

NO OPPOSITION MET BY NAVAL TREATY

Unanimous Ratification by Senate Is Expected. ACTION IS DUE TODAY

Throughout Discussion Not Single Voice Is Raised Against Pact on Limitation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—Five hours of debate on the naval limitation treaty today revealed a virtually unanimous sentiment in favor of the treaty.

Unanimous Approval Predicted. Tonight the administration leaders were predicting that the ratification would be unanimous and that the submarine and poison-gas treaty would be approved by a like vote before adjournment tomorrow night.

It was then evident more than ever that the treaty was to be centered upon the presidency and both sides were arrayed, a tense atmosphere reigning and everyone wondering what was going to happen next.

Mr. Chairman, you have ruled that members must sign the constitution and I demand to know why, when I went to the courthouse and tried to sign it, I was denied the privilege.

Still another man arose and, explaining that he was a member but did not have his request with him, asked if the ruling barred him.

Shame, someone cried, and faint hisses were heard, followed by vociferous applause from the Hofer contingent, men and women joining.

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W. S. Raker, president of the Oregon Audubon society, was on his feet quickly, and after paying high tributes to the work of the humane society for the last year and lauding Colonel Hofer as the guiding genius of the organization, placed him in nomination. Instantly there was applause lasting for some time. Quiet being restored, the nomination was seconded and there was more cheering.

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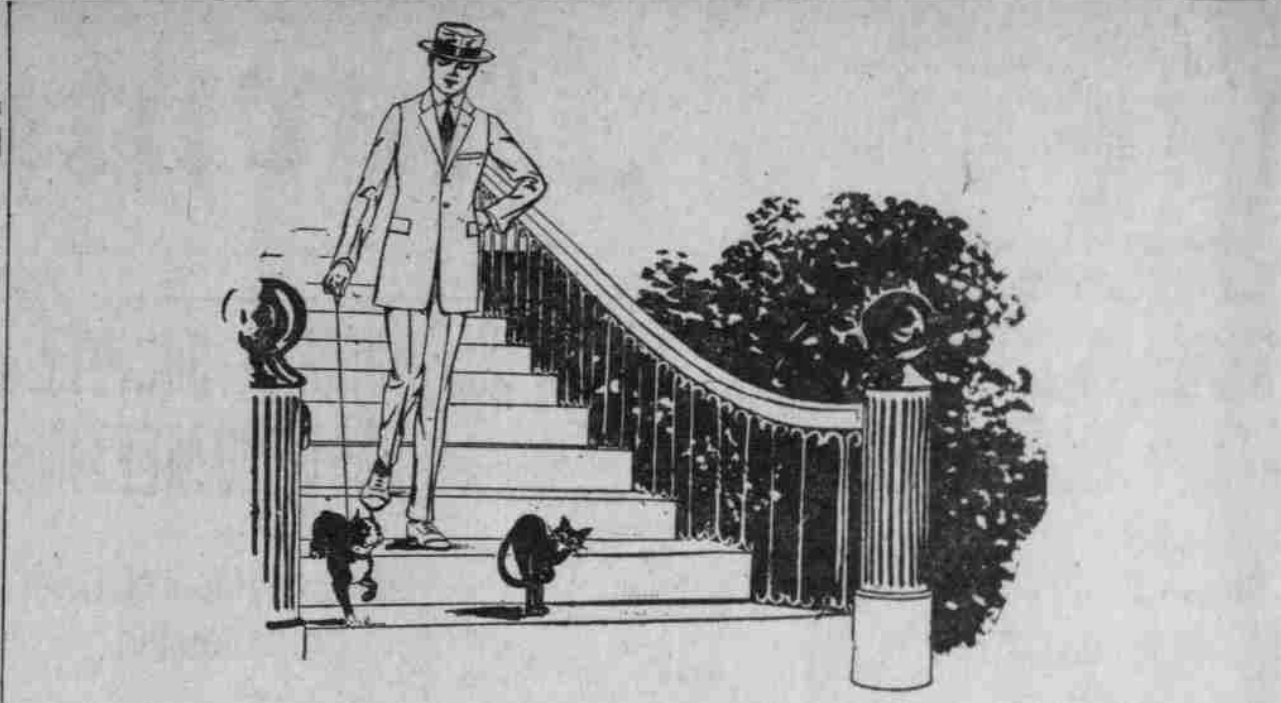
