

FUNERAL OF POPE SET FOR TOMORROW

Wish Not to Be Embalmed Necessitates Earlier Day.

BODY NOW IN BASILICA

Removal Is Occasion of Imposing Ceremony—Death Certificates of Pontiff Registered.

ROME, Jan. 23.—By the Associated Press.—The interment of Benedict XV was tentatively fixed for Wednesday afternoon. The body will lie in state in the basilica of St. Peter's only a day and a half more, according to these plans. Benedict's wish not to be embalmed necessitates departure from the custom that the pope's body lie in state for three days.

Final decision will be taken on Wednesday morning, but the present view of the Vatican is that it will be impossible to keep the body exposed beyond Wednesday afternoon. The statement also was made tonight, but not officially, that the coffin would be closed within a few hours and that the usual ceremony of worshipers filing past, kissing the uncovered foot of the dead pope, would be eliminated.

Bier Held Shoulder High. Removal of the body from the throne room to the basilica this morning was the occasion of an imposing ceremony.

The bier was held shoulder high by ushers clad in black and scarlet, flanked by noble guards. The sacred college followed, headed by the dean, Cardinal Vannutelli, and the cardinal deacons, who escorted the cortege down the main central aisle to a position in the center of the church just opposite the altar of St. Peter.

On entering the main door of St. Peter's, the funeral party was received by the clergy of the great basilica, who escorted the cortege down the main central aisle to a position in the center of the church just opposite the altar of St. Peter. There, the bier was raised and placed in the center of the church, where the public can view the body through the immense iron gates.

Death Certificate Registered. The certificate of the pope's death, which was registered today, will be entered into the records of the capital tomorrow in the same manner as for all Roman citizens. In view, however, of the late pope's high rank, the mayor will make the entry tomorrow by Herbert Fleishacker, who was empowered by the recent conference of cardinals of commerce to make the appointments.

Participation of the American cardinals in the date for which has been fixed for February 2, is still possible, but is regarded as doubtful. A cable has been received from Cardinal O'Connell of Boston announcing that he was sailing tomorrow, while Cardinal Dougherty has advised that he will not reach Philadelphia before Friday.

Conclave Meets February 2. Monsignor Pizzardo, acting secretary of state, said that Cardinal O'Connell had a possible chance of arriving in time providing the conclave does not choose a new pope on the first ballot, but he thought Cardinal Dougherty's chances were slim, unless the conclave was lengthy.

Asked concerning the possibility of postponing the conclave to permit American cardinals to attend, he replied that the constitution would have to be amended, as the conclave must be called within ten days after the death of the pope.

A consistory under the presidency of Cardinal Gasparri, tonight decided definitely on February 2. The secretary requested the American correspondents to get a right the erroneous position that once the conclave begins its sessions "no late arrivals could enter."

Americans May Be Present. Thus, should the conclave extend over several days both American cardinals may be present. No cardinal is permitted to leave the conclave once it is sitting, but a belated cardinal is permitted to enter.

The secretariate is flooded with thousands of messages of condolence and sympathy from all corners of the globe, signed by the heads of the greatest states and the humblest parish priests, written practically in all modern languages and many of them in Latin.

MAFFI HELD TOO FRIENDLY

Cardinal Believed to Have Little Chance of Being Elected Pope.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—Those who remember the struggle between the church and the state in Italy after the fall of the temporal power in 1870 commented today upon the fact that to express condolences on the death of Pope Benedict, these cabinet ministers of the king of Italy have for the first time officially entered the Vatican.

One Vatican form of protest against the occupation of Rome was the prohibiting of all Catholics to vote or to be elected to political or administrative offices, but finally the ban was raised by Pius X. Benedict XV amplified this decision and the "popular party" consisting of Catholics was formed and in the last election gained 100 seats in parliament.

Benedict soon after the war suppressed the important form of protest by the Vatican after 1870, by which no Catholic sovereign or ruler was allowed to go to Rome as guest of the king of Italy and the pope was being excommunicated. President Loubet of France was the only ruler who disregarded the papal prohibition and Pius X, as a result, severed diplomatic relations with France. Benedict, however, abolished this protest. The only remaining form of protest by the Vatican is that of the voluntary imprisonment of the pope in the apostolic palace.

Yet improvement in the relations between the church and the state has been slow, and for this reason some here believe Cardinal Maffi, archbishop of Fiume, who has been several occasions shown an ardent desire that a complete understanding should be reached between the church and the state, will probably not be elected pope. Cardinals de Lai and Boggiani are regarded here as being favorable to intensifying the ancient struggle and therefore are considered as improbable selections. The chances are also said to be against Cardinal Gasparri, because he has been several times secretary of state and against Cardinal Merry del Val, because he is not an Italian. It therefore, is held here that the next pope perhaps will be one not

prominently mentioned among the cardinals today.

Leo XIII, it is recalled, was not among the leading possibilities when he entered the conclave from which he emerged as head of the church. He was old and frail at the time, but his pontificate lasted more than 25 years.

REQUIEM MASS TO BE HELD

Services in Portland to Be Same Day as Those in Rome.

A solemn pontifical requiem mass will be held at the cathedral in Portland on the same day that the service will be held in the basilica of St. Peter's in Rome. Archbishop Christie will officiate and the clergy and lay members from all churches of the city will follow. Following this service special services in all Catholic churches of the city will be announced. Rev. Father Daly has announced special funeral services in the Immaculate Heart church for 9 A. M. Thursday, irrespective of the date of the funeral. A catafalque will be built in the form of a memorial pyre and the ceremony gone through as if the body of the pope were present upon the catafalque.

Mourning will be observed for a period of from nine to 30 days in the various churches. The altars, pillars and other parts of the interior will be draped in black. Festivities of a light nature which have been planned for the immediate future will be postponed.

Announcement of the choice of a successor to the pope will allay the spirit of mourning, but probably will not affect its observance for the customary 30-day period. Archbishop Christie, after administering the sacrament of confirmation to a class at Eugene on Sunday, returned to Portland yesterday and immediately set about preparing plans for the pontifical requiem mass.

ALBANY CHURCH IN MOURNING

Monsignor Lane Deeply Affected by News of Pontiff's Death.

ALBANY, Or., Jan. 23.—(Special.)—St. Mary's Roman Catholic church of this city today entered upon a nine days' period of mourning because of the death of Pope Benedict XV, who will be held daily and will be conducted by Monsignor Arthur Lane, rector of the Albany parish, and priests from neighboring parishes.

Monsignor Lane was deeply affected by the news of the pontiff's death. When he heard of the death of the pope, he made the official decennial report of the archdiocese of Oregon, as the representative of Archbishop Christie of Portland. Monsignor Lane met Pope Benedict on several occasions and once had a private audience with him.

POOL COMMITTEE WAITS

BOYCOTT ON BRITISH AIM

Eight Signers of Egyptian Manifesto Are Arrested.

CAIRO, Egypt, Jan. 23.—A manifesto urging Egyptians to adopt non-cooperation and the boycott against goods and services of the British, signed by eight of the signers has been ordered and newspapers publishing it have been forced to suspend. The avowed purpose of the manifesto is to secure acknowledgment of the rights of the Egyptians.

BIG ORE STRIKE IS MADE

GOLD AND SILVER FOUND IN BAKER COUNTY.

Property Discovered 3 Miles North-east of Mt. Lookout Declared Best Find in 40 Years.

BAKER, Or., Jan. 23.—(Special.)—A big gold and silver strike has been made on the Lost trail group three miles northeast of Mount Lookout in Baker county, near the summit. This property was discovered last September by George Jennings and his father, P. J. Jennings, an old-time miner and prospector, but the news was just disclosed tonight. Development work has been carried on quite extensively for the last four months. There are five claims. The Grated Horn shaft has been sunk 40 feet deep on number one claim, the ledge being seven feet wide, four feet of which is clean ore that assays from eight ounces to 140 ounces in silver, and averages \$10 in gold.

A tunnel has been started on No. 2 claim. The Surprise and J. D. claims are located on a cross vein, a shaft having been sunk down on this ledge 85 feet, with ore all the way. Some of this ore runs as high as \$200 a ton in gold. The croppings of this mine were found in 1880 by miners stampeding the ore of the blanks issued by the government. In later years many searches were made to find it, but all failed for the rain and snow had washed down the debris of the mountains and had covered the ledge. The discovery of this lost trail mine was considered by mining men as one of the best that has been found in 40 years.

POLICE CHIEF SUSPENDED

Economy Plea of Youngstown, O., Mayor Disregarded.

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Jan. 23.—Mayor Olea today announced the suspension of Police Chief James Watkins, who, he said, had been given until noon to resign with the alternative of suspension. Watkins' appeal to the police to take a 10 per cent salary reduction apparently has fallen on deaf ears. When he went to work today, he was ordered to sign a resignation which had been returned today.

DYNAMITE PLOT BARED

Fuse in Ash Can in Large Butte, Mont., Building Burns Out.

BUTTE, Mont., Jan. 21.—An apparent attempt to dynamite the headquarters of the National Labor Union, 100 Broadway, was foiled yesterday. Six sticks of dynamite attached to a fuse were found in an ash can at the head of the stairs leading to the second floor. The fuse had been lit but had burned out.

BANKS MAKE CUBAN LOAN

\$5,000,000 Advanced for 1 Year to Cover Pressing Needs.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—J. P. Morgan & Co. today announced that a group of New York banks and bankers had made a one year loan of \$5,000,000 to Cuba.

The loan will cover "the pressing immediate needs for the republic."

the original resolution, and the Portland members of the sub-committee refused to endorse it.

After conferring with the rest of the Portland delegation, Mr. Hunt and Mr. Van Duzer presented a substitute resolution to the sub-committee, which in turn refused to accept the substitute. The Portlanders could have given their substitute resolution to the conference as a minority report, but preferred not to make an open break. Instead, the entire Portland delegation refused to vote on the sub-committee's resolution, which was adopted by the rest of the conference.

Portland Resolution Quoted.

The Portland substitute resolution, which met with disfavor by the conference sub-committee, was worded as follows: "The delegates of the chamber of commerce of the Pacific coast ports convened by invitation of the shipping board and now in conference do hereby record themselves as in favor of the establishment of an American-owned merchant marine."

"We approve the organization of such a corporation as is advisable and necessary, which may own and operate selected combined passenger and freight steamers in non-continuous coastwise and foreign trade under transport and mail contracts, provided that satisfactory arrangements can be made for securing such steamers and that proper allocation of activities can be so arrived at as will not ignore the rights or interests of any coast port nor prevent its development in accordance with its natural advantages and further not so as to bar the allocation to and operation of any other shipping board vessels by any port."

Whether Portland is represented on this committee or not, it is the intention of the Portland delegation to request Oregon's senators and representatives in congress to keep a close watch on these negotiations.

A revision and amplification of the plan to meet Portland's objections will be effected at the next meeting of the conference in San Francisco, or the open break will come then. The chances for this modification, however, appear to be negligible, for the men controlling the conference have shown no inclination to let Portland know what it really intends to do.

MISS FARRAR SCORES HIT APPEARANCE IN "MADAM BUTTERFLY" APPLAUDED. Admirers Call Back Diva Many Times and Demand Curtain Speech—Bouquets Showered.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—Geraldine Farrar received an ovation in the Metropolitan opera house today which brought the diva before the curtain for numerous calls. The audience demanded a curtain speech, and it would not be until she appeared in street clothes and left through the stage entrance for her home.

The extraordinary demonstration for Miss Farrar was rather unexpected, for today marked not her first but her second appearance on the Metropolitan stage since she announced last Wednesday that she would retire from grand opera next year.

After her act in "Madame Butterfly," Miss Farrar was called before the curtain by a ceaseless round of applause. Bouquets were showered upon her. Women stood as they clapped for her and men climbed upon their seats to pay homage. And at the end of the opera, instead of making the usual hasty retreat for the extra, the crowded house stayed—orchestra and boxes as well as the always more demonstrative galleries.

Miss Farrar was finally persuaded to make a curtain speech, a most unusual occurrence at the Metropolitan.

"I am most pleased," she said, beaming her thanks. "I can see that you like 'Madame Butterfly' very much."

DEPORTATION IS PROVIDED

McARTHUR MEASURE DIRECTED AT ALIENS.

Bill Is Introduced in Effort to Stamp Out Unlawful Traffic in Drugs and Narcotics.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU. Washington, D. C., Jan. 23.—Representative McArthur today introduced a measure providing for the deportation of aliens who may hereafter be convicted of violating the laws of the United States in respect of political subdivision thereof, relative to the unlawful importation, possession, sale, barter or exchange of any drug or narcotic.

The measure provides that the secretary of labor shall cause such offenders to be deported, but not until after the payment of their fines or completion of sentences imposed by the courts. Mr. McArthur said he made inquiry about this phase of the situation and found instances of aliens who have violated laws of the United States in order to obtain a free trip to their native land. He said he believed that such trips will be less alluring to this class of criminals if the law is allowed to take its course prior to deportation.

The McArthur measure also makes it a misdemeanor for any deported alien to return to this country, the proposed penalty being imprisonment for not less than six months or more than two years.

Mr. McArthur said he had discussed the proposed measure with Representative Albert Johnson, chairman of the house committee on immigration and naturalization, which has jurisdiction over all legislation dealing with deportations, and Mr. Johnson assured him that the subject will be carefully considered in connection with the next general immigration bill reported to the house. It is quite probable, therefore, that the McArthur bill will be incorporated in a general immigration bill within the next few months.

The measure, Mr. McArthur said, was prepared in response to a widespread feeling of indignation where both federal and state governments should take every possible step to stamp out the unlawful traffic in drugs and narcotics.
