

WARDEN AT PRISON TO QUIT JOB MAY 1

Mr. Compton Takes Place in
Seattle Institute.

DRUG CASES TO BE CARE

Hamilton Narcotic Hospital Ob-
tains Services of Official From
State Penitentiary.

SALEM, Or., April 6.—(Special.)—
L. H. Compton, warden of the Oregon
State penitentiary since February,
1920, announced upon his return here
from Seattle today that he had sub-
mitted his resignation to Governor
Olcott to become effective May 1.

Governor Olcott announced that he
had decided to appoint J. W. Lewis
present deputy warden, to succeed
Mr. Compton. E. C. Hallay, now
principal keeper at the prison, will
succeed Mr. Lewis as deputy warden.
Both of these officials have been con-
nected with the institution in their
present capacities during Warden
Compton's administration.

"I deeply regret severing my con-
nection with the state penitentiary
and the present administration," said
Warden Compton in announcing his
resignation. "I also regret leaving
the state of Oregon. For some time I
have had under consideration con-
nection in Seattle with the Hamilton
Narcotic Institute, a \$500,000 corpora-
tion, organized for the purpose of
treating narcotic addicts.

Work Found Interesting.
"I became particularly interested in
this work when Governor Olcott in-
augurated his campaign in the Pacific
northwest against the use and sale
of narcotics, and have followed its
development very closely. I believe,
in my new field, a great work can be
done along this line, and it is for
this reason that I finally determined
to leave my present position."

In his letter of resignation to the
governor, Warden Compton said: "As
you have been apprised, I have been
considering for some time the ad-
visability of accepting the presidency
of the Hamilton Narcotic Institute,
with headquarters at Seattle, Wash.,
and upon thorough investigation have
concluded that the good which can
be done suffering humanity through
the above and the opportunity of fi-
nancial betterment to myself are so
great that I cannot but accept."

Regret Is Expressed.
"In returning my commission as
warden, it is not without some feel-
ing of regret, for I have enjoyed the
opportunity for service given under
your able leadership, and much of the
success at the prison has been made
possible by the courtesy and con-
sideration which has been always
shown me by you."

"My associations at the prison have
been particularly happy, and I can-
not speak too highly of the efficiency
and loyalty of the splendid organiza-
tion there. I feel this so deeply that
I am taking the liberty of recom-
mending as my successor the man who has
acted as deputy warden, J. W. Lewis.
His services have been of the highest
order and well deserving promotion."
Governor Olcott expressed keen re-
gret at Warden Compton's decision to
leave the prison.

Warden's Work Praised.
"Warden Compton has effected some
wonderful improvements at the insti-
tution," said the governor.

"The physical plant and the morale
of the men both have been developed
to a great degree under his manage-
ment, and I am deeply sorry to see
him leave. Mr. Lewis informs me that
the same organization and policies
maintained under Warden Compton
will be continued under the new man-
agement. The prison management,
both as to its internal workings and

the small number of escapes during
Mr. Compton's handling has been ex-
ceptionally good and deserves warm
recommendation."

MARSHAL JOFFRE IS FETED

French Generalissimo Is Guest at
San Francisco Banquet.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—Marshal
Joffre tonight was the guest of honor
at a public banquet attended by hun-
dreds of San Franciscans in the palm
court of the Palace hotel, after a
day vibrant with the enthusiasm of
the city's welcome to the French gen-
eralissimo. The marshal responded
briefly in French to the praises
given him.

The marshal avoided interviews to-
day, but two Czechoslovakian women
who broke through the police lines
behind which packed thousands
cheered the parade of welcome
brought this statement from him:
"We are glad the war has given
birth to the new heroic Czechoslo-
vakia."

After the banquet Marshal Joffre
was invited to a meeting of the Ar-
gonne lodge of Masons.

He will be the guest of honor of
San Francisco's French colony to-
morrow morning and at noon the
American Legion will entertain him
at luncheon. Another public appa-
rante is scheduled for tomorrow after-
noon, when a reception will be held
for the marshal at the site of the
palace of the legion of honor in Lin-
coln park.

MATRICIDE FOUND GUILTY
Physician Who Caused Death of
Parent Is Convicted.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 6.—Jo-
seph Studer, formerly a physician of
Feoria, tried for the murder of his
mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Studer, at
their home here last September, was
convicted of manslaughter by a jury
in the Los Angeles superior court
here yesterday. The jury deliberated
six and a half hours. Sentence will
be imposed Friday.

Studer was accused of shaking his
mother while he was angry and then
shoving her down a short flight of
steps, inflicting injuries which caused
her death.

He contended she was suddenly tak-
en with a fainting spell, clutched at
him for support and fell down the
steps before he could prevent it.

This was his second trial. In the
first the jury stood 11 to 1 for con-
viction.

HOOD RIVER MEN TO RUN

Petitions for County and State
Elections Circulated.

HOOD RIVER, Or., April 6.—(Spe-
cial.)—Petitions have been circulated
here for Judge L. N. Blowers, who
seeks nomination on the republican
ticket for representing in the legis-
lature from Hood River county, and
for F. H. Blackman, republican in-
cumbent, seeking re-election to the
county commissionership.

The only other county officer to be
elected this year is assessor. The re-
publican incumbent, Jasper Wickham,
is undecided whether he will be a
candidate. Friends have been en-
deavoring to bring about the candi-
dacy of W. L. Clark, pioneer, now en-
gaged on west side orchard places.

LEGION POLITICS OPPOSED

Action at Seattle Conference Is
Condemned by Chehalis Post.

CHEHALIS, Wash., April 6.—(Spe-
cial.)—Members of L. R. Fiske post,
American Legion of Chehalis, do not
take kindly to the spirit and purposes
of the organization perfected Sunday
in Seattle by a number of representa-
tives of the American Legion as-
sembled from various parts of Wash-
ington, wherein it is proposed to use
members for political purposes.

a strong resolution condemning the
outcome of the Seattle meeting was

branch of the American Legion post in the state.

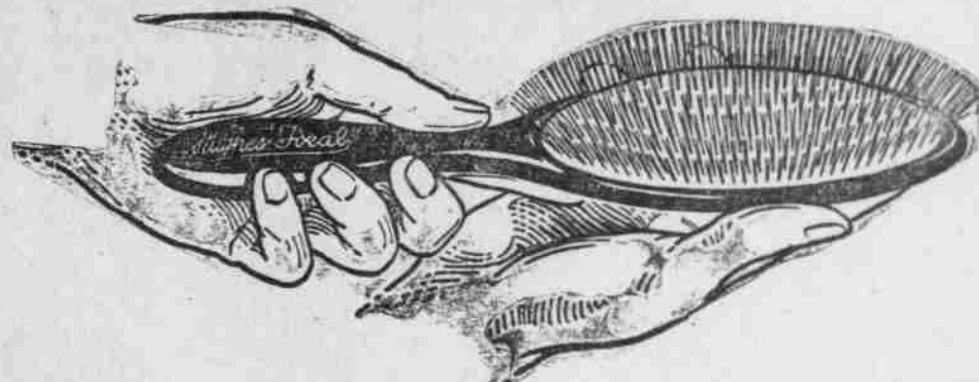
