

## FIGHT OVER ESTATE OF PHYSICIAN BEGUN

Body Held Awaiting Settlement of Dispute.

### DAUGHTERS GET \$1 EACH

Chief Beneficiaries Accused of Undue Influence on Dr. J. E. Jordan of Seattle in Making Will.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 6.—Pending settlement of the dispute as to whether the daughters or the executor in the will admitted to probate shall supervise and assume disposition, the body of Dr. J. Eugene Jordan, who died in March, is held at the Bonney-Watson undertaking establishment.

The three daughters of Dr. Jordan each receive \$1 in the will which they have attacked in court. They charge that it is not the last will and testament of the pioneer physician, and that if he died he was acting under duress exercised by Mrs. Edith Steva, executrix, and Miss Helen Hunt Adams, chief beneficiaries under the contested instrument, after the city of Seattle, to which 1000 acres of land near Aberdeen are bequeathed for the founding of the Dr. J. Eugene Jordan municipal hospital.

Petition on behalf of the three daughters, Mrs. Lucile J. Freitag, Mrs. Jeannette J. Glassmire and Miss Florine Jordan, all of Buffalo, N. Y., requests citation as to why the probate should not be revoked. It asks transfer from the jurisdiction of Judge King Dykeman, charging he is prejudiced. It also charges that Miss Adams and Mrs. Steva not only conspired to influence Dr. Jordan in the disposition of his property, but that they undertook to keep him secluded from friends during his last illness. Hearing on the petition was set for April 12 by Presiding Judge Hall.

### STOCKHOLDERS HELD LIABLE

King County Dairymen Involved in Co-operative Concern Lose.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 6.—Judgment against M. A. Hines, subscriber for stock in the King County Dairymen's association, a co-operative concern, has been obtained in the superior court by the receiver, J. I. Horrocks.

The association was formed by farmers in the vicinity of Carnation to market the produce of the members. Mr. Hines was made defendant in the test case tried before Judge Hall to determine whether or not conditions governing the raising of the \$70,000 stock subscriptions had been fully met.

Counsel for the receiver says suit will be instituted against other stock subscribers who fail to make settlement at once.

### NEW NORMAL HEAD ARRIVES

Dr. D. B. Waldo of Kalamazoo, Mich., Takes Post at Bellingham.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 6.—Dr. D. B. Waldo has arrived in Bellingham to become the

new president of the state normal school. He succeeds Dr. G. W. Nash, who, after seven years in that position, resigned recently to head the foundation of the Congregational church.

Dr. Waldo is from Kalamazoo, Mich., where he first organized the Western State Normal school of which he has since been president 18 years. He is active in the National Education association, now being general chairman of the salaries, tenure and pensions committee, and a member of the committee on general legislation.

### RELIEF FOR MINERS ASKED

Labor Federation Head Appeals for Aid to Strikers.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 6.—William Short, president of Washington State Federation of Labor, and chairman of the miners' relief committee of the federation, has issued an urgent appeal to trade unionists for contributions to the relief fund for coal miners in the state, who have been on strike since March 16, 1921.

Mr. Short says the general coal strike automatically cut off the benefits heretofore going to the men. While union miners who have just gone out will be able, he says, to meet the situation for a time, the position of those who have not worked during the past year will be desperate. Without aid they face destitution.

Mr. Short asserts that of the 2500 men who went out in 1921, less than a dozen have deserted the ranks of the strikers. These left the mines, which are now being operated on a non-union, or open shop basis.

### SOCIETY TO HOLD ROSE SHOW

Seattle Organization Plans Ninth Annual Exhibit for June.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 6.—During a week in June to be determined later, the Seattle Rose society will hold its ninth annual rose show here in the forestry building of the University of Washington. The executive committee of the society will undertake to make it the best in the history of the society. Display of many new varieties is expected. Several enthusiasts have developed novelties. Provision will be made to show other flowers to stimulate flower culture throughout the city. The movement to make this a "Flower City" was approved by the committee. The park board will be asked to establish a rose show garden at Woodland park.

The officers of the Rose society are: President, H. L. Collier; vice-president, Dr. L. L. Hall; secretary, Dr. J. E. Gilbert; treasurer, Mrs. H. A. Gardner.

### WATER MAIN PIPE JOB LET

Old Shipyard to Be Used for Supplying Material for Seattle Project.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., April 6.—Pipe for the new Seattle municipal water main from Swan lake to the city will be made at the old Patterson-MacDonald shipyard plant on the Duwamish river. The Western Pipe & Steel company of San Francisco will install equipment and employ 200 men in supplying the pipe for this and other jobs.

This is the result of the award Tuesday to Grant, Smith & Co., of the contract for pipe line No. 3 at a cost of \$1,450,000. Option on the shipyard was obtained some time ago by the Western Pipe and Steel company. The Patterson-MacDonald plant during the war built several wooden ships for the Australian government. It has been idle some years.

## ADS IN DAILIES GROWING

MORE NATIONAL ADVERTISERS USING NEWSPAPERS.

Use of Press Overcomes Business Depression, Says Coast Manager of Bureau.

Daily newspapers are becoming more and more the logical medium for national advertisers, according to Thomas L. Emory, Pacific coast manager of the bureau of advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers' association. Mr. Emory, who is at the Benson, will be in Portland for a few days in connection with the activities of the bureau, now with coast headquarters at San Francisco.

"To show how the daily papers are now being sought as mediums by national advertisers," said Mr. Emory, "particular attention is directed to the fact that numerous manufacturers that have never before used any extensive newspaper space on a national scale, are greatly increasing their newspaper appropriations to meet the present-day conditions."

Mr. Emory pointed out that this tide of advertising toward the newspapers has not been brought about by any particular propaganda or drive, but is simply developing in a natural way in order to cope with the current business situation.

"One by one," continued Mr. Emory, "manufacturers who consistently used newspaper advertising during 1921 are acknowledging success in spite of a supposed abnormal business condition and are centering their advertising activities in the daily press more extensively than ever."

Citing instances, Mr. Emory stated that the makers of a cleanser, who have been out of the newspapers for several years, are now conducting a national campaign through the press, and the manufacturers of a confection who never in the past used newspapers will this year go into the dailies on a big scale, and the manufacturers of electric appliances, who formerly did not use newspapers extensively, are carrying displays in the papers of a number of cities.

### HEADS FOR HOME NAMED

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Welch to Manage Fraser Detention Institution.

Mr. and Mrs. James W. Welch have been appointed superintendent and matron of the Fraser Detention home by Judge Jacob Kansler of the court of domestic relations, succeeding Mr. and Mrs. Earl C. Frost, resigned, according to notice received by Multnomah county commissioners.

Mr. Welch served two years overseas with the 41st division, leaving as a sergeant in Company B of the 162d infantry (3d Oregon), and returning with a commission as second lieutenant. Mrs. Welch is a trained nurse. The appointments were made with the sanction of the child welfare commission with salaries of \$125 a month for Mr. Welch and \$60 a month for Mrs. Welch.

Mr. and Mrs. Frost are retiring to manage a five-acre farm, which he purchased near the Powell Valley road. Judge Kansler asserted that the resignations were accepted with regret because of the excellent service given during the last three years.
