WOMAN VIOLINIST DEAD

AMERICAN VICTIM OF POISON IN PARIS TRAGEDY PASSES.

Wife of Newspaper Correspondent Who Swallowed Tablets Fails to Rally From Dose.

PARIS, Jan. 19.—(By the Associated Press.)—Mrs. Thomas Stewart Ryan, widely-known American violinist, died today in the American hospital at Neuilly.

Mrs. Ryan was taken to the Neuilly hospital on January 12, having swallowed several poison tablets while in a room with her husband at a hotel here.

Mr. Ryan, an American newspaper correspondent, was taken into custody by the police the following day and is still held by them, although until today no formal charge has been filed against him.

There have been various conflicting versions of the circumstances surrounding Mrs. Ryan's swallowing the poison.

Mr. Ryan, however, has firmly protested his innocence, denying all his wife's statements.

YOUTH'S PLEA RECALLED

How Soldier Pleaded to Die Without Bandage Over Eyes Is Told Senate Committee.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 19.—George Washington Yarbrough, a high school teacher at Rome, Ala., and rated as the weightiest champion of the American expeditionary forces, told a senate investigating committee that he had witnessed the shooting of an American soldier by a firing squad near Chateau Thierry region in July, 1918.

Regarding the committee as probably the most clear-headed of all the ex-service men testifying concerning the alleged hangings of soldiers without trial Yarbrough, himself a reluctant witness, declared the sight of the man being led to his death, with hands tied behind his back, made him forget for the moment the screaming of enemy shells flying overhead.

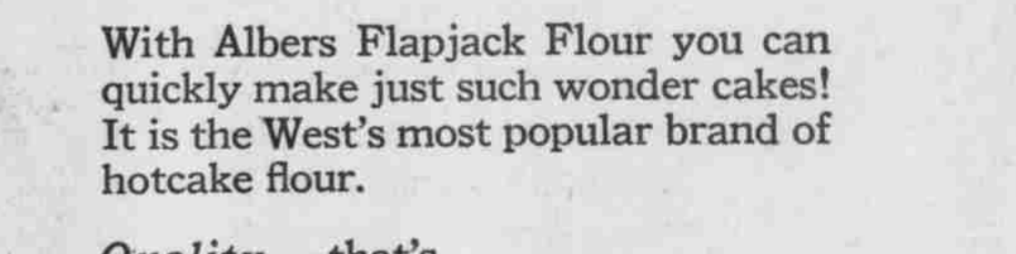
