

CORRUPTION OF JURY CHARGED; 1 ARRESTED

State and Defense in Burch Case Act Together.

AMITY IS DISCOMFITING

Lion and Lamb Lay Down Together in Inquiry Into Irregularity at Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES, April 5.—The lion and the lamb lay down together here today in the superior court inquiry into the irregularity of jury procedure in the trial of Arthur C. Burch, about to face his second trial on an indictment charging him with the murder of J. Belton Kennedy. The amity of the district attorney, representing the state, and Paul W. Schenck, representing the defense, led to the immediate discomfiture of certain other persons who were characterized in court as the jackals of the case; they were those who interviewed the jurors for the detective agency entrusted with that work by the district attorney's office.

After District Attorney Woolwine and Mr. Schenck had taken a common attitude that any irregularities should be punished, they were directed to prepare affidavits on which to base contempt proceedings against the investigators and one of the latter, Bert Hoskins, who told the court that he had talked about the case in the presence of a woman juror, was held pending the preparation of a felony information charging him with violation of the laws relating to the protection of jurors.

Probe Results Summarized.

The results of the probe were summarized in today's proceedings as follows:

The previous discharge of two panels of jurors, because improper questions had been asked them, was approved by both sides.

The district attorney urged that contempt proceedings be instituted and said he thought the defense had understood its claims of irregularities.

The defense absolved Mr. Woolwine from personal blame but insisted with him that conditions needed correction. Judge Sidney N. Heavey, presiding, personally absolved Ana Reyes, the deputy district attorney in charge of the case, from blame.

One of the jurors testified that she overheard an investigator tell her mother that Burch was guilty and that the state intended to get a convicting jury "this time," there having been a previous disagreement.

Felony Indictment Faced.

One investigator faced a felony indictment.

The Burch case was back where it started; that is, ready for trial, but without any actual steps taken to get it under way.

The proceedings today were most informal. Witnesses arose in all parts of the courtroom and answered question without being sworn. Members of two local private detective agencies—those employed by the prosecution and the other by the defense—as well as attaches of the district attorney's office, were asked to stand before the witness stand and identify themselves as "jury investigators."

Bert Hoskins and F. C. Neil, members of the agency employed by the district attorney, were identified by several of the ex-tenants.

At the request of Woolwine the court ordered Hoskins taken into custody pending the preparation of a felony information.

The information was filed late this afternoon and charged Hoskins with an "attempt to corrupt a juror." Bail in the sum of \$2000 was fixed by Justice of the Peace Hanby. Hoskins said he would furnish bail tonight.

"LIP STICK" CASE IS SET

Court to Hear Protest Against Rules of School Board.

CORNING, Ark., April 5.—The "lip stick" case of Knobel, Ark., in which Miss Pearl Pugsley, 18 years old and pretty, seeks a writ of mandamus to set aside rules of the Knobel school board forbidding students to use cosmetics, wear low and peek-a-boo waists and short skirts, has been set to come up in Clay county circuit court here tomorrow.

Miss Pugsley was dismissed from the elementary school at Knobel because she violated the rules, according to N. E. Hicks, principal of the school. The girl and her friends claim that she only had talcum powder on her face.

National notoriety has been given the case and Miss Pugsley says she has received thousands of letters from persons sympathizing with her on the question. She also declared that a moving-picture concern offered her \$1000 a week to enter the movies. She has the offer under consideration, she added.

TRADE LEAGUE HEAD BUSY

Large Northwest Representation Sought at National Session.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 5.—Closely identified with the National Foreign Trade Council since its formation, William Pigott, president of the Pacific Northwest Foreign Trade Council, is working vigorously to insure united representation of the Pacific northwest at the forthcoming national convention in Philadelphia, May 10, 11 and 12.

Mr. Pigott is president of the Pa-

acific Car & Foundry company of Portland and Seattle. He is also vice-president of the Pacific Coast Steel company. He attended the first foreign trade conference which organized the national council and has since been one of the councilors. Others from Oregon and Washington at present are Max Houser of Portland, H. F. Alexander of Tacoma, and J. J. Donovan of Bellingham.

Together with E. P. Kemmer, secretary of the Pacific Northwest Council formed in Tacoma last December, and an advisory committee covering Oregon, Washington and Alaska, Mr. Pigott seeks to insure representative, united and large attendance from this territory.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 5.—During the month of April the architectural exhibit of the Washington state chapter of the American Institute of Architects is occupying the galleries of the Fine Arts society on Fourth avenue.

The exhibit is the most attractive and pretentious of its kind seen here. It embraces drawings of various types of buildings, including residences, office buildings, public structures, bridges and industries. The work is that of the members of the Washington chapter and of students.

Carl F. Gould, president of the architects, in addressing an audience, spoke of the large percentage of construction in Seattle without architectural supervision in the past. Climate and local conditions, he said, are tending to produce certain types and characteristics which, in time, will mark the architecture of the Pacific northwest as distinctive. Excavation has been completed on a \$100,000 home for E. A. Garber, former Oklahoma oil man. It is on Harvard avenue North. The home will be of brick and stone, two stories, Tudor style, with elaborate grounds and gardens.

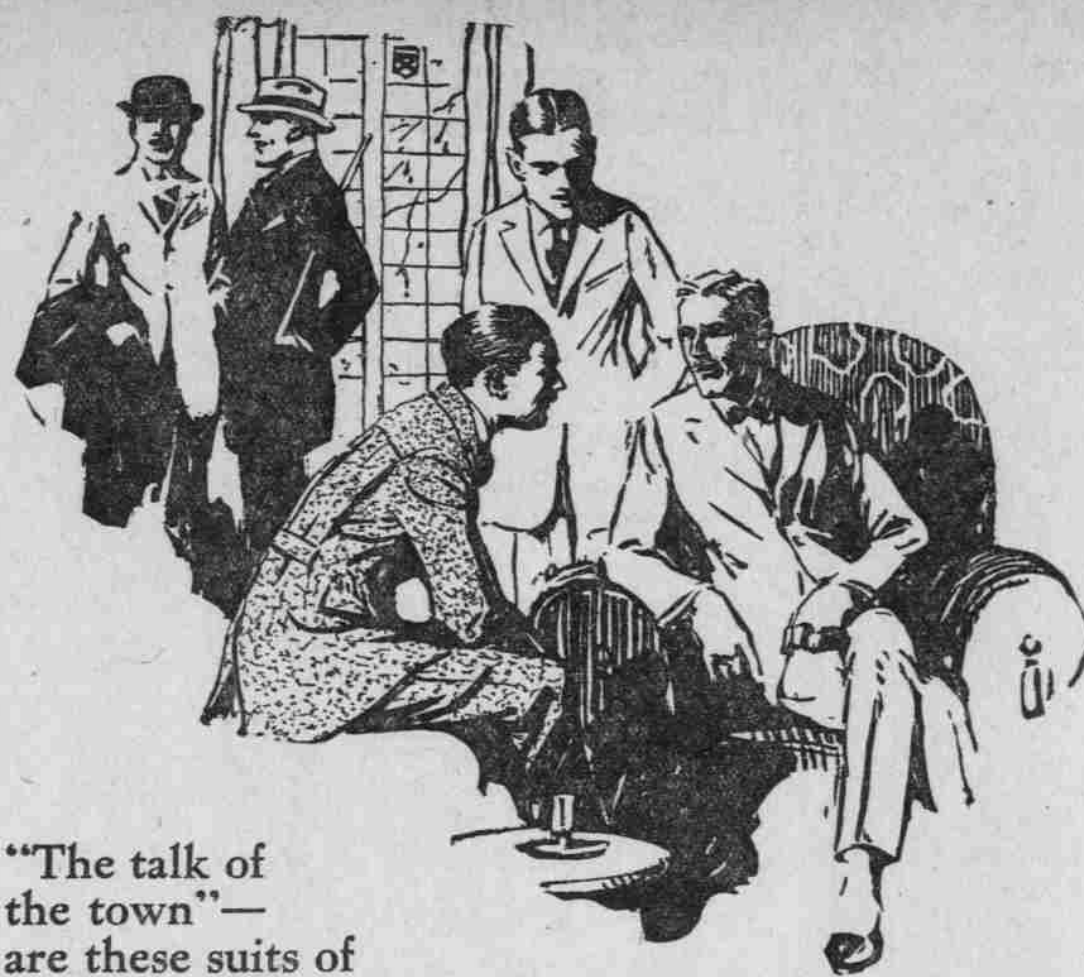
