RATE TARIFFS TO BE PUBLISHED.—According to J. H. Mulvey, general freight agent of the Southern Pacific company, arrangements are being made to publish specifically in supplements now being prepared to transcontinental tariffs a 10 per cent reduction in the rates on rice and rice products the same as was recently placed in effect on farm and farm products. These rates will be published to expire by limitation on June 30, 1922, after which date the present rates will again apply. Application has been filed with the interstate commerce commission for authority to publish the reduced rates effective on short notice. It is expected that the effective date will be announced shortly.

SOUTHERN RITE CHIEF TO SPEAK.—Captain John H. Cowles, sovereign commander of the southern jurisdiction of Scottish Rite Masons, will address the members of the Scottish Rite bodies of the state tomorrow night in the cathedral at Fourteenth and Morrison streets. During the evening, according to Philip S. Malcolm, sovereign grand inspector-general of Oregon, the 25th degree will be exemplified. This fact, coupled with the address by Captain Cowles, will make the meeting of great importance to Scottish Rite Masons. Captain Cowles will arrive tomorrow morning and will remain until Thursday evening, when he will depart for Seattle.

PUPILS TO HEAR REHEARSAL.—Pupils in the seventh and eighth grades in 12 elementary schools of the city will be guests of the Portland symphony orchestra at a rehearsal tomorrow morning at the Hellig theater at 9:45 o'clock. The pupils are so apportioned that students from each school in the upper grades have the opportunity to attend at least one of these rehearsals each year. Pupils will attend from the following schools: Alameda Park, Arleta, Brooklyn, Chapman, Couch, Creston, Davis, Holman, Ladd, Sabin, Shattuck and Terwilliger.

HEATING PLANT BIDS SUBMITTED.—Bids on the heating plant for the new county hospital on Marquam hill were submitted to Multnomah county commissioners yesterday and referred to the architects for recommendation. Bids were as follows: Alaska Plumbing and Heating company, \$53,850; W. S. Fleming, \$54,340; Bushlight & Haastor, \$54,750; Kraft company, \$57,750; and Fox & Co., \$59,687. Court-house plumbing bids opened yesterday ranged from \$2315 bid by Sturges & Sturges to \$2310, suggested by Charles Fullman.

CONCERT TO BE GIVEN AT Y. M. C. A.—A special program to include a motion picture showing the operation of the telephone system in Portland, selections by male and mixed quartets and an orchestra, will be presented at 8 o'clock next Tuesday night in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. membership committee. A. Ten Haaf, chairman of the entertainment committee, is in charge.

ST. JOHN'S W. C. T. U. TO MEET.—An all-day meeting of the St. Johns W. C. T. U. will be held tomorrow at the St. Johns W. C. A. building, with "Christian Citizenship" as its subject. The program will open at 10:30 o'clock and will be in charge of Mrs. M. L. T. Hadden, county superintendent of the Christian citizenship department. The public is invited. Luncheon will be served at noon.

POET TO ADDRESS STUDENTS.—The poetry of Yachel Lindsay will be discussed by the author himself at a meeting to be held in Lincoln high school auditorium next Friday evening at 8 o'clock. Among the poems that have attracted attention to Mr. Lindsay are "The Golden Whales of California," "The Golden Book of Springfield" and "The Chinese Nightingale."

RESERVE OFFICERS WILL MEET.—The annual meeting of the Officers' Reserve Corps association of Oregon will be held at 8 o'clock tonight at the armory, Colonel C. C. Hammond, who is just returning from a year and a half duty with the general staff at Washington, will speak on matters of interest to the reserve officers. All ex-officers are invited to attend.

SOLDIERS' BODIES COMING.—Bodies of seven men of the northwest who lost their lives in France will arrive in Portland for interment tomorrow. Some time this week, according to word received by the army quartermaster's office yesterday. The names of the men were not given in the message.

SALVATION ARMY AIDE APPOINTED.—Brigadier Hay, who has command of the Salvation Army operations for the state of Oregon, has appointed Envoys Frank Carter to organize the work in St. Johns. Envoys Carter has recently returned from the Hawaiian Islands and has had many years' experience with the Salvation Army.

LANCASTER TO ADDRESS ROTARY CLUB.—Samuel Lancaster, highway engineer, will speak on the subject of "The New Road" at the Rotary club luncheon today. His talk will be illustrated with stereoscopic views. Dean Vincent will be chairman of the day. Mrs. Ralph D. Robinson will furnish the music.

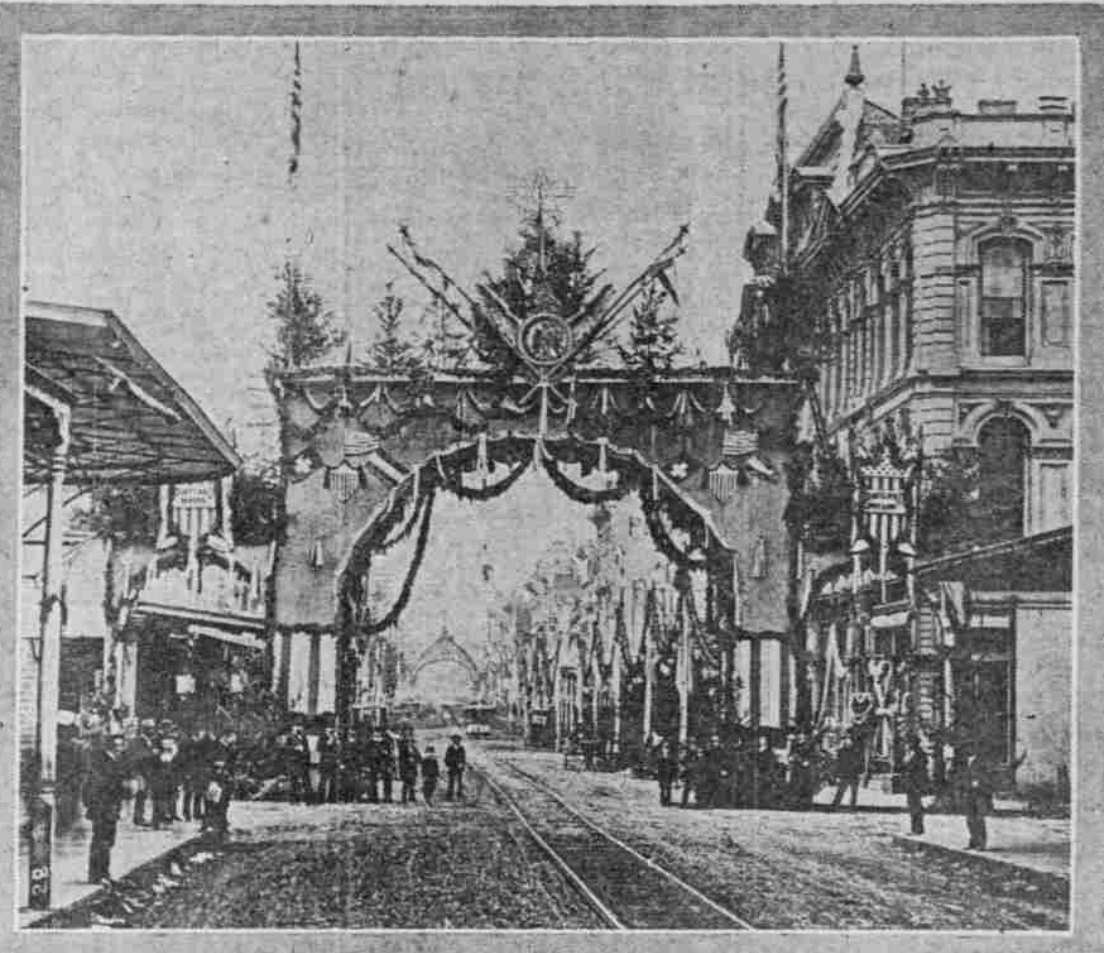

The gala celebration held in Portland the day the last spike was driven into the Northern Pacific railroad, effecting the completion of the first transcontinental line. The whole town was decorated for the occasion and thousands of visitors from surrounding states as well as more than 100 special guests from England and Germany, watched the parade and heard the speeches.

Henry Villard and General Grant were the dominating figures of the day, and Sir Charles Russell, solicitor-general under Gladstone, made the speech for England. The golden spike was driven home on September 10, 1883, and all the guests completed their tour over the new line and celebrated in Portland on September 11. The arch in the photograph was erected at First and Salmon streets and signified the joining by rail of Portland, Or., and Portland, Me. Looking north in First street can be seen another similar arch at Alder street. Half way between is one of the old First-street horse cars. Every building in town was gay with colorful decorations and those along the line of parade were particularly brilliant.

CHINAMAN ON TRIAL.—Attorney Henry E. McGinn, ex-judge of the circuit court in Multnomah county, appears in the role of special prosecutor in the trial of Toy Chong for the murder of Wong Gee, which opened with the examination of jurors yesterday. It is one of the few criminal cases in which Attorney McGinn has appeared in recent years. The case is a retrial, the jury disagreeing as to the guilt in the first hearing last month. Toy Chong is one of the Sui Sing gunmen, the state claims, who shot and killed Wong Gee at Fourth and Davis streets on October 7. Deputy District Attorney Mowry and Attorney McGinn appear for the state. John A. Collier and Earl P. Bernard for the defense.

TELEPHONE THEFT BUST.—The telephone thief is at work again. It was reported yesterday at the police detective bureau that telephone coin boxes in widely separated parts of the city were broken open and looted of their nickels. The first complaint came from the Zorn hotel, where the telephone box had been rifled of nearly \$5 in nickels and slugs. Later the police were notified that two telephone boxes in a store at 334 Grand avenue had been broken open.

PROPOSED SITE VIEWED.—The Roosevelt equestrian statue which Dr. Henry Waldo Coe will present to the city in July or August may be placed on the very top of Mount Tabor park. City Commissioners Pier and Bigelow, together with Dr. Coe, visited this park yesterday and viewed the site. All were greatly impressed with it, but no definite decision was made. A meeting is scheduled for today when it is possible that some decision will be made.

LIQUOR MAKERS FINED.—Sam Gallocci, who had 75 gallons of moonshine stored in his home at 182 Meade street when the place was raided by Deputy Sheriff Palmer, Bowman and Wolfe Friday night, pleaded guilty to manufacturing illicit liquor before District Judge Bell yesterday and was fined \$200. Milton Yappelin, arrested at 537 Front street with a supply of moonshine, but no still, was fined \$175 by Judge Bell.

HOUSE IN PROGRESS.—C. J. Johnson is erecting a story and a half residence, to cost \$5500, at 507 East Forty-fourth street north, and the Bungalow Construction company has started the building of two one-story residences, to cost about \$2500 each, at 416 and 423 East Sixty-fourth street. Plans are ready for the erection of two-story apartments at a cost of \$4500 by M. L. McNamara at 1702 East Ninth street.

BUILDING READY IN 20 DAYS.—Within 20 more working days the new media school building at East Twenty-seventh and Fremont streets will be completed, according to a statement made yesterday by Robert Davies, the contractor. The building is now ready for the plasterers. Its general dimensions are 144 by 236 feet and it contains 12 classrooms. It is of frame and its cost will be \$65,000.

MORE IMPROVEMENT CREDIT.—Undaunted by the statements of city officials that no more street improvement work can be taken on for this year than that already selected for construction, citizens in the St. Johns district are circulating petitions asking for the hard-surfacing of Taylor and Syracuse streets from Philadelphia street to St. Johns avenue.

SURE FOR \$12,350 FINE.—For injuries received when the automobile in which she was riding was struck and carried into a telegraph pole at Broadway and Williams avenue by a machine driven by W. T. Wright, Minnie E. Dawson was fined \$12,350 in a suit filed in the circuit court yesterday. The accident occurred January 1, 1922.

HOLDER STORY QUESTIONED.—John George, 646 Mississippi avenue, was held up and robbed of \$5 and a fountain pen by two highwaymen near Mississippi avenue and Morris street early yesterday, he reported to the police. Officers who investigated said they found George under the influence of liquor and were skeptical about his holding story.

WILSON BENEFIT.—I. L. Wilson, Benefactor, one of the widely known business men of East Portland and an officer in the East Side Business Men's club, has been confined to his room for several days with a severe cold verging on pneumonia. His condition was reported as unimproved yesterday.

ELECTION IS POSTPONED

LIVESTOCK EXPOSITION DIRECTORS DEFER ACTION.

Successor to F. S. Stimson, Late President of Organization, to Be Chosen at March Meeting.

Election of a president of the Pacific International Livestock exposition to succeed F. S. Stimson, deceased, was postponed until March because of a light attendance at the exposition company directors' meeting yesterday. Walter A. Moore of Hollywood, Wash., son-in-law of Mr. Stimson, was elected a director to take Mr. Stimson's place.

Dates for the 1922 exposition were set for the week of November 1 to 11, corresponding closely with the 1921 season, which proved the most successful in the history of the exposition.

The next meeting of the directors was tentatively set for March 26. A special committee was appointed to prepare the budget for the 1922 exposition for examination in March. Its personnel includes Roderick Macleay of Portland, E. A. Stuart of Seattle and W. B. Ayer and Frank Robertson of Portland.

Affairs of the exposition company were shown to be in the best shape in the history of the organization. Charles H. Carey will continue to act as president of the exposition company until an election is held.
