

WIRELESS ON AUTOS HELD POSSIBILITY

Time When Motorist Can Hear Sermons Is Seen.

F. R. DAVIS VISITS HERE

General Electric Company's Advertising Manager Says Radio Manufacture Is Rushed.

A picture of the future when the good deacons of the church might go automobile riding Sunday mornings and listen to the sermon the minister of their church by means of a wireless telephone attached to their automobile, was painted by F. R. Davis, amateur radio operator by hobby and advertising manager of the General Electric company of Schenectady, N. Y., who was in Portland yesterday on a survey trip of the Pacific coast in the interests of his company.

Mr. Davis also suggests that the man of the future might eat breakfast while the news of the world is announced to him by wireless telephone, and he might be entertained at dinner in the same way with wireless concert.

Development Is Needed.

He admitted that all this was something for the future, however, and would require considerable development from the present efficiency of the wireless telephone.

"I was among the dishabelliers not so long ago," said Mr. Davis. "However, I was finally induced to obtain a wireless set for \$12 and, after manipulating this for a time, I also became a radio fan along with hundreds of thousands of others in the country."

Mr. Davis said that interest in the use of the wireless telephone was sweeping the country and that the manufacturing plants were working day and night to turn out the sets to supply the demand.

Thousands Made Weekly.

"Our plant is turning them out at the rate of thousands a week," he said. "and apparently the demand is just beginning."

Mr. Davis is especially interested in the campaign now being conducted with a view to obtaining a more perfect wiring of houses for the use of electrical appliances.

"The ordinary house," he declared "is not equipped with sufficient outlets for the use of all the modern electrical appliances now used to make housekeeping easy."

In addition new appliances are being invented every day which can be utilized in the home and only the houses, which are wired sufficiently in every room, can take full advantage of them.

History Rectifier Cited.

Mr. Davis said it was of especial importance that the houses be equipped so that vacuum cleaners and similar appliances can be attached wherever necessary.

"The cost of equipping a house with such outlets is slight and cannot be compared to the convenience," he said.

Mr. Davis said that among the new electrical appliances was a rectifier for automobile storage batteries made for installing in the home garage and operated merely by turning on a switch.

Mr. Davis came from Los Angeles to Portland and left yesterday afternoon for Seattle.

NIGHT PROWLER IS FOILED

FLASHLIGHT AWAKENS WOMAN AND BURGLAR VANISHES.

Three Other Homes Are Robbed but Children's Banks and Money Only Are Taken.

The blinding glare of a flashlight, turned full in her face, as a robber on the porch outside her bedroom door, awakened Mrs. Joseph A. Davidson, wife of the manager of The Oregonian's advertising service department, in their home at Ewahu station, about 2 o'clock yesterday morning. The man was attempting to effect an entrance through a window.

Her screams attracted her husband, who rushed to the window, revolver in hand, but the prowler had fled. Mr. Davidson promptly telephoned to the home of all his neighbors, warning them of the presence of the would-be burglar, only to find that three other homes had been entered during the night.

The robber had a penchant for babies' banks. At the home of Ross M. Plummer of the Plummer Drug company, the only articles taken were a baby's bank and a purse containing \$4. The children's bank and a purse containing \$15 were also articles missing from the home of Alfred A. Hampson of the law firm of Dey, Hampson & Newman.

The prowler also broke into the residence of Dr. Eugene Rockey at Riverdale, but nothing of value was taken. Entrance was effected at the Plummer home through a window over a basement area, indicating that there might have been two men and that one helped the other up.

A number of peddlers have been seen in the vicinity recently, apparently sizing up the arrangement of the houses, and are suspected of being the prowlers. No difficulty was encountered in entering any of the homes, as windows were unlocked and in two cases already raised.

11 NOW DEAD IN EPIDEMIC

Wife of Prominent Portland Merchandise Broker Passes.

The 11th death attributed to septic sore throat was reported to the city health bureau yesterday. The latest victim of the epidemic was Mrs. John Q. Townsend of 971 Hillsdale avenue, who died late Wednesday night.

Mrs. Townsend, the wife of a prominent merchandise broker of this city, became ill with streptococcal infection about a week ago. This affliction developed into a case of erysipelas. Mrs. Townsend is survived by three children—Erik, aged 11; Gladys, 10; and Bruce, 7.

Funeral services for Mrs. Townsend will be held at the Portland crematorium today at 1:30 o'clock.

LUMBER WEEK BIG ONE

Sale of \$8,836,484 Feet Is Reported by 130 Mills.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 6.—Sale of \$8,836,484 feet were reported by 130 mills affiliated with the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending April 1, the largest week's business since the summer of 1920, according to a statement made public at the association's offices here today.

Shipments totaled \$5,370,740 feet, a near record, the statement said. The mills cut 76,778,637 feet, or about 90 per cent of normal capacity. Thirty-one per cent of all new business for the week was for future delivery by water.

DIKING PROJECT PLANNED

Drainage for 750 Acres Proposed in South Aberdeen Scheme.

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 6.—(Special.)—Diking and drainage for 750 acres of tideland in the south Aberdeen tideland district, is proposed by E. C. Finch at a cost of about \$120,000.

The acreage includes all of the Union Pacific addition, all of the Hunter addition, all of the John Evans addition, all of the South Side addition, 180 acres of school land and 244 acres of unplatted land owned by Mr. Finch.

A road system giving access to tracts into which it is proposed to divide the land is being worked out.

Two ADDRESSES MADE BY WORLD-FAMOUS SURGEON.

University of Oregon Medical School and New County Hospital Inspected by Visitor.

Dr. Charles H. Mayo, world famous surgeon of Rochester, Minn., was the guest of Portland yesterday and made two addresses, one before the student body of the University of Oregon medical school in the morning and before the Academy of Medicine at the Multnomah hotel at night.

Dr. Mayo visited the medical school and new county hospital and spoke of the opportunity that is Portland's in having the hospital and school so closely connected. He forecast great future development here in scientific knowledge because of the facilities in and about Portland for a great medical center.

The social service that may be rendered by a physician was stressed in the talk of Dr. Mayo before the student body of the school. He said there is more to the practice of medicine than the mere gathering of dollars, and the physician should be a man of leadership in the community.

He spoke of the great wisdom of the founders of the school and the bright promise of the future that the centralization of medical schools and hospitals here holds.

Dr. Mayo was guest of honor at a luncheon at the University club, and last night he was dinner guest of Dr. Thomas M. Joyce at the same club.

Last night he gave the annual Joyce lecture in neurology and surgery before the Academy of Medicine. His subject was "Goitre." President Holden introduced the speaker of the evening.

Dr. Mayo said the northwest compares with Switzerland in the prevalence of goitre. Whether or not, he said, this section of the country has exhausted the elements in the soil necessary to the prevention of goitre is not known. He spoke of the use and abuse of iodine in the treatment of the thyroid gland and went into technical detail on the surgical treatment of the malady. He spoke from an experience of 25,000 goiter cases that have been studied and operated upon at the Mayo hospital. Pictures were shown on the screen representing operations and goiter cases that he explained.

Chairman Holden introduced Dr. Andrew C. Smith at the conclusion of the lecture, who thanked Dr. Mayo for his appearance here.

Telescope Is Installed.

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 6.—

Pacifists of the church, who cannot be stirred to battle for God against sin, came in for severe criticism last night by Evangelist George Wood Anderson. In a gripping sermon at the United Gospel Crusade tabernacle on inactivity, Dr. Anderson earnestly pleaded for the people of Portland to rally and "come to the help of the Lord against the mighty."

Last night was known as "men of the church night," men being present from practically every church in the city and occupying special sections of the large tabernacle.

The crusader's sermon topic was "They Came Not," his text being taken from Judges 5:23, "Curse ye Meroz, saith the angel of the Lord, curse ye bitterly the inhabitants thereof; because they came not, to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty."

Sin Is Awful Reality.

"Sin is the most awful and dreadful reality in the world," said the evangelist. "Sin is not trifling. No matter how we may excuse ourselves, no matter how small our pet sin may seem to be in our sight, every time we sin we make ourselves traitors to God and a soldier fighting in the devil's army. Christian Science is a Benedict Arnold to God, for it tries to lull the people to sleep by telling them that there is no enemy, that the enemy unobserved may go on destroying the boys and girls and breaking up homes and lives."

Battle Declared On.

"The battle is on in Portland. I am not asking anyone to come to my help or follow me only insofar as I follow God, but my cry is: 'Who will come to the help of the Lord against the mighty?' The mighty power of profanity, the mighty forces of impurity, the mighty power and influence of intemperance, the mighty forces of Sabbath destruction, bringing the blight of irreverence. They are against this revival."
