

SHERIFF TO DIRECT HIS MEN BY RADIO

King County Official to Make Force More Mobile.

PHONE BEING INSTALLED

Movements of Deputies Roaming the Country in Motor Cars to Be Directed from Office.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—Sheriff Matt Starwick of King county purposes to make the force at his command more mobile by use of the radiophone. The sheriff has obtained and is now installing his new equipment, which consists of a sending and receiving set for his office and a receiving outfit for each of the automobiles assigned to his use.

By this means the sheriff or man in charge at the office expects to be able to direct the movement of deputies as they roam the county in the motor cars.

WHARFAGE SOUND PROBLEM

Seattle Alive to Action Taken in San Francisco.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—Seattle port officials have given prompt consideration to the action taken by San Francisco's abolition of the 15 cents a ton wharfage charge hitherto levied against shippers of trans-Pacific freight. The Seattle port commission abolished wharfage charges on import and export shipments in May last year, by which means, in the opinion of port officials, they were enabled to increase the average monthly tonnage over port piers from 24,000 to 30,000 tons.

Seattle, however, has maintained a charge of 45 cents a ton against vessels on import cargo for transfer from warehouses to railroad cars. Under the new San Francisco programme the charge for this service is 45 cents a ton.

Port officials say the San Francisco act undoubtedly will be adopted here, but it is likely that definite action will be delayed until the return of Port Commissioner Lampson, who is now in San Francisco as one of the delegates to the shipping conference.

FRUIT PESTS TO BE FOUGHT

War is Declared on New Orchard Foes in Washington.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—Director of agriculture, who came to Seattle to attend the meeting of the Centralia Memorial association executive committee, of which he is a member, announced that his department is prepared to wage vigorous war on the earwig and tent caterpillar, which did great harm the past year, especially in western Washington.

Director French declared that the western part of the state should have produced a \$6,000,000 apple crop in 1921, but the crop did not materialize for lack of proper protection. The earwig is a new enemy among pests here and Mr. French thinks it possible to head him off before he gets fairly going.

FRUIT RATES PROTESTED

Jackson Growers Declare Tariffs Equal to Mortgage on Property.

MEDFORD, Or., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—The Jackson county farmers and horticulturists during the farmers' week sessions here last week sent resolutions to the Oregon congressional delegation calling attention to what was termed excessive and discriminatory freight rates on fresh fruits, particularly tariff on pears and apples from the Rogue River valley. The resolution declared that based on the 1921 valley fruit crop figures showed that the average farmer was struggling under a freight rate on apples and pears which amounts to a mortgage on his ranch on which he is paying 18 per cent interest. These figures show that out of every \$2.75 received for Bartlett pears during 1921 the Rogue river grower received an average of \$1, and the railroads got \$1.75.

DRILL PAY CHECKS HERE

Adjutant-General White Receives Money for National Guard.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—The first installment of United States treasury checks for payment of Oregon national guardsmen for their army drills during the last six months was received today by George A. White, adjutant-general. Two Portland organizations were first to get their pay from the finance officer at Washington—Battery A and the howitzer company receiving a total of 156 checks.

All other organizations in the state will be paid within the next few days. The total distribution will exceed \$50,000, the largest federal distribution of drill funds ever made in Oregon. These payments are made twice each year for army drills, with two additional distributions for camp and school drills.

NATIVE PORTLANDER SEEKS SEAT IN CONGRESS



Franklin F. Korell, Portland, has announced his candidacy for representative in congress in Franklin F. Korell, whose announcement of entry in the race in the third district was printed yesterday morning. Mr. Korell was born in Portland 22 years ago and was educated in the public schools here, Bishop Scott academy, the University of Oregon and Yale law school.

Mr. Korell has taken an active part in public affairs, particularly in the legislature, where he worked in behalf of the soldiers' bonus and other important legislation. He entered military service in August, 1917, was commissioned a first lieutenant of infantry after attending the Presidio training school, and in service was promoted to captain-adjutant of the 32d infantry.

In announcing his candidacy Mr. Korell said that if elected he would work for a large merchant marine and for water and irrigation development.

GIFT OF LAND ANNOUNCED

"HEIRS" SEEK SHOWDOWN

TRUTH ABOUT BAKER ESTATE IS SOUGHT.

Hundreds Who Want Share in Reported \$800,000,000 Properties Lining Up for Fight.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—The celebrated Baker estate, having its chief center of interest at Philadelphia, Pa., Chillisnoe, O., and other points in that section of the United States, cannot be classed with the down-and-outers. Last March there was publication throughout the United States that the \$800,000,000 estate was shortly to be divided. Then Mayor Moore of Philadelphia issued a public announcement to the effect that the estate was a myth.

Information just received locally would indicate that there is now the most determined move on foot to bring the Baker estate to a showdown. Hundreds of persons who seek to prove their kinship to Colonel Jacob Baker and his brother, William Baker, are lining up to fight.

When the excitement of a year ago was at its height, Chehalis parties who were interested, made an inquiry through a local bank and obtained a report from one of the leading commercial agencies of the country. The agency reported the estate to be a myth.

The Philadelphia Inquirer published a statement regarding the Baker estate, presumably coming with official sanction of Mayor Moore. The mayor learning that the Baker estate publicity had become so widespread over the United States, had the Bureau of Legal Aid of Philadelphia make an investigation and report their findings. John H. Bradway, chief counsel for the Bureau of Legal Aid, in his report, said:

"There was an estate of Jacob Baker, a revolutionary veteran, which was handled in the orphan's court of Philadelphia county. The records of that court show that it was disposed of about 1847 and the estate was valued at about \$500 or \$700 in the report that was filed.

"The Baker estate which has been used as a bait throughout the country was supposed to consist of a 99-year lease on certain real estate in the city of Philadelphia.
