SHIPS TO BE RENAMED

NEARLY ALL SHIPPING BOARD
VESSELS AFFECTED.

Presidents of United States to Be
Honored, According to
Chairman Lasker.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4.—All
the shipping board's passenger ves-
sels, except the George Washington
and the America and the four ships
in the South America service, will
be named after presidents of the United
States, Chairman Lasker announced
today.

The individual designations have
not yet been made, nor have all the
presidential names been selected. The
board, however, after agreeing on
nine names, has authorized Mr. Lasker
to complete the list.

Those already decided on but not
assigned to the ships are Warren G.
Harding, Woodrow Wilson, William
Howard Taft, Theodore Roosevelt,
William McKinley, Grover Cleveland,
Abraham Lincoln, Andrew Jackson
and Thomas Jefferson.

The decision to rename the ves-
sels, it was explained, was reached
after many complaints had been re-
ceived against the present names of
the shipping board vessels in which
the popular names of states have been
used. The ships to be renamed are

Old North State, Creole State, Granite
State, Panhandle State, Wolverine
State, Centennial State, Blue Hen
State, Bay State, Peninsula State,
Keystone State, Empire State, Lone
Star State, Hoosier State, Hawkeye
State, Buckeye State, Pine Tree State,
Sunflower State, Blue Grass State,
Cotton State, Golden State, Silver
State and the Wenatchee and the
Leviathan.

The four ships in the South Ameri-
can service which will retain their
names are the Southern Cross, Ameri-
can Legion, Pan-American and West-
ern World.

FOREIGN DIVORCES GAIN

LACK OF PUBLICITY ENCOUR-
AGES ACTION ABROAD.

German Courts Make Matters Easy
for Americans and Italy Is
Ideal Honeymoon Spot.

PARIS, April 4.—(Special Cable.)—

How often has man, seated in a bar-
ber's chair for a shave and haircut,
concluded he might as well save time
by having a manicure and a shine
also. There is even the story of the
man obliged to spend a month in a
hospital with a broken leg who took
advantage of the opportunity to have
his appendix, tonsils and adenoids
removed.

Why is it strange, therefore, that
an American tourist should reflect,
"Well, here I am in Bulgaria; I
might as well get that little divorce
I have been thinking about so long
but never had time to arrange?"

At any rate the Bulgarian divorce
and the Roman marriage of ex-Sen-
ator Henry F. Hollis of New Hamp-
shire has caused a stir in all of the
American colonies in Europe.
European divorces have become
quite the rage with those Americans

whose pocketbooks permit of tem-
porary residence over here. Many
have obtained divorces here in Paris
in recent years, chiefly because of
the advantage of a complete absence
of publicity. It is a criminal offense
in France to publish or divulge the
testimony or grounds of a divorce
proceeding.

The hearings are secret and only
the bare result is announced.
On the other hand, both parties
must be residents of France, and have
full opportunity to appear and make
defense.

In contradiction to English practice,
which makes divorce practically im-
possible when both parties desire it,
France considers that the fact that
both want it is the best reason for
granting it. But if the suit is de-
fended it is difficult to get a decree.

Divorce is easier for foreigners in
Germany, at least for the men, for
the German courts can pronounce a
decree when only the husband resides
within the jurisdiction, since a hus-
band's residence is assumed to be his
wife's also.

Thus an American husband, by ac-
quiring a residence in Germany, can

obtain a divorce, not only for infi-
delity, but for any conduct which
destroys happiness. Divorce does not
exist in Italy, but Italy prospers from
the divorces of the other countries.
It is the ideal spot for a honeymoon
after re-marriage.

Moonsigner Fined and Jailed.

MONTESANO, Wash., April 4.—
(Special.)—Joe Primorac of South
Aberdeen pleaded guilty to a charge
of manufacturing liquor today and
was sentenced by Justice McNeill to
pay a fine of \$750 and serve 90 days
in jail. Primorac was arrested Sat-
urday night by Sheriff Gibson and
Aberdeen policemen. More than 100
gallons of mash was found and in
the same room were parts of a still,
although the principal parts were
missing.
