WOMAN MOONSHINER IS FINED—Alone in the house with a 50-gallon capacity still running full blast in the basement, Mrs. Jennie Bishop, about 50 years old, was arrested at English Creek farm, east of Portland, by deputies from the office of Constable Glasse yesterday. She was fined \$100 by District Judge Bell, acting on the recommendation of Deputy District Attorney Driscoll. The still, which was turning out a gallon of finished product an hour, was ingeniously concealed, the only entrance being through a trap door in a closet.

NARCOtics JURY DISAGREES

A jury in the court of Circuit Judge Morrow yesterday disagreed concerning the guilt or innocence of Lee Chung, sentenced by Municipal Judge Rossmann to six months in the county jail on conviction of selling narcotics, and was discharged. The Chinese had appealed to the circuit court. Marked money which Patrolmen Burdick and Shafer testified was paid for two "blinds" of morphine in evidence was found on the Chinese when he was arrested, but the prosecution could not produce the "stool-pigeon" who claimed actually to have purchased the drug.

THUGS KNOCK MAN UNCONCIOUS

He was revived at the police emergency hospital and later sent to his home. According to his story to the police the men drove up in an automobile and commanded him to enter. Upon his refusal to do so, he was struck with a blunt instrument. He was found lying unconscious in the street by Edwin Steffen and Edward Serr, pedestrians.

FINGER IS FOUND GUILTY

Eugene R. Blake, who obtained \$232.75 from the Ashley & Rummel bank by representing himself to be one of the Knox of Oklahoma City, Okla., with a bank account in the American National bank in that city, was found guilty of forgery by a grand jury in the court of Circuit Judge Morrow yesterday. The jury retired at 2:22 and returned with a verdict at 4:30. Blake forged the name of Knox to a receipt for the money paid him by the bank. Deputy District Attorney Graham prosecuted the case.

MANY TOURISTS ARE COMING

More tourists will visit Portland and the Pacific coast this season than ever before, according to William McMurtry, general passenger agent of the O. W. R. & N., who has returned from a five weeks' tour of the country which took him to 36 of the larger cities of the United States and Canada. "Everywhere I went I found people talking about Portland and Oregon," said Mr. McMurtry. "They have been told that this is a fine country and they are coming here to see for themselves."

LEGION SQUAD MAKES REPORT

Fifteen bootleggers and moonshiners were arrested and five stills were confiscated as the result of the activities of Patrolmen Harris and Nutter of the police day relief liquor squad during March, it is revealed in their report yesterday to Captain Circle. Fines aggregating \$1800 were procured from the arrests, while 154 pints of moonshine whiskey were destroyed, in addition to 1350 gallons of mash.

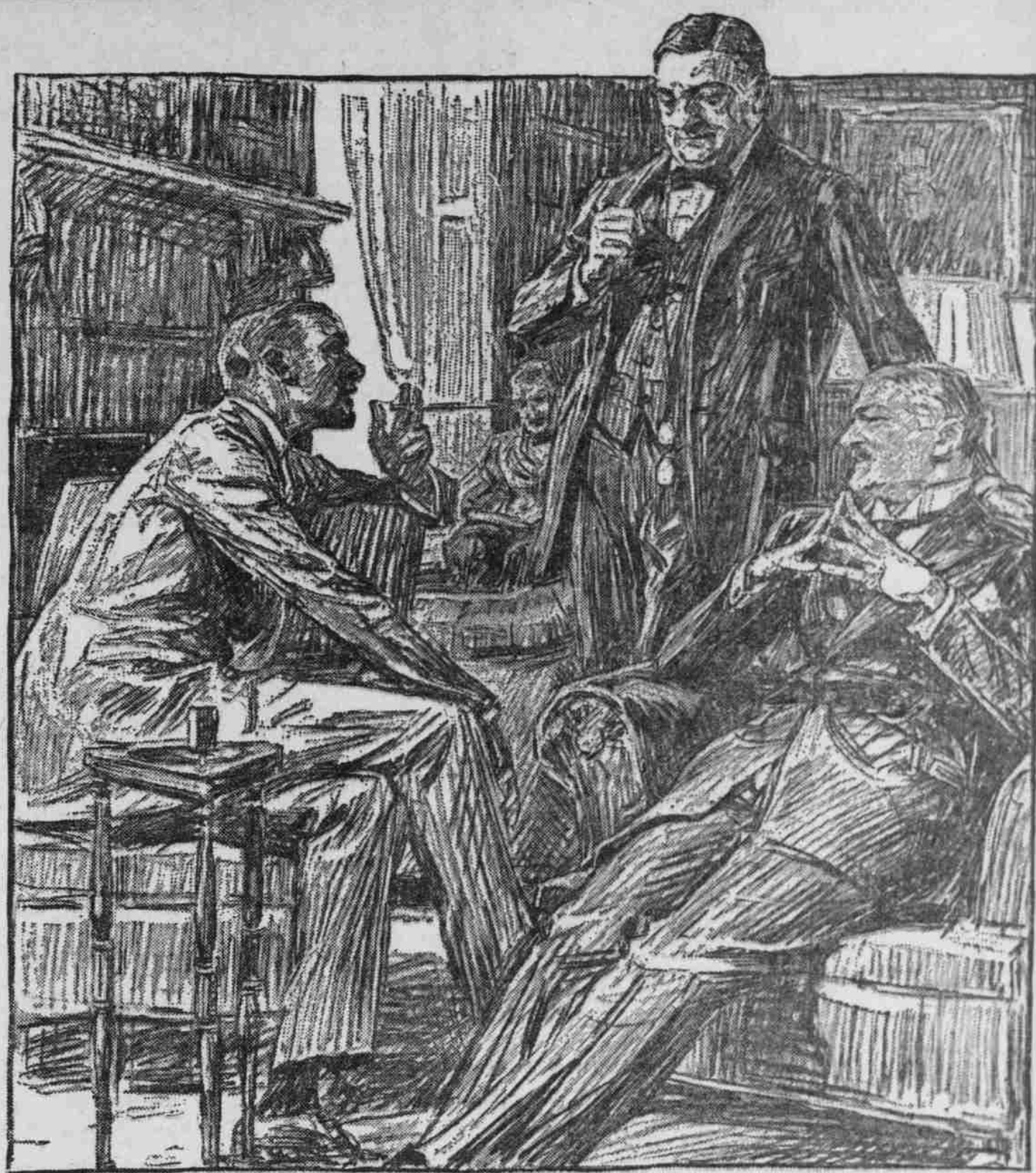
