ESTATE GOES TO JURIST

WILLIAM N. GATENS IS CHIEF BENEFICIARY OF AUNT.

Bulk of Property Worth \$150,000 Left by Mary Cremen Willed to Circuit Court Judge.

William N. Gatens, circuit judge, is the chief beneficiary of an estate valued at nearly \$150,000, left by his aunt, Mary Cremen, whose death in Portland occurred January 19, according to the terms of the will filed for probate yesterday. Judge Gatens receives the residue of the estate after bequests of \$18,000 are paid. The judge long had been a favorite with his aunt and had handled most of her business affairs for the last 16 years. John F. O'Shea was appointed executor of the will by order of Circuit Judge Taswell.

The estate includes a four-story business building near Fourth, in Washington street, and other valuable real estate. Relatives remembered in the will, in addition to Judge Gatens, include Mrs. Mina Gatens, wife of the circuit judge, who will receive \$1000; Susan Griffin of St. Johns, New Brunswick, a niece, who is bequeathed \$2000, and James Gatens of Seattle, O. R., a half-brother, who is left \$2000.

Other bequests are: Archbishop Christie, \$1000; Rev. Edwin V. O'Hara, cathedral parish, \$500; Rev. W. B. Cronin, Laurelhurst parish, \$500; Rev. A. G. DeLorimer, Cathedral parish, \$500; Rev. H. J. McDevitt, Marshfield, \$500; Sisters of Charity of Home of Providence of St. Vincent's, \$1000; Anderson Industrial home, Bellingham, \$1000; Sisters of the Good Shepherd, Portland, \$500; Christian Brothers, for the education of a boy, \$5000; Sisters of the Holy Names of Mount St. Mary's, for perpetual scholarship for the education of a young girl, \$5000; congregation of Sacred Cross or Holy Cross of Columbia university, perpetual scholarship for the education of a boy, \$2000; Society of Holy Names of Jesus and Mary for orphan girls, \$1000, and Sisters of Presentation, \$1000.

KIWANIS CLUB MEETS

Oregon Professor Scores Correspondence School Trickery.

Certain types of correspondence schools were branded as unscrupulous money-getters by Earl Kilpatrick, director of the extension division of the University of Oregon, in a speech on "Education by Correspondence" at the weekly lunch meeting of the Kiwanis club yesterday.

Mr. Kilpatrick pointed out that many correspondence schools promise to teach a student a ceiling trade or profession without first finding out the fitness of the applicant. He said that such schools used courses by mail as a subterfuge for selling books at a large profit. The best type of correspondence school is that which provides students with personal service, including revision of their papers by competent teachers, he said. This is the method employed by the University of Oregon's extension department.
