

TWINS' LIFE HANGS BY SLENDER THREAD

Hope for One of Blazek Sisters Abandoned.

SURGEONS READY TO ACT

Should One Die Separation Operation Will Be Performed in Hope of Saving Other.

CHICAGO, March 29.—All hope of saving the life of at least one of the Siamese twins, Josefa and Rosa Blazek, who have been joined together since birth, was abandoned tonight at the hospital to which they have been confined for the past ten days.

"I don't expect Josefa to live through the night," Dr. B. H. Breakstone, chief of the hospital surgical staff, declared, "and I fear the physical reaction may prove fatal to Rosa. Everything is in readiness, however, to rush them to the operating room and perform the operation the moment the death of one of them is considered highly probable."

The condition of Josefa took a turn for the worse today when pneumonia developed in her right lung and the temperature and pulse rose rapidly. This was accompanied by a sympathetic turn for the worse in Rosa, it was said.

The success of an operation, the physicians have said, would depend upon whether each of the sisters constitutes a separate physical and psychological entity. The mere separation of flesh and bone would be easy, according to the physicians, but the effect of the operation upon the mental and nervous systems has been considered highly problematical.

Each of the sisters has individual heart, lungs and stomach. Josefa, who was stricken first, is most desperately ill. The disease was communicated to Rosa. Until last night the temperature and pulse of the twins had been virtually identical. But last night Josefa's temperature mounted to 99 and her pulse to 100, while Rosa's temperature and pulse remained about normal.

An attorney has been at the twins' bedside ready to write their wills should they become unconscious. Rosa, 12-year-old son, Frantz, and the mother's brother, Frank, remain constantly at the bedside.

Harding Wants John A. McCall for Klamath Falls Postmaster.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 29.—President Harding today announced the nomination of John A. McCall to be postmaster at Klamath Falls, Or.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., March 29.—(Special.) John A. McCall, whose nomination for postmaster at Klamath Falls was today sent to the senate by President Harding, has been assistant postmaster here for ten years and has lived here 13 years. He will succeed W. A. DeWolf, who held the office eight years and whose term expired January 24. Other applicants for the office were Frank E. Robinson, pharmacist; Charles C. Whitmore, postal clerk; C. F. Werner, butcher, and Don Belding, editor of a local paper.

our schools," said Director Clark. Public indifference is responsible for the present situation. Money is needed to replace buildings that are firetraps and should be condemned."

Director Blum declared that the newspapers had been very fair in reporting board meetings, and suggested that a review of the district's building needs be prepared and submitted to the newspapers for publication. The board later adopted his suggestion.

More Voting Urged.

Director Woodward made a plea for better attendance at the polls in school elections, and presented statistics showing that usually 85 to 90 per cent of the registered voters do not cast a ballot. He said that he had sent letters to 100 prominent Portland business men asking for advice on the financial problems of the district and had received only 11 replies, most of which contained no aid.

The board voted to present a note of appreciation to the teachers of the city for their services under difficult conditions.

"Our teachers are really taking a reduction in salary, for they are handling 15 to 25 per cent more work than the normal amount, and receiving no extra compensation," said Chairman Newell.

Labor Indorses Bonds.

A letter was received from the Central Labor Council indorsing the proposed bond issue and tax levy and promising full co-operation in securing it.

The matter of subscribing \$500 to the Portland Symphony orchestra was deferred to the first board meeting in July by a vote of 4 to 1. Director Woodward casting the negative vote.

The board took no action on the naming of the new James John high school, but referred the matter to Samuel Pierce, attorney for the board, with instructions that he review the will of the late James John to see if the board had authority to name the school Roosevelt or Grant, as suggested by certain groups.

Superintendent Groat reported that arrangements for the parade for March 31st Monday morning were satisfactory, and that all the school children would turn out to greet the French war hero.

Timber Strike Still On

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., March 29.—(Special.)—Indications are "hopeful" for a settlement for the timber workers' strike. This was the only statement given out by Otto Hartwig and J. K. Flynn, members of the state conciliation board, after a day's investigation. They were conference today with Mayor Wiley and others. SALEM, Or., March 29.—(Special.)—The Oregonian's radio concert will be featured by the Spa, a local confectionery shop and grill, which today awarded contracts for the installation of a radio receiving set. The instruments will be capable of recording concerts given anywhere on the Pacific coast, and will be the first installed by any Salem business house for the entertainment of their patrons.

Singing for Radio Prohibited.

CHICAGO, March 29.—Singers on vaudeville circuits are prohibited from singing for radio telephones by clauses which are being inserted in their contracts. I personally witnessed two men whose heads were cut off, one by an officer with a sabre, another by a sergeant with an axe taken from the prisoner. I also saw 23 Moroccans lined up against a wall and mowed down with a Spanish machine gun.

"We were all told by our captain that anything we captured from Moroccans belonged to us and that we could sell it to the army. On one raid in a Moroccan village I took five chickens. The captain paid me \$1 for them."

RICKARD NOT YET CLEAR

Three Indictments Yet Remain to Be Disposed Of.

NEW YORK, March 29.—George L. (Tex) Rickard, international sports promoter, acquitted yesterday on charges of criminal attack and abduction, may have to undergo trial on one of the remaining indictments against him, Assistant District Attorney Pecora announced tonight.

"I intend to look carefully over the other cases," he said, "and if they show strength, in which the Schoenfeld case was lacking, we will try them."

Three indictments charging criminal attacks on east side schoolgirls are pending against Rickard. No immediate action will be taken.
