not deny the report of contemplated construction.
