When the steamer Columbia of the San Francisco & Portland Steamship company was stuck in 14 feet of ice at Warrior Rock, two miles east of St. Helens. She left Portland on January 16, 1907, to make her way down the river, which was then flowing full of ice. After laboring along her way more than 24 hours she finally became caught in an ice jam in the narrow channel at Warrior Rock.

The boat was commanded by Captain Doran, and Captain Willis Snow was pilot. There were 50 passengers on board, and for nearly a week they made merry while stranded in the ice. The picture was furnished by J. H. Gilbigham, who was a passenger on the Columbia at the time and recounts the efforts made by other river craft to reach the steamer and help her out of her predicament.

Ice had been running in the Willamette and Columbia rivers for some time when a severe cold spell struck the region. At The Dalles it was possible to cross over the river on the ice, and transportation was suspended until the severe weather was over and the ice out of both rivers.

LEGION SEEKS MEMBERS

DRIVE FOR 5000 BY 1923 IS LAUNCHED BY VETERANS

Organization to Participate in Auditorium Meeting at February 22.

An intensive membership campaign with a 5000 enrollment by 1923 was launched last night by Portland Post of the American Legion in the organization's regular monthly meeting. The assembly was held in the post's headquarters at the American Legion building at Fourth and Washington streets.

"Every Member Get a Member" has been the national slogan of the American Legion for some time and this was adopted by the local organization. During the coming month there will be no initiation fee charged to new members, according to the announcement of Commander James J. Crockett, who presided at the meeting.

Applicants for membership will be admitted on the display of their discharges or other evidence to show that they had been in the service and the payment of the annual dues of \$4. The American Legion will participate in the naturalization meeting of applicants for citizenship at the big meeting to be held in the municipal auditorium on February 22. At this time Judge Wolcott will administer the oath to a large number of persons who have passed the preliminary examinations for citizenship.

A committee of three members of the legion was appointed to investigate conditions at the United States public health service hospital, it having been called to the attention of the organization that individuals and committees have experienced difficulty in securing admission to the hospital for the purpose of visiting friends.

SOLDIER TO BREAK ROCK

Howard Flanders, Who Stole Auto for Ride, Gets Five Days.

LABOR COUNCIL ELECTS

G. A. VAN SCHILTZ IS CHOSEN

PRESIDENT, 56 TO 43.

Vote Is Taken After Hot Argument

as to Eligibility of Some

Unions to Participate.

On the third ballot in the closest central labor council election held in recent years, G. A. Van Schiltz, electrical workers' union No. 125, defeated D. L. Nickerson, carpenters No. 226, by 19 votes by 4 feet, for use in extension of the municipal terminal railway in Kellogg street. The price named was \$18 the 1000 feet, and the other offers ranged upward to \$22. The bids have been taken under advisement. The street railway extension is to be launched as soon as permission is received from the state public service commission to install and maintain one overhead and one surface crossing of a steam railroad track in Kellogg street.

The first vote last night resulted in a tie, 40 to 40. It was preceded by a wordy argument between President Nickerson and the board over the arrival of delegates from 15 unions which had not been represented at the meeting a week before. Mr. Nickerson ruled that they were entitled to a vote as their unions were all in good standing. The board ruled them out on the ground that they had not been represented at the first meeting and that the session last night was merely a continuation of that meeting.

Kinsey, typographical No. 55, secretary-treasurer; Vera Epling, telephone operators No. 44-A, reading clerk; H. J. Scott, retail clerks No. 101, conductor; C. J. Hayes, retail clerks No. 1007, warren; Gust Anderson of streetcar No. 737, T. Morrow of engineers No. 143, T. Morrow of engineers No. 143, executive board; C. H. Copeland, meat cutters No. 143, and Kinsey, typographical No. 55, legislative committee.

LIBRARY SITE SETTLED

University Park Controversy Is Adjusted at Session.

An amicable adjustment of the recent controversy over the University Park branch library building was reached last night at a meeting of the newly-organized community club, when representatives of various interests addressed the members and Rev. Henry T. Atkinson, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, speaking on behalf of the trustees of his church, said that the congregation favored the site at Lombard and Dodge streets for the new building. This was received with applause, as the church previously had held that the Pike-street site on its own property was best.

Rev. Mr. Atkinson, speaking on behalf of the trustees of his church, expressed the view that the library branch is an all-community proposition.
