

ACTRESS IN PULPIT GIVES BRIEF SERMON

Louise Lovely Speaks at
First Congregational.

"NOTHING" IS SUBJECT

Fashionable Hat of Crimson Hue,
Expensive Furs and Smart
Street Suit Worn.

The unusual spectacle of a beautiful actress preaching an inspiring first sermon from the pulpit of a leading church was witnessed by an interested crowd of churchgoers who filled every available seat in First Congregational church last night when Miss Louise Lovely, motion picture star, played the role of a minister.

Miss Lovely, wearing a fashionable hat of crimson hue, expensive furs and a smart street suit, was escorted to the pulpit by Dr. W. T. McElveen, pastor of First Congregational church. She was greeted with a burst of applause from the congregation.

Message Called "Nothing."
"I have only a little to say, and I've called the subject of my message 'Nothing,'" said the film queen. "By nothing, I mean the little things that seem like nothing to us, but which may mean everything to some one else."

"For example, a woman may remark that she doesn't like a certain acquaintance, or that she doesn't like another woman's hat. The remark may seem like nothing to the woman who made it, but it would make the other woman unhappy and might break a friendship."

"Men, too, will say mean little things about each other. The things they say eventually hurt some one."

Childhood Days Mentioned.
"As children we used to do little things that we thought were wonderful. We brought her a flower and kissed her. These things were nothing to us, but they were beautiful memories now. When we grow up we sometimes think we're so wonderful that we forget to do the little things that mother loves and appreciates so."

"I don't believe the picture wants good, clean, worth-while pictures, because films of this sort play to almost empty houses."

Helping Hand Is Advised.
"If some one does wrong or makes a mistake, stretch out a helping hand. Don't wipe your feet on the unfortunate one."

"My philosophy in life is contained in the verse: 'Be ye as ye would be.' There's so much good in the worst of us, and so much bad in the best of us, that it doesn't become any of us to speak ill of the rest of us."

Immediately after delivering her "sermonette," Miss Lovely hurried to a waiting automobile and was taken to her dressing room at the Rivoli theater.

Miss Lovely is the first woman I have ever heard in public or private who admitted that she had little to say," said Dr. McElveen with a smile after the screen star left the platform.

POLICEMAN, DRUNK, JAIRED

J. H. PARDO DISCARDS PISTOL,
HELMET AND CAPE.

Officer Found at North Bank Station,
Face Covered With Blood
and Several Teeth Missing.

J. H. Pardo, police patrolman on the North Albina beat, was stripped of his star and sent to jail for drunkenness when he was found in a badly intoxicated condition at the North Bank station yesterday morning. The arrest was made by Sergeant Robinson, commanding officer of the uniform day relief, yesterday.

According to Sergeant Robinson's report to Chief Jenkins, Pardo was drunk and could hardly walk and a big crowd was gathered around him at the railroad station watching him. His face was covered with blood and several teeth were missing. He had thrown away his revolver, helmet and cape and these were turned over to the police by persons who had picked them up around the railroad yards.

Pardo, at the city jail, is said to have told Sergeant Robinson that he had attempted to stop three men with suitcases on the train last night early in the morning. The men attacked him, he said, and knocked him out. When he recovered consciousness, he said they were pouring whiskey down his throat. From then on, he related, he had no idea of what he had done.

Pardo is a member of the second night relief. Just what time he left his district and went to the west side the police have not yet learned. He sought to implicate a fellow officer, but his story is being carefully investigated before the other patrolman is temporarily suspended.

PHONE MERGER CASE SET

Oregon and Washington Officials
to Hear Proposal March 9.

SALEM, Or., March 5.—(Special.)—The proposal to consolidate by contract the properties of the Northwestern Long Distance Telephone company with those of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company has been assigned by the interstate commerce commission to the department of public works of the state of Washington and the public service commission of Oregon. Hearing of the application has been set for March 9 at Olympia.

It was said today that at least two members of the Oregon public service commission will attend the conference.

It is strange how one's first impression sticks and works an influence on one's feelings forever after. As I kept getting nearer, closer into the city itself, my feelings became more expressive of the thrill I felt at being for a time a part of you—just an atom drifting into your midst.

My first impression was strengthened as my taxi dashed through your big streets. I loved the general plan of the city—your buildings, your fine stores, everything. There was a noticeable atmosphere of alertness in the people I passed in the streets. Life seemed to mean something more than just an existence. Everybody looked as if the life ahead held something, and they were striving to reach out and grasp that something firmly.

Recent Visit Stories.
"Since I was a child I have traveled almost all over the world. I have always watched the people in the streets—their faces, their general expressions—and from these faces have passed judgment on the city. It seemed to me that the city was a city filled with laughter, wall-to-wall porters and such, and it is most probably falling gradually into the discard."

You of Portland have made a wonderful and lasting impression on me. I like you already, those of you who are so friendly and so kind to me by the hand. Those hands have meant big things to me. They mean, "You are welcome, Louise," and I love to be welcomed here. Even from those who did not clap my hand I got the friendly thought that came from their heart to mine.

BONUS PARADE IS HELD

Acting Mayor of Seattle and Governor
Join Line of March.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 5.—Seven thousand veterans of the World War participated in a parade and mass meeting here this afternoon as a protest against delay in passage by congress of a national bonus measure. The parade was led by Acting Mayor Hesket and city officials, and included various civil and veterans' organizations, fraternal orders and citizens in automobiles.

CROSSINGS SESSION SET

Service Commissioners to Study
Means to Eliminate Dangers.

SALEM, Or., March 5.—(Special.)—How to devise means for the elimination of dangers at railroad crossings will be the subject for discussion at a joint conference of the department of public works of the state of Washington and the public service commission of Oregon and Idaho, to be held in Olympia March 9 and 10. Announcement of the conference was received at the offices of the Oregon public service commission yesterday.

UPLIFT OF MOVIES OBJECT OF LEAGUE

Actors, Writers and Directors
Join in Efforts.

PRIVATE LIFE INVOLVED

Film Industry as Whole Considered
to Have Maintained Good
Standard of Conduct.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 5.—Placing the motion picture industry upon the highest possible plane is the object of the federation of art by the Cinematographers' association, the Writers' guild, the Actors' Equity association and the motion picture directors' association.

Although its general purpose, as announced, will be to further the good of motion pictures, the federation will refuse to take any action against the "few undesirable" of the motion picture industry.

Actors or others connected with the industry, who refuse to conduct their private lives according to the highest standards, are "to be drummed out of camp."

The writers will refuse to sell their stories; the cinematographers will refuse to photograph them; the actors will refuse to appear in pictures with them, and the directors will refuse to direct them, according to the plans of the federation.

Board to Enforce Rules.
Each of the four associations which go to make up the federation will elect three members to a committee to enforce the rules of the organization.

Frank Woods, a production manager in the industry, said that the motion picture industry, as a whole, has maintained a standard of conduct that compares well with any other industry in the world.

Clean Business Proposed.
"As a general thing, it is the custom of the business world to regard a man's private life as his own affair, something that his business associates have no right to know."

But in the case of the motion picture industry, however, we feel that we have the right to inquire even into private lives, because of the great influence that stars have come to have upon the lives of the public.

At any rate, we are in the determination that the picture business shall be absolutely clean from top to bottom. All but a very few picture people are living the right kind of lives. Those who do not in the future choose to bring their standards up to the standards of the industry as a whole, will find themselves quietly dropped into oblivion."

STOCK BUYERS ATTACKED

SECRETARY WALLACE FILES
COMPLAINT ON ST. LOUIS.

110 Cited to Appear Before Federal
Court on Charge of Boycotting
Non-Exchange Firms.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 5.—A formal complaint has been filed by Secretary Wallace under the Sherman anti-trust act, against five live-stock commission firms holding membership in the St. Louis Live Stock exchange.

The complaint charges that the firms, by their refusal to trade with non-exchange members, are in violation of the Sherman act. The complaint was filed under the act.

The defendants, numbering about 110, have been cited to appear before federal court, St. Louis, March 10.

The principal charge in the complaint was that the exchange members were refusing to trade with non-exchange members, and that they were operating a boycott and that "23 commission firms, constituting the entire membership of the exchange, refused to trade with non-exchange buyers or traders—except buyers for the very large packing concerns—who buy livestock for the purpose of processing companies that are not members of the exchange."

SCHOOLS GET \$1,811,666

PRINCIPAL OF ROCKEFELLER
FUNDS DISTRIBUTED.

Grants Made for Increasing Teachers' Salaries in 19 Colleges;
Negro Education Helped.

NEW YORK, March 5.—Gifts of \$1,811,666 to schools and colleges of the nation, made possible by the Rockefeller foundation's decision to permit distribution of principal as well as income from its funds, were made yesterday by the general education board of the Rockefeller foundation. The gifts included:

Illinois Wesleyan university, Bloomington, Ill., \$135,000; Northwestern university, Evanston, \$100,000; College of the Pacific, San Jose, Cal., \$250,000; Hampden-Sydney college, Hampden-Sydney, Va., \$100,000; Boston university, \$400,000; University of Chattanooga, Tenn., \$166,666; Presbyterian college of South Carolina, Clinton, S. C., \$125,000; Lincoln university for negroes, Chester county, Pennsylvania, \$25,000; New York university, \$233,160.

Other grants authorized were: To 19 colleges for increasing teachers' salaries, \$199,235; negro education, supervising industrial teachers, \$75,000; summer schools for teachers, \$41,272; county training school, \$81,600; miscellaneous, \$12,200.

500 MILLION ON STRIKE

Klamath Falls Trouble First in
Lumber Industry Since 1917.

The lumber strike now on the mills of Klamath Falls is the first labor trouble of any magnitude in the lumber industry of the state since 1917, according to E. C. Conners, of the headquarters department of the League of Loggers and Lumbermen. Information received here was that 500 mills are involved in the strike, and that between 500 and 600 men are out.

The strike was said to have been precipitated by the action of the operators in declaring a 9-hour day to take the place of the former 8-hour day which had been in effect for some time.

The Four L headquarters was advised that the strike was in progress yesterday in Aberdeen for the purpose of organizing. Some attention was being paid to the belief that it might be a "Wobly" movement.

BEER TUNNEL IS CLOSED

Rendezvous for Actors and Politicians
Ends 30-Year Cycle.

CHICAGO, March 5.—When Marx' beer tunnel, the city's last time last night, an interesting cycle of more than 30 years was completed. The tunnel, the birthplace of the free lunch and rendezvous for many old-time actors and politicians, was closed down by the city's police.

TOBACCO MEN IN COMBINE

Growers of Black Belt Organize
Marketing Association.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 5.—Organization of a co-operative marketing association to handle the sale of tobacco grown in the "black belt" of western Kentucky, Indiana and Tennessee was authorized at a meeting of growers and business men here Saturday with the organizers of the Burley Co-operative association now in active operation.

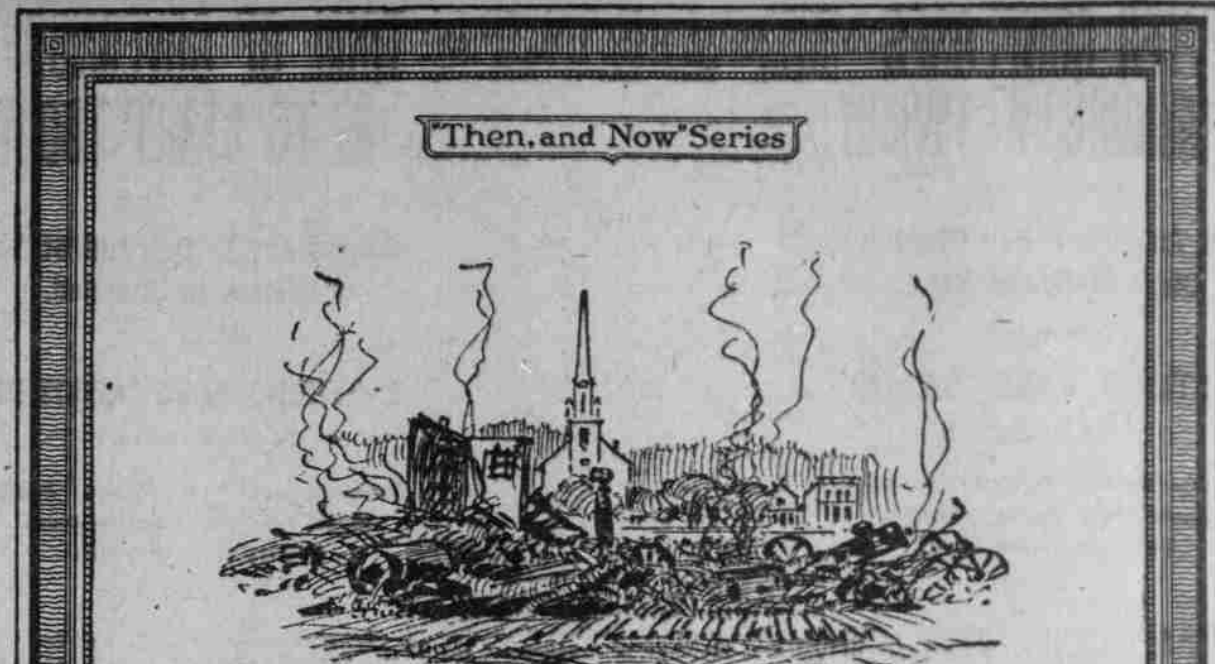
Between 250,000,000 and 275,000,000 pounds of tobacco is grown in the belt, it is said.

Guatemala Plans Loan

SAN SALVADOR, Republic of Salvador, March 5.—The national assembly of Guatemala, it is learned here, is considering a project for an external loan of \$25,000,000. The loan would be guaranteed by permits for the exploitation of the rich petroleum region in the north part of Guatemala.

Seaside to Get Dance Hall.

SEASIDE, Or., March 5.—(Special.)—Plans have been nearly completed for the erection of a new dance hall on Broadway and First street. The structure will be modern and every way, with one of the best dance floors in the northwest, costing in the neighborhood of \$25,000.



The Panic and Fire of 1873

PORTLAND'S early history was marked by a series of calamitous events which seemingly proved only stronger incentives to progress. The panic that shook the country in 1873, closely followed by the fire in Portland which destroyed over \$1,000,000 worth of property, indeed appeared disastrous. In this fire twenty city blocks were swept by the flames in spite of the valiant efforts of the volunteer fire department.

Ladd & Tilton Bank actively co-operated in plans to relieve the distress of those who suffered through the fire. CHINA IS RECUPERATING

REPAIRING PUBLIC FINANCES
IS IN PROGRESS.

Separate Armies Interfering With
Central Government Declared.
Biggest Stumbling Block.

MANILA, P. I., March 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—Rehabilitation of China through reforms in administration, repairing of public finances and reunion of all the provinces into one harmonious entity is slowly being accomplished, according to Jacob Gould Schurman, American minister to China, who is here to attend the wedding of his daughter.

"The Washington conference gave China large concessions," Mr. Schurman said, "and it is now up to the people of China to reap the benefits of these concessions by restoring a stable, united and effective government."

"China must disband her rival armies or reduce her troops and bring her irresponsible chieftains together in harmony before a true start on the 'new China' will be made. Separate armies dominating and interfering with the central government are proving the biggest stumbling block to China."

"China is suffering also from inadequate public revenues. The national treasury is empty and her creditors are crying for money. Additional revenues are needed, but I see no reason why the raising of adequate funds through a good system of taxation could not be accomplished."

Mr. Schurman leaves Wednesday on the cruiser Albany, which has been placed at his disposal by the navy department for the purpose of visiting all the principal United States consulates in China.

"A minister can't learn what he should by sitting in the legation all day," he said.
